JOE HURDLE & HIS AWARD

Haney's All In Wins Two Consecutive Years **By Stephen Bell**

t is one of the most prestigious all-age awards, desired by the handlers and owners, yet little known or celebrated. Some years in the past, the winner wasn't even reported in print. So, who was Joe Hurdle? And what is his award about?

Simply put, the award celebrates the top qualifying dog for the National Championship. It is a small pin made from silver that Joe Hurdle had collected prior to his death in 1993 and was first awarded the following season in his memory. Hoyle Eaton would remark, "Joe has left a legacy for presentday and future judges- honesty and commitment, love and dedication to the game that kept his heart in the right place."

Joe Hurdle was born February 3, 1918, and attended Southern Mississippi University, graduating in 1940. Joe was a successful farmer by profession, and as a lover of good bird dogs, he was first field trialing in the 1950s. He campaigned a number of winning dogs; his most successful was probably Sundowner, but his most notable (or notorious) was

Misty Morn-a wild derby he handled himself at the National Championship in 1961. She was the youngest dog to ever compete there and returned for three more years of competition.

It was Rube Scott who first invited Joe to judge the National Championship in 1968, and he judged there for 29 renewals, second only to Hobart Ames 30 times as a judge. Joe served on the board of directors and became the president of the National Championship Club in 1984. He designed the list of qualifying trial standards for both the National Championship and the Purina Dog of the Year Award, also serving on the original Purina committee. His intention for a dog of the year to be the National Championship's top qualifier was only realized after his passing, with this award given in his memory.

The winner of the Joe Hurdle Award this year was Haney's All In, and he is the first dog in the history of this award to win in two consecutive years. It is a remarkable feat, considering he has only been in all-age competition for two years. Haney's All In, or "Ray-Ray," is owned by the brothers Steve and Stacey Croy, Red Hills Kennel of Whigham, Georgia, and is handled by Mark McLean.

In his derby year, Ray-Ray was twice a runner-up champion (at the Continental and Georgia Derby Championships) and won the American Derby Invitational Championship with Ike Todd handling. As a first-year all-age dog with Mark McLean as his handler, he won the Tarheel Open Championship, United States Open Championship, and the National Free-For-All, was a runner-up at the Georgia Quail Championship, and won the Continental All-Age Championship. In his sophomore season this year, he has won the Dixie Open All-Age, the National Pheasant Championship, and the National Free-For-All Championship a second time. A truly remarkable record for a dog who is still a month shy of four years old at the time of this writing. And he has now won the first trial of the next Joe Hurdle Award season, the West Tennessee Open All-Age.

UNITED STATES OPEN CHAMPIONSHIP

Bandit's Hill Avenger Named Champion; Miller's Heat Advisory, Runner-up By Ruthann Epp | Greensboro, Alabama | December 6, 2024

he 2024 United States Open Champion is Bandit's Hill Avenger, handled by Mark McLean of Doe Run, Georgia, and owned by Ann Forrester of South Fulton, Tennessee. Ann was on a horse watching Avenger's and McLean's performance in the 12th brace. The handsome white Pointer ran a strong forward race. His first find was under the cedars at 20. He then disappeared out the front. He showed up at the end of the wild woods and then traced the edge of new ground before again disappearing to the front. About 5 minutes after pick up was called, the call of point was heard in the distant front. The judges kicked their horses and sped across the creek and over the hill to see the big stylish Pointer male standing at the edge of the tree line in the hayfield. McLean walked in front of his dog, a covey boiled out, and the crack of the gun echoed through the heavy air just before darkness set in.

Miller's Heat Advisory, who always makes a good showing on these grounds, was named United States Runner-up Champion for the second year in a row. The white and orange Pointer was handled by Judd Carlton of Cairo, Georgia, and owned by John Mathys of Green Bay, Wisconsin. Heat Advisory ran the first afternoon of the trial. He had a strong forward race with a find at 18. He took the entire bottom in New Ground and Gum Springs and finished strong.

This was a top-notch stake. Numerous dogs did great jobs— Erin's Code of Honor had two finds and a big race; Miller's King Poast had three finds and big casts; Touch's Malcom Story was braced with King Poast; he also had three finds and was wide-ranging; Haney's Silver Dollar had five finds and showed well; and Rester's Cajun Spirit had a find and a good race with a super cast.

The judging duties went to Dr. Justin Howard, a busy and outstanding veterinarian and field trialer from Sardis, Alabama, and Ruthann Epp, a longtime field trialer from Marion Junction, Alabama. Unfortunately, Dr. Howard's horse took a wild jump near the end of the first brace that sidelined the judge, so Schley Rutherford, the marshal and president of the club, stepped in to complete the task.

Open Derby

The winner of the United States Open Derby is Erin's Bold Ruler, a pointer male handled by Luke Eisenhart and owned by Claudia McNamee and William Bruchey. Bold Ruler had an exciting, fastpaced race with three finds at 6, 14, and 29; the final cast and find right at pick-up clinched the win with speed and style. Second place went to Erin's Copper Colt, handled by Judd Carlton and owned by Allen Linder; it was a very close second. Colt made a super cast and had two finds and an unproductive. Third place went to Rester's Cash'n In, handled by Luke Eisenhart and owned by Cecil Rester and Reuben Richardson. He had a pretty race with plenty of run, style, and one find.

Other derbies that did a good job were Erin's Legacy and Erin's Katie Elder; they were braced together, and both had a great race and a strong finish. Erin's War Eagle had a good race, one find, and one unproductive.

Handlers in the two stakes that competed were Judd Carlton, Luke Eisenhart, Mark McLean, and Patrick Siebels from Georgia, Gary Lester from Kentucky, Korry Rinehart from Mississippi, Jerry Raynor from North Carolina, and Tom Shenker from Alabama. Ann Forrester and Mike Sweet represented the owners. The weather was mostly cooperative—some braces had to deal with wind, but temperatures were in the 30s and 40s until the last day, which was in the 60s.

Outcast Duststorm Wins NBHA Kentucky State Classic By Mary Sue Schalk | Kevil, Kentucky | December 20, 2024

National Bird Hunters he Association Kentucky State Classic and companion Derby and Puppy stakes were held in Kevil, Kentucky, at the West Kentucky Wildlife Management Area December 20-22, 2024. Hosted by the West Kentucky Field Trial Club, the event had 24 entries in the Classic, 12 in the Open Derby, and 14 in the Open Puppy. Entries were especially appreciated the weekend before Christmas; the field had trainers from Indiana, Ohio, Missouri, New York, Iowa, Georgia, and Kentucky represented.

Jay Lewis of Ashland, Missouri, teamed with Korry Rinehart of Rienzi, Mississippi, to judge all three stakes. Both judges are active members of the horseback field trial community, and their time in the saddle was much appreciated. Lewis serves on the board for the Amateur Derby Invitational, competes, judges, and facilitates field trials on a regular basis. Rinehart not only competes as a pro but has also scouted multiple national champions on the all-age circuit.

The Kentucky State Classic turned loose the first brace on Friday, December 20. Prior to the start of the trial, the grounds received a heavy round of rain, thus making navigating for handlers on foot challenging. Not only for handlers, but the conditions were also tough for all canine competitors.

Rising to the top of 24 entries was Outcast Dustorm, an English Setter female, owned by Jim Kleve of Minnesota and handled by James Kleve. The tri-color female had a strong, forward race on Friday afternoon. "Sassy" pushed to the front throughout her hour, showing to the front at appropriate intervals. At the end of her hour, Kleve called point on a woodline. She stood stoic as her handler flushed in front of her, creating the perfect picture of a classic shooting dog. Her style, class, and forward-hunting ability earned her the top spot for the trial.

Sam Ridings handled Georgia Born Apache Wind to second place spot. Apache Wind is also owned by Sam and his sister Margie. The Pointer male ran in the final brace on Friday; the second half of his hour proved to be the better show. He was biddable and finished the hour at dusk with a picture-perfect find.

Rounding out the field was owner/ handler Mike Fox with the ever-stylish and consistent Foxy Lady Sadie. The Red Setter female worked close for Fox most of her hour producing birds at the 55-minute mark, as she and bracemate Outcast Siren Song, handled by James Kleve, had a divided find in very thick cover. Guns were fired, and all was in order to conclude the running to the NBHA Kentucky Classic.

Besting a field of 12 derbies was black and white Pointer male Griffs Hackberry's Zach. Owned by Mike Griffin of Oklahoma, this strong, leggy dog is no stranger to the winners' circle. He handled to the front for Justin Crook and showed strong potential in his outgoing race. Hunting into second place was Bryant's Cold Rain, also a Pointer male. Owned by Kenton Bryant of Glasgow, Kentucky, the almost white dog hunted every inch of cover during his half hour for handler Michael Edwards. Rounding out the field of derbies was Setter Ridge Power Play, an English Setter male owned by Brad Peterson of Cedar Falls, Wisconsin, and handled by James Kleve. The tri-color male is a consistent competitor, digging in and hunting forward during his half hour.

The puppies wrapped up the weekend in the sunshine in Kentucky. Fourteen puppies were drawn for the stake, which ran on Sunday morning. Handler James Kleve returned to the winners' circle with English Setter male Boatright's Renegade. This puppy ran a strong forward race, taking edges with purpose. His enthusiasm on the ground was clear when he jumped in and out of cover seeking game. Second and third place were paired together during the stake, with Hackberrys Zinnia Warrior taking second and White River Cutter taking third. Zinnia is a classy, petite black head Pointer female, easy on the eyes; she handled well for owner/handler Brian Kennedy. Ron Russell owns Cutter, a burly white Pointer male, who covers the ground aggressively and showed consistently to the front for handler

he American Red Setter Bird Dog Club was formed in the summer of 2023 by a group of walking field trial enthusiasts interested in promoting walking trials, not only with Red Setters but with all breeds. With an initial trial under our belts in 2023, the club moved forward to sponsor a wild bird trial in upper New York this past fall, which was very successful. This December, we returned to North Carolina to repeat our quail trial, again running at the home of Joe and Brenda Edwards. Thanks to their generosity, we were able to host our third field trial for the club on the Six Runs Farms, near Clinton, North Carolina.

The piney woods and open croplands of coastal North Carolina are prime bird dog country, and we were so fortunate to have these fine grounds for our first trial. The grounds at Six Runs are ideally suited for running bird dogs, with a mix of pine woods, croplands, and long strips of lovegrass, ideal for holding birds tight. The Running

The Open Puppy started the day with a nice showing of puppies. Come Back Stella, a quick-moving Red Setter female owned and handled by Joe Edwards, took the blue with a wide and forward race. Close behind were two puppies out of Stump Hill Farms; Daniel Bell handled Stump Hill Farms Simply Red, a Red Setter female, to take the number two spot, and Stump Hill Farms Pete, a Pointer male, captured the remaining place.

Open Derby

Running in the third brace, Stump Hill Farms Ellie, a Red Setter female, gobbled up the terrain for her handler Danial Bell, always to the front and showing some exceptionally wide casts. She showed class and style on her find. In second place was Nomads Scout Sniper, who showed a purposeful and forward application, with two broke finds for her handler Bell. Brita Loves Happy Berlin, a female GSP, took the number three slot with a moderate forward race and two nicely handled derby finds for her handler, Robert Smith.

Open Shooting Dog

Pinekone Rappatomac Hawk took the blue in the Open Shooting Dog for his handler, Jameson Crandell. This Setter male showed a wide and classy application, with outstanding manners on his birds. In second place was Black River Ruby, a Setter female. Handled by Sean Melvin, Ruby showed her veteran

experience as she scored two finds and a back to take the red. Ruby's kennelmate, Black River Sue, rounded out the placements with a pleasing forward race and nicely handled birdwork.

Amateur Shooting Dog

Brace 1: Come Back Trump and Black River Sue. The Amateur Shooting Dog was underway on Sunday morning, with Joe Edwards and Wendy Evans handling. Trump was lost to judgment; Sue scored one find, nicely handled, and an unproductive. She showed a moderate and pleasing race and finished to the front.

Brace 2: Pinekone Rappatomac Hawk and Conneaut Creek Scenic River. Crandall and Fazenbaker cut their dogs loose, and both males put on a nice show. Running wide and covering some territory, they traded bird finds throughout the course, each scoring three finds and Hawk scoring one back. Near the finish, Hawk scored a find along a brush line, and River popped out but was on the leash after failing to back. Hawk joined him seconds later after a few too many steps on his bird.

Brace 3: Chippokes Cracker Jack and CC Lenni Lenape. Flanders and Fazenbaker both showed dogs with big runs; Jack scored two finds, and Lenni likewise, with Jack honoring. Lenni took a small step on his find, and Jack showed perfect manners to take third place in the stake.

Brace 4: Jake The Joker and Come Back Lillie Mae. Crandall and Edwards broke away their dogs, and Jake showed a wide and forward race. Lillie Mae likewise was forward, with both dogs scoring multiple finds. Jake finished strong to the front to garner the secondplace spot.

Brace 5: Come Back Bo and Chippokes Fancy Lady. Bo had a short run and was on the leash after failing to back for his handler, Edwards. Fancy Lady showed nicely for Flanders, with four perfectly handled finds and a classic shooting dog performance, to take the blue for the stake.

NGSPA OPEN ALL-AGE INVITATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP

B M B's Freeloader Named Champion

The seventh NGSPA Open All-Age Invitational was held on January 4-6, 2025, at Hell Creek WMA, Mississippi. Many respected field trialers consider these grounds to be the best all-age grounds in the country. The Mississippi Department of Wildlife, Fish, and Parks has been kind enough to slot us into this time slot, which has proven to be very good over the years as far as weather is concerned. We are the only NGSPA event to be held here. Hell Creek WMA is owned by the state of Mississippi and managed by their Department of Wildlife, Fish and Parks, which is led by Lynn Posey, Executive Director, and under the management of Justin Hughes, NE Regional Biologist. Justin replaced Nathan Blount, and he has been very helpful to work with, not only with our group but also with other field trial groups who use these grounds. The grounds were opened in 1999 and include dog kennels, a horse barn with 38 stalls, outside paddocks, a spacious clubhouse with cooking facilities, and a nice area for trailers and staked-out dogs with some electrical hook-ups. The exceptional grounds accommodate three-hour-long courses. They are multiuse grounds, and we field trialers share them with hunters and others who love the outdoors and appreciate God's creation. The Mississippi Department of Wildlife, Fish, and Parks has a deep commitment to multi-use recreation, and we are deeply grateful to them.

Although he retired in 2020, Jack Griffin remains the "face of the Hell Creek WMA." Recognizing the need to stay on top of the grounds, Justin Hughes has retained him to keep the grounds in top shape, which benefits the quail, deer, and turkey that call these grounds home, as well as the field trialers who hold Hell Creek in the highest regard. Jack shows up at every event and is always a big help in many ways, but most of all, he ensures that the facilities and grounds are always in top shape. His work on the grounds is essential and includes mowing and weed control, which keeps the forest from encroaching onto the grass bottoms and reducing game habitat. He understands

how fields need to flow for our bird dogs—something most folks cannot grasp. Thanks also to Jeremy Taylor and the Hell Creek Field Trial Clubs, who work during the year to keep the area clean and in good condition.

The grounds are varied and challenging with a number of long bottoms, some piney woods, and smaller tree-lined fields. Despite some heavy rain before we arrived, Hell Creek dropped to a safe level so we could use all three courses. There is plenty of dense cover to hold quail. The grounds demand a powerful all-age dog that stays to the front, carries a line to the end, and seeks timely guidance from its handler. Absences of ten minutes or more are common. The courses flow nicely but penalize dogs that get behind, won't carry a line, are seen too often, or won't respond to their handler.

We were blessed to have Korry Rinehart and Nick Thompson advise us on how to best utilize the grounds to produce three courses, and then they used their knowledge to plant quail in strategic places. All three courses provide their own challenges and opportunities to show and evaluate an all-age dog.

We were honored to have two outstanding judges: Rich Robertson, Jr., and Nick Thompson. Both men know bird dogs, having trained, handled, and scouted them for many years and at many prestigious events. Nick has been scouting our All-Age Invitational since its inception. Both men know the courses well and were helpful to the handlers. Most importantly, both men understand what it takes to be an All-Age Invitational Champion, and they have stellar reputations of personal integrity.

We had a talented crew involved in putting on this quality event. Christy Harris and Tireca (ReRe) Turner teamed up to provide three wonderful meals each day. Many have said that our meals here are the best of any trial in the country. Joe Frauendienst oversaw tons of details both in preparation for the event and throughout it, including dog wagon, purchase and care of our strong flying quail, and many preparation details. Sheri Tangsrud and Dr. Fred Ryan pitched in to help with the administration responsibilities. We could not have put the event on without the oversight, attention to details, and hard work of our Executive Assistant, Brittiny Haberkorn, and Bobbi Richardson.

The grounds tend to be confusing for new handlers, and it was a tremendous help to have Korry Rinehart serve as lead Marshall with assistance from Hunter. Korry and Nick planted the birds every night, and one morning, after a huge thunderstorm. They know exactly where to plant the birds where they will hold and produce a quality find.

Our incredible sponsors made this trial possible. Greg Blair and Purina support all three of our NGSPA Invitationals, which showcase the excellence of their product, which is currently being fed to all dogs competing in this challenging endurance event. They provided important financial assistance, including 12 bags of product for the Champion handler and 12 bags for auction, and they helped with an original oil painting of the Champion by Leah Brigham (Ross Young has retired), which was gifted to the owner. Garmin provided an Alpha 10 tracking device to the Champion's owner, and SportDOG gave us a tracker for auction, the Tek 1.5. The winning handler also earned a \$5,000 purse.

All attendees received an exceptional package of gifts, including a warm and rugged Carhartt hooded jacket with dog and owner's names and logo, a best-inclass horse blanket by Rambo, a dog vest with logo by Ruff Wear, and other items.

The Guidelines and Philosophy are essentially the same as the NGSPA Shooting Dog Invitationals. We ask the judges to pay close attention to our NGSPA All-Age Standard. The 12 top winning all-age dogs from the past year are invited. There are three continuous days of running. The first two are hour stakes, and the third day is a 90-minute call-back, which tests the endurance and stamina of the top dogs like no other trial in the GSP world.

As with all of our Invitationals, the judges maintain a consistent pace, staying on course and expecting the handler to "show them their dog," understanding that it is the handler's job to show his dog, not the judge's job to follow the handler around. Handlers were free to leave the "path" and do what they needed to show their dog to the judges. Handlers are expected to quickly gain the front after birdwork.

The Running of the Dogs' Callback Brace

The judges called back two dogs: B M B's Freeloader (Hewey) and High Standing Cuttin Edge (Woody). Both dogs had outstanding runs on Days 1 and 2. If they had callback runs consistent with or better than their first two day's performances, none of the other 10 dogs could touch them; therefore, the judges decided to name two dogs in reserve in case both of them "blew up." It proved unnecessary to run the reserve dogs because the Champion was named.

The Champion

B M B's Freeloader (Hewey), owned by Brandon and Jennifer Blum, handled by Brandon Blum.

Day 1. Hewey had a strong, consistent, forward race with excellent application to the course. He had a nonproductive at 20 and a find at 45. His style and birdwork were flawless. Hewey had a strong finish.

Day 2. Hewey had a run that was very consistent with Day 1. He had a divided find at 11, finds at 45 and 54, and a back at 51. As with the first day, his birdwork was outstanding, and he had a strong finish.

Day 3, 90-Minute Callback. Hewey had finds at 11, 20, 28, 69, and 78, and a nonproductive at 64. All finds were handled very well with style and intensity, and his finds included some impressive limb finds. Hewey was always to the front. After his third find, he had a 20-minute absence but was found on point to the front. He showed no signs of fatigue and no let down in his run or range during the last 30 minutes of the brace, and he presented a strong finish. His range was all-age all the way. His ground application was good as he sought objectives and never broke off of an edge. He took long edges on the far side of the course and disappeared to the front. Hewey was always hunting and had an excellent nose as demonstrated by the number of finds he had, and on nearly everyone he had the bird pinned for a quick flush. He was never seen running mid-field unless it was on the way to an edge. Overall, Hewey had a stellar all-age performance for all three days and met all the requirements of a true All-Age Invitational Champion.

Champion's Bracemate

High Standing Cuttin Edge (Woody), owned by Anthony and Dayna Rusciano, handled by Dan DiMambro.

Woody's Days 1 and 2 performances were very strong. Before the Call Back whistle was blown, Woody was "right there" with Hewey. The Championship was truly riding on their performances during the callback.

Day 1. Woody had a good forward race, hanging the edges with good application to the course. He had a find at 16 with great style and intensity. He was always to-the-front with all-age range. He closed the hour with a strong finish.

Day 2. Woody had finds at 12, 21, and 54. His back at 34 resulted when he came from behind after an absence. He was otherwise front-running and had a good finish. His birdwork was classy.

Day 3 (90-minute callback). Woody went missing at 5, and the handler called for his tracker at 30.

General Comments by the Judges

The judges liked the grounds because they allowed a true all-age dog to show his moves and power. There were a number of outstanding performances, but some of them couldn't do it twice.

The Invitational requirement of three days of outstanding performances is the true test of a champion. Both judges have attended all seven All-Age Invitationals and had some general observations to share with us. They have observed a number of marked improvements since the first event. The handlers are making the dogs handle vs. chasing them around as was too frequent early on. Most handlers are maintaining a more relaxed pace, trusting their dogs to come around (maybe with the help of a scout). Most handlers are doing a better job handling. For example, they are more likely to stop and point out their dogs at a strategic point or gather them up or heel them through a choke point and wait for the judges to catch up before releasing them. In general, there have been noticeable improvements in handling and training, and the dogs are better prepared.

The annual U. S. Complete Shooting Dog Association Robert E. Lee Shooting Dog Classic, Futurity, and the Les Hobbs Puppy Classic began on Monday, January 13, at 8:00 a.m. and lasted until Sunday, January 19.

This year's location was the wellknown grounds of the Mid-Carolina Field Trial Club in Camden, South Carolina. The Mid-Carolina grounds are in good shape this year due to the efforts of the members of the Mid-Carolina club. The grounds are sandy walking paths, broom straw patches, field and woods edges, much like our NC sandhills areas.

The Camden grounds have hosted field trials since November 5, 1959. The winner was Hirollins Gone and Doneit, owned and handled by Warren Parrott. "Gunner" is no stranger to the winners' circle. He ran in the fourth brace on day one. In his hour, he scored seven polished finds. At 6 he was found on point just before the first field with his bracemate, Ralphy's Hillbilly (Brian Ralph) backing. Not long after, he was standing again in field No. 2, again with bracemate backing. At 15, Gunner was pointing in the sage grass just before "the hill," and his bracemate was again backing. At 20, he was found standing after the hill, and all was in order. At this time, Gunner was on the course by himself, as his bracemate was picked up for a breach of manners. He was found on point again at 37 in a birdy area just past the road crossing. Gunner had a covey find at 43 and his final find at 47. Gunner hunted forward at an acceptable range for his entire hour, never slowing down or coming from behind. He pointed staunchly with a high head and tail, completely steady on wing and shot for owner/handler Warren Parrott.

The second-place dog, Mohawk Mill Shake Up, ran in the 11th brace during

day two. At 12, Shake was standing in the row of pines between the first and second fields with his bracemate, Ralphy's Chasehill Rip (Brian Ralph) backing. Shake's handler, Tony Bingham, produced a bird, and both dogs were moved on. At 15, after a big move up the woods edge, Shake was standing, and Rip was collared for failing to back. At 24, as we crested the hill, Shake was spotted standing to the left of the course in a birdy area with good cover. The find produced a pair of birds. At 34, Shake was on point adjacent to the fence that blocks the course from Field Trial Road. It was determined that the bird was likely on the other side of the fence. and the handler chose not to call point or flush. The fourth find was at 42 when Shake was found standing in a piney clearing before the end of the course. The fifth find was at 51 just before the finish. By the end of the hour, Shake had scored five finds and had run a forward ground pattern with style.

The third-place dog, Mohawk Mill Knight Hawk, ran in the 17th brace of the stake. Hawk (Bingham) was braced with Saddled Up Sadie (Hughes) just before lunch on the third day of the four-day stake. He had four well-spaced finds during the hour and ran a longrange race. Hawk was handsome on point with a high head and straight 12 o'clock tail. He was found standing at 8 after a fast and forward breakaway. Sadie was backing. Both dogs advanced and ran a huge ground race, being seen crossing the front occasionally before being found standing just before the road crossing at 32. Again, Hawk had the bird, and Sadie was backing. Both dogs moved on, and Hawk was standing again at 45. At the end of a strong finish, just as time was called, he pointed his fourth bird, and the hour was over.

The judges would like to mention the impressive performances by Tenacee Franklin (Greg Isenberg) and Caird's Lefty (Sam Ridings). These dogs were cause for discussion among the judges and narrowly missed earning a placement. The 54-dog stake had many top-quality bird dogs in it.

nother great Southeastern Shooting Dog Open Championship was recently held at "The Farm" near Lake City, Florida. The trial began on Wednesday, January 15, and concluded on Sunday, January 19, 2025. The trial drew 52 entries. This club is very fortunate to have Mr. Chester Stokes as the host. Mr. "C," as referred to by those who are close to him, enjoys seeing the dogs, the horses, the people, and the BIRDS. He has given up a prime week of hunting in mid-January to help make this trial a success. The Farm consists of nearly 2000 acres of gentle rolling sandhills. The native ground cover consists of wiregrass, runner oaks, wax myrtle, and a few small palmetto patches. Overhead are Longleaf Pines, Slash Pines, and Blackjack Oaks. Large Live Oaks are found scattered about the property. This is the ideal place for a dog and handler to put on a show. The dogs had plenty of opportunities to display their

abilities, as there were well over thirty coveys of birds moved each day. Mr. "C" rode part of the time and followed the rest of the trial in his truck, except for the day he took off to Steinhatchee to take advantage of the Speckled Trout feeding frenzy. All the board members were present during the trial. This board includes six members: Chester Stokes, Don Price, Joe Hicks, Leroy Griffis, Kent Cantrell and Joel Norman.

Others who make this trial run smoothly are Rylan King and Dakota Hall. Rylan, or "Stick" as everyone calls him, mans the dog truck and does a super job with it. Dakota Hall and Leroy Griffis do the marshaling. Joe Hicks is also a valuable asset to this trial and the management of this property. Joe is the son of the late Pete Hicks and knows his way around the birddog and field trial world. It is in his DNA. We are also grateful for my better half, Tina, who continues to make sure we are fed well! We were also very fortunate to have two very qualified and attentive judges for this trial, Lane and Darcy Hodges. This couple is very competitive in the amateur field trials running under the One Day Farm banner. They are especially noted for winning the last two National Amateur Free-for-All Championships with their "One Day Queen Bee." They did a super job, and their decisions were well-received.

rin's Three Amigos, owned by Mike Sweet, John Mathys, and Jerry Moison and handled by Judd Carlton, earned the championship title under the whistle of Judd Carlton. Judd also handled Erin's Legacy to the runner-up title for beaming owner Mike Sweet. Mike was in the field for both performances and as he later said, "It was a dream come true."

The 2025 Continental Derby Championship began on January 20, 2025, amid threatening winter storm weather predictions. The famed grounds, noted for a strong population of wild quail, suffered four named hurricanes in the recent past 18 months. The last one was Helene, in the prior September. In a time when we have become desensitized to the vast damage done by Mother Nature across this country, it was devastating to see for all who know Livingston Place, aka Dixie Plantation.

Some areas are unrecognizable with the loss of trees and the lack of cover caused by the massive cleanup effort. It is amazing that the crew was able to successfully prepare the place for the Continental. It did seem that the birds had been pushed to the extreme edges of the courses and probably on into the swamps and heavy woods. Birdwork was hard to come by, but there was enough for worthy champions to be named. Numerous scouts who rode the wings witnessed coveys flushing wild some 50 yards ahead of the dogs.

With all of that said, there was a strong and worthy entry of 27 promising competitors.

Livingston Place manager John Michael McCormick should he commended for directing the massive cleanup effort that took place so that this event could happen. He was assisted by employees Ben Melvin, Vince Little, and Reese Brideau. The plantation mainstay, who has the longest history here, is Gloria Hagen. She was born here, and her mother rests in peace here.

Randy Floyd, manager here for some 32 years, has retired but maintains his position as President of the Continental Field Trial Club. In this role, he manages the trial and reports to the Field Trial Board.

All involved in this Championship owe a debt of gratitude to the men who took on this important judging assignment. Dr. Kent Cantrell of Anthony, Florida, and Woody Watson of Leesburg, Georgia rode in challenging weather conditions without complaint, cleareyed and focused to select these worthy placements. *The Winners*

The championship performance was found in the exciting effort of Erin's Three Amigos with Judd Carlton handling. Owners Mike Sweet and John Mathys were mounted to witness the performance. Missing was the third Amigo co-owner, Jerry Moisson. Three Amigos was braced RW Sweet Crude for owner Roger Watson with Gary Lester handling. As a side note, it was particularly good to see Gary competing again after his prolonged serious health emergency.

The fifth brace began at the water barrel at the end of the Long Field. Things began quickly as Lester called point at 5, but it proved to be Three Amigos who scored a good find. Carlton's charge showed well through the half, with strong casts going past the Flat Pond and southward toward the Moccasin Creek crossing.

Crude had pulled off on the right just past the half but was with us again at the crossing. At 43, Three Amigos styled up, and the birds left on their own. The Pointer stood on and looked good. We crossed the dam at Roger's Pond at 48, made the turn, and when pick-up was called, Judd had to ride for his dog.

This dog was not seen much at times, but as he continued to show out front it was obvious that he kept appearing "out there." This was through his strength and a strong desire to find game. Judd rode confidently through his dog's efforts and garnered this major victory with a most worthy performance.

It was 9:25 in the morning during the second brace as Erin's Legacy (Carlton) began his quest for his place in history. Legacy earned his runner-up championship title after a wonderful performance amid frigid temperatures on his trek toward and past the Y. He was paired with Miller's Triple Crown (Lester), and the pair stood for a wellhandled divided find at 10. Scout called point for Legacy on the right before the Gene Field. Next, flight was called, but when Judd neared his dog, he elected to take him on. We continued, and scout Luke Eisenhart called point at 21 on the left. Judd again called flight, this time confirmed by the judge, and all was good.

We regained the front at 25 near the Turkey Field, and the Carlton entry looked strong on his venture toward the Boy Scout House. He made a showy swing through that area, which held everyone's attention.

Meanwhile, Triple Crown had not maintained contact with Lester, and Gary harnessed him at the road.

Legacy made a strong cast alongside the Long Pond and swapped ends to stand attractively. He looked good, but there was only a small patch of cover, and flushing efforts resulted in an unproductive. He used the country well at the end of the Long Pond and forward until time was called. This was a strong performance with two finds and an unproductive in tough conditions. **The Running**

The first brace featured Seranoa's Ramblin' Man (McLean) and Haney's Double Down (Cagle.) Both dogs looked strong and attractive on the ground, but nothing was accomplished during the hour.

The second brace featured the runnerup champion and was described earlier.

At 10:30, on the south end of the Long Pond, Armed (Pendergest) and Rester's Knight Move (Carlton) were released for No. 3. Knight Move maintained the front in high style through the first quarter and established point in the cover near the main road crossing. All was in order. Knight Move's owners, David and Lindley Melnick, were in the dog wagon. This was their first trip to the Continental, and they were able to see their dog on point! Woody Watson, scouting for Armed, called point on the south side of the Double Ponds and suffered an unproductive. Armed continued in an erratic form, and Pendergest lifted him at 54. Knight Move had shown attractively but began to shorten on the ground and he finished without further game contact.

Black Rocks Iceman (McLean) and

Notorious Propane Jane (Mathys) began the afternoon at 2 o'clock. At 50 seconds, Jane had a find while leaving the Dove Field. Black Rocks suffered an unproductive near the hayfield, and the handler took his dog on. Neither dog was getting the job done, but as we continued, Iceman pointed several times but did not seem to have it together and was harnessed at 45. Mathys withdrew Jane near the Long Field to end the fourth brace.

The fifth brace contained the championship performance as previously described.

Nickajack Pale Rider (McLean) and Erin's Bold Ruler (Eisenhart) were in the last brace of the day. Bold Ruler's owners were present. Claudia McNamee was riding, and Dr. Bill Bruchey was in the dog wagon. Pale Rider's owner, David Freiburger, was mounted in the field. He was able to see Pale Rider have a good find at 7 near the powerline. At 12, both dogs were with us going up the edge of Lake Windom. As we turned right away from the lake edge, Pale Rider scored as McLean put a large covey to flight. At the guarter hour, Bold Ruler pointed, and Luke could not raise anything even after a relocation. When Eisenhart reached down to take his dog on, a single flew. This bird was probably a single from McLean's earlier find. We all had hopes for the well-touted Bold Ruler, but it proved not to be his day. On the crest of Hickory Hill Pale Rider suffered an empty stand but redeemed himself at the half with a good connection on a pair of birds. Rider made some good moves after this but was in the harness at 49 with his second unproductive.

The second day of the Derby found Shadow Oak New Edition (Eisenhart) on the ground with Notorious Sweet Ginger (Mathys) with temperatures just above the freezing mark. Just past the Ben's Hog Pond breakaway, Mathys called point for Ginger ahead and to the left of the course. It was a good find. On the way to the front, Ginger had a good find on the "ghost covey" just as we made the right turn toward the road crossing. At 10, New Edition had an empty stand before we got to the road crossing and was on the rope at 21. Ginger had an unproductive before the half 50 yards off the road where the first morning course and the second afternoon course overlap. She went on to tally a clean find at 47 before Cadillac Pond. She scored again at 52 on the west end of the Cadillac Field in good order. Ginger finished across the forward hayfield.

Rester's Cash'n In (Eisenhart) and Dominators Southern Beau (Daniels) broke away just south of the water barrel at Acorn Hill. Both dogs were a little handy on the way to the Y. The pair stretched out through the forward fields but Cash'n In was in the harness at 23 for infractions on game. Southern Beau finished his brace without any glamor.

We were in the Big Woods with Notorious Dominator's Reserve (Mathys) and Southern Pioneer (Lefty Henry). Pioneer had a good connection at 5 near Boyd Corner. Dominator's Reserve had a classy looking pose at 11, beautiful spot, and he did have birds. Southern Pioneer did have a good find at 5 but went on to be lost with Lefty requesting the retrieval device. Dominator's Reserve did not finish.

The 10th brace started at 1:20 and featured Haney's Top Shelf (McLean) and Dominators Rebel Mark (Daniels.) At 30, Mark's dog had an unproductive as Jamie's dog backed. Jamie threw the towel in at the road crossing below the Boy Scout house. Top Shelf had a small covey pinned near the dirt road crossing just shy of the Long Field. This was a strong find after several absences, and his efforts on the ground during the last quarter were very appealing. He finished at the next water barrel near the main road crossing.

Notorious Southern Son (Mathys) and Haney's Northern Lights (Cagle) were off at 2:29. The pair had ambitious starts through the first quarter hour. The pair stood at 17 just east of the Cadillac Pond and were staunch for the birdwork. The pair moderated in their application as we neared the office. Cagle called point at 39 as Southern Son backed, but no game was produced. At 50, we crossed the dam at Roger's Pond; the pair always seemed to be near each other. Northern Lights stood for his next birds at 54 with style in the Kudzu Hill block. The brace finished without further action.

Erin's War Eagle (Eisenhart), owned by Dr. Bruchey and Claudia McNamee, began the 12th brace as he was braced with Shagtime Bill (Cagle.) Bill is a Setter male. Cagle called point near Cocklebur Bottom at 4 as War Eagle honored. The stand was empty even after relocation.

The pair went on to show well and to the front on through Ben's Hog Pond. At the next field, Luke flushed a nice covey for War Eagle, the birds some 25 yards out in front of the attractive Pointer; manners were impeccable.

Past the right turn into the scrub oaks Bill nailed a nice covey with all in order. He went on to finish in the big field south of the office.

It was 3 o'clock as Erin's Redemption (Mathys) and Erin's Copper Colt (Carlton) were loosed in No. 13. Just as we made the turn at the water barrel at Boyd Corner, Mathys called point on the right as Carlton called point on the left. Mathys had a find, and Judd suffered an empty stand. Back at the front by the quarter hour. At 27, between the Double Ponds, Copper Colt stood attractively for a covey.

Copper Colt got to the crossing into the Long Field. He was the first dog that had this course to use this field as it should be used. He took the right edge, hunted ahead halfway down, stopped, made a few steps toward his handler, turned back, and continued on the right edge to the far end of the field. He reached the road crossing at 56 and went on to finish in fine form.

The 14th brace was to be T's Cash-Slinger as a bye-dog, but he was scratched. This ended the Derby.



NGSPA Savannah River Open Shooting Dog Championship

The NGSPA Savannah River Open Championship started on Sunday, February 2, at 8 a.m. and ended on Monday, February 3. The weather was beautiful, but a little warm in the afternoon for the dogs. Nineteen dogs were brought to the line in this year's Open stake. Thank you to our pros who supported this stake: Joe Orndorff, Dan and April DiMambro, and Jason King. Judges were Ms. Lisa Pollock from Lucas, Iowa, and Mr. Bill Haynes of South Vienna, Ohio. We appreciate your expertise and time in the saddle.

The 2025 NGSPA Savannah River Open champion is Macke's Jax Black Label ("Jax"), owned by Katelyn and Abe Macke, handled by Dan DiMambro, and scouted by April DiMambro. Jax ran in the 10th brace.

This year's Open runner-up champion is Two Ponds Blanco Roux ("Roux"), owned by Jason Brooks, handled by Dan DiMambro, and scouted by April DiMambro. Roux ran in the 6th brace.

The Running

1—"Raider" (DiMambro) and "Mike" (Orndorff) broke away at 8:05 a.m., heading into the cornfield. Both dogs made big casts on the far west edge. As we crossed the road, Mike was out of pocket but showed by the pond by camp. Raider shortened somewhat in the heavy cover. Mike went missing again before we crossed the road, and the tracker was called for by the Biscuit Barn.

2—"Sonny" (King) and "Layla" (Orndorff) broke away in the piney woods heading east. Layla often disappeared to the front but always showed far to the front after absences. Sonny had a shorter race with an unproductive at 45. The tracker was called for at time for Layla; she was found standing 100 yds ahead.

3—"Tuskie" (Orndorff) and "Rommel" (DiMambro) broke away by the pond on the north side. Both dogs had a strong breakaway. Rommel was spotted on an edge two fields away, heading on course. Tuskie shortened in the woods and went on point at 13. She was sent on after a relocation; no birds produced. Rommel had a nice covey find at 19 and went missing after he was turned loose.

4—"Rio" (DiMambro) and "Ruger" (King) broke away from camp at 1:30 p.m. Rio showed well on the west edge of the cornfield. Both dogs searched the likely bird locations around the cornfield, but neither was rewarded. Rio was wide to the left around the pond but gathered and sent out again at the road crossing. Both dogs finished to the front, but no birdwork to report.

5—"Huck" (DiMambro) and "Libby" (Orndorff) broke away on Course 2 and were quickly to the front. Point was called for Libby at 20, but it was on deer and armadillo. Both went missing, and trackers were called for at 30.

6—"Roux" (DiMambro) broke away at 2:45 p.m. Roux was snappy to watch and always up front. She pointed at 6, but no birds were located. At 16, while the handler was riding wide right, the gallery spotted Roux standing tall off to the right. A nice covey lifted as we approached, all in order. At 25, Roux was found standing again, but no birds were located after several relocation attempts. Roux finished the hour and was found standing to the front at time.

7—"Boone" (King) and "Johnny" (Orndorff) began at 8 a.m., but after 20 minutes, the brace was suspended due to fog. After almost an hour and a half delay, we resumed. Boone had a nonproductive at 37, and Johnny had one at 48. Boone was picked up before the hour.

8—"Uno" (Orndorff) and "Brutus" (King) spent much of the brace hunting together. Uno went wide and took some time to be gathered. Upon return, she shortened but finished the hour with no birdwork. They shortened at the end of the hour with no birds.

9—"Rumor" (Orndorff) and "Gus" (DiMambro) started with a great race. At 10, they had a divided stop-to-flush at the end of the pond. Rumor's race shortened and did not have any other bird contact. Gus had a very busy hour. He had a good find at 15, an absence due to deer, and trouble with a few armadillos. He finished the hour with a stop to flush at 59.

10—"Gunner" (King) and "Jax" (DiMambro) used the big cornfield edges in an efficient manner. At 20, point was called for Jax before the road crossing, all in order, and he was sent forward. Both dogs were always strong to the front—very impressive patterns for these two young dogs.

Due to a lack of entries this year, we only ran a Shooting Dog stake. We invite everyone to attend this Wild Bird Championship at Showtime Plantation in February 2026.

42nd U. S. COMPLETE NATIONAL OPEN SHOOTING DOG CHAMPIONSHIP Smoke Rise Jake Named Champion; Mohawk Mill Knight Hawk, Runner-up

■ ince 2018, the U. S. Complete Shooting Dog Association has held its National Open Shooting Dog Championship on the prestigious state grounds known as J. Robert Gordon Field Trial Area in Hoffman, North Carolina. These grounds host walking, horseback shooting dog, and all-age trials from October through March. The state provides a dog wagon with 16 vented cages under an elevated people carrier. Although the ride is not necessarily comfortable, it does allow folks to see much of each brace. The dog wagon driver picks up the dogs needed for the three hours and returns them before lunch or after the afternoon braces. Breakaway is at 8 a.m. and 1:15 p.m. daily so that spectators can join the troop. After the first two years of running at Hoffman, the committee decided to start Course

1 below the clubhouse halfway through the horseback Course 1. The afternoon courses begin behind the barn, this year right at the barn instead of the traditional end of the piney woods area. The courses have water and manmade water holes, a few brook crossings, and always water on the dog wagon. There are horse stalls in the barn and outside corals, dog kennels, power for electrical hook-up, and running water in several areas.

Let me share a little history of our well-known field trial area: In early 1968, the Wildlife Commission proposed a ten-year development plan for 950 of these sandhill acres. About 87 acres of these blocks were within the 31-mile planned planted strips. The first trial was held in 1954, which precipitated the completion of plans for a barn and circular dog kennels in 1955.

By 1970, the NC Wildlife Commission had expressed that the area had developed a favorable environment and wanted to attract more outsiders. They set out to promote the hosting of national and large regional events. In 1971, additional dog kennels were built, and horse corrals and water were made easily available. In 2022, with outside funding, the NC Wildlife staff erected red horse corrals where water is readily available. Additional electrical outlets were also installed.

In the '70s, wild quail had declined, and the field trial association petitioned the NC Wildlife Commission to allow the release of quail in the fall before the field trial season begins. The trial schedule is decided in July at the summer association meeting, with trials

held from October through the end of March. As of July 2023, the number of days trials may be held each year is 16. With the cooperation of the NC Wildlife's area staff, the grounds are kept mowed, roads kept passable, and water holes are maintained. The NCFTA is responsible for purchasing and releasing of quail in September. The association purchased a tractor and added a new spreader in 2024 so that the birds could be fed and water would be provided. Since 1981, quail have been released and watched over at the Hoffman Field Trial grounds.

The 1985 plan introduced improved seed crops by the state, with the NCFTA adjusting its feeding program to augment the planted crops. The clearing and maintaining of courses was continued, as were five-year plans for burning. The Redheaded Woodpecker was also part of the 1985 plan to preserve trees where woodpeckers were making their homes. Visitors will see white-painted bans on trees; these are woodpecker protection trees.

In the early 2000s, an additional loop was added to the acres behind the clubhouse. Some folks called it the Dr. Bill Andrews Loop or Naked Creek Loop, Course 6. Early trials were all walking, regardless of the dog's range. As time progressed, horseback was introduced. Today, the grounds attract walking, horseback shooting, and allage events. Each group is appreciative of the birds and courses good for all bird dogs. During the 2025 championship, 47 coveys were counted, plus probably some others not noted or reported by scouts for the count.

There are six fairly equal courses, all well marked where to begin or end. In 2021, the state put up road signs on main dirt roads to allow folks to get around better. Three courses begin in front of the clubhouse and finish three hours later behind the clubhouse. Three more courses begin behind the barn and traverse in a loop to cross near the clubhouse in about an hour and 45 minutes before setting out on the loop, ending an hour later behind the clubhouse. Each weekend, clubs alternate a.m. and p.m. courses starting place.

No quail hunting has been allowed since the beginning of field trials on these NC State Wildlife grounds. However, this is a large area, and many hunters have not taken the time to read the wildlife handbook, so violations have occurred. The local game wardens cover a large area and have limited success finding those in violation. The NC Wildlife staff has stepped up to assist in solving this problem. Large orange signs with bold lettering are being posted, indicating NO HUNTING. Additional signs concerning vehicle traffic are placed on key access roads. The clubhouse has a posted list of game wardens and wildlife staff to assist trialers in reporting any violations they observe. It is recommended that photographing the license plate is very helpful.

The U. S. Complete Walking Shooting Dog Association was founded in 1981 by Robert Lee, Jack Myrick, and Gerald Shaw. Their combined talents made the organization a success. In 1983, the American Field awarded the group a championship. Since Ted Riley proposed and worked to bring the championship to Hoffman, it has remained and grown each year. Anyone wanting to join us or learn more about the U. S. Complete organization should visit our website for rules and expectations.

The most difficult job in any trial, especially a championship, is serving as a judge. This year, two experienced bird dog people served. Tim McClurg from Ohio also resides in North Carolina for the winter, where he trains and shows his Pointers. Tim had agreed to fill in when the posted judge had suffered a horseback fall resulting in broken ribs. Past U. S. Complete Association president Ashby Morgan from Virginia served as the other judge.

Purina and Garmin are very supportive sponsors for the U. S. Complete National Open Championship. Purina funds are also used to assist with daily hot lunches prepared by John and Gretchen Adsit. The Adsits spend six months in Vermont and six months in North Carolina. They, too, have bird dogs.

The 2025 championship drew 58 dogs this year and 13 derbies. On Friday evening, there was a catered dinner by Fred Rose in honor of last year's winner, Smoke Rise Jake. Tony Bingham is his handler. It is with pleasure that I announce his winning this 42nd running, and we can expect another great dinner in 2026. Thanks, Fred. A Purina-sponsored dinner was held for handlers and community bird dog folks on Saturday evening. As you can see, we do eat well at Hoffman. The birds were plentiful, the company enjoyable, and with bird dog stories long, you need to plan to join the group in February 2026.

The Winners

Six-year-old Pointer Smoke Rise Jake once again bested the field of 58 entries to obtain the title. Owners Fred Rose and Mary were in the gallery to watch. Jake covered every inch of Course 2 with speed and determination. Jake is a large, framed male whose powerful ground attack is consistent from start to finish. Jake stood proudly and tall for a perfect covey rise at 6. By 16, the course climbs a rather steep hill, crosses an open area, and traverses through a piney woods area. Here, Jake checked with the handler, gulped a little water, and continued around the course with plenty of drive, covering all areas known to harbor birds. The championship's most "picture-perfect find" was caught on video at 47. As the group approached the candy tree area, Jake was found standing to the right of the course. He had to stand for a long time as handler Bingham approached. The heavily loaded wagon held their breath as they watched Jake, with Bob's Elhew Sage, coming out of the field to the left and stopping to back. A wonderful sight! Bingham attempted to flush well into the wooded area. When no birds were found, he was returning to Jake when he stepped in the right spot, and a large covey burst into the air, fluttering skyward and horizontality while both dogs stood staunch and proud. With only three minutes left, Jake reached the knoll to take him down a small hill, handler heavy on the whistles, encouraging him to finish with strength and continued drive. He finished going away.

The runner-up spot went to Mohawk Mill Knight Hawk, PM, owned by Gary and Ellen Winall, under the whistle of Tony Bingham. Coming from the 17th brace, Mohawk Mill Knight Hawk covered a lot of ground in quick time. He and his bracemate were frequently watered to keep them in line with the heat. He seemed to roll forward and on reaching for the elusive quail. Mohawk Mill Knight Hawk was found firmed up at 40, well versed in field trial manners; he stood patiently waiting flush as bracemate backed. Mohawk Mill Knight Hawk's bird contact had charged his spirit as he began casting further and further. When time was called, he was well to the front and required a mounted scout to return him to the truck.

The judges also noted that they had carried Low Country Katie, PF, owned and handled by Steve Ferrell; Saddled Up Sadie, PF, owned by Joe Cammisa with Mark Hughes; Smoke Rise Bull, PM, owned by Fred Rose with Tony Bingham; and Erin's Battle Cry, PM, owned and handled by Dennis and Hope Beauford.

The Running

Brace 1 gathered behind the barn on Course 4 and awaited a blessing by Greg Robinson. Following a welcome by cochairman Dave Huffine, the brace was announced and whistled off.

Cow Creek Redbud, PF, with Tony Bingham, was on the line with Can Am Cooper, PM, and Jamie Leitch. Cow Creek Redbud left the line with ample speed, crossed to the right, and marched forward. Once reaching the end of these piney woods, he was out of sight, and despite calls from the handler and a scout sent, the handler took his recovery device at 30 minutes. Can Am Cooper was forward, quartering a little, and then moved on course as expected. By 10 minutes, both handlers had rounded the corner, where Can Am stopped and joined the flush as a covey lifted.

The second brace was on the ground by 8:45, this time Adam Dubriske with a young ESM, Pool Brook Dobby. His Bracemate was Low Country Katie, PF, with owner/handler Steve Ferrell. Dobby toured the course with an animated, snappy gait. Although he hunted in many of the right areas, he was unable to locate quail. Steve Ferrell had a fun hour with Low Country Katie as she searched woods and fields. Following a brief absence, she returned at 20. Katie stood at 24; however, no birds were flown despite a good flushing attempt. This did not distract Katie, and she moved forward smoothly, crossing at a good distance before skirting the wooded edge. She scored a nice find at 32 and a second find at 45.

Following a welcomed coffee break, especially by all riding the wagon feeling a brisk breeze, not to mention those mounted on horse, brace No. 3 was released. Bingham had My Way Little Bud, PM, and Brian Ralph with his PM, Ralphy's Chasehill Rip. Little Bud had tightly laced sneakers and was not seen after the opening two minutes. Chasehill Rip had a good hunting race, remaining strong on the ground for his hour. He stood solid and sharp on a nice covey find at 53. All in order for wing and shot.

Lunch in the clubhouse was ready at noon, with an afternoon breakaway announced for 1:15. The afternoon course starts below the clubhouse where Course 1 crosses Nursery Lane Road. Dave Huffine had his Sweet Grass Skeeter, ESM, as bracemate for Kelly's Rainbow Roy, ESM, with Mark Hughes. This pair of light-colored Setters marched up the slight hill, with Skeeter casting to the left, while Rainbow Roy checked out the waving grasses before being cautioned by his handler and snapping into a forward march. Sweet Grass Skeeter applied himself to the woods, making casts along the field edges. He, unfortunately, had a nonproductive at 12 and again at 50. He and his bracemate were classy running Setters with forward casts, Roy a little more handier than Skeeter's in-and-out sweeping casts.

Brace No. 5 was filled by Frank Joyal and his PF, Once In A Bluemoon, and Mark Hughes, with PF, Saddled Up Sadie. Blue Moon is an orange and white well-structured female and wore a bell. Saddled Up Sadie is a liver and white female with a light body. Both dogs were stylish and determined in their casts. Bluemoon scored a nice find on the far side of the plum thicket at 12. All in order. Handler Joyal kept his dog along the field and wood line where he had found quail. The two handlers got separated during Bluemoon's find; when the dog reached the front, co-handler Hughes offered the dog water. The dog then returned to his handler, Joyal. Bluemoon was affected by the heat and shortened his range, although he never stopped hunting. Saddled Up Sadie ran a classy forward race with a consistent pattern and range. She handled well for Mark, scoring one very large covey at 47. Her last 10 minutes were spent hunting.

The final brace of the day called Neo, a very white ESM owned and handled by David Theroux. His bracemate was Mohawk Mill War Hawk, PM, with Tony Bingham. Neo was never far from his handler as he hunted the course. He was somewhat spiral from the center of course before stretching to the front and returning for a repeat. He found his own much-needed water along the course. He backed his bracemate at 33. Handler Theroux walked up a covey of birds on his way to stand by his backing dog. Mohawk Mill War Hawk had a long absence early on, and then the scout called point at 33 in the woods. No birds were flown, and the dog did not relocate well. By 50, handler Bingham called for the locating device.

Day two dawned slightly foggy after a brief period of rain the preceding night. The judges called for brace No. 7 to be released after a blessing with Sweet Grass Slim, ESM, with owner and handler Dave Huffine was braced with Millers Dusty Version, PF, owned by Mike Husenits, with Mark Hughes answering the command. This pair were briskly through the piney woods behind the barn and rounded the corner between plumthick brush and a wide, thick, and tall broom straw area. At 5, birds were seen rising above the brush and grass, both dogs in the vicinity. When the handlers arrived, Slim was standing, although ticking, and Millers Dusty Version was accused of not backing as he passed near Slim. Dusty Version was taken to the truck, and Slim continued his hour swinging happily around the course at a good range. Slim stopped at 18, although not showing a positive location as he loosened up. He was tapped on by his handler for a relocation with no success. A second nice find was recorded for Slim at 40. However, with only three minutes left, his hour came to an end when another nonproductive was recorded. A long flushing attempt and relocation ended his hour.

Brace No. 8 found A Distant Spec, PF, owned by Mike Husenits with Mark Hughes, and Smoke Rise Bull, PM, owned by Fred Rose with Tony Bingham. The pair started forward through the cover with Bull on the left and Spec on beating a straight path toward the road crossing. The gallery heard a shot ring out at 3. This shot was taken for Bull by Bingham. Shortly after, well to the front, point was called for Spec, who was found proudly standing among small scrub saplings. Unfortunately, no birds were found at this 5-minute mark. The pair of dogs skirted the field and were down wide mowed paths as they stayed to the front with high scores in style. At 12, Spec stopped, and Bull backed. However, no quail were located, and Spec was returned to the truck. Bull

continued his hunting and was given water several times, with the temps rising as the morning fog had lifted. Bull suffered a nonproductive at 51. While the group enjoyed a break with snacks, coffee, and water, two horses decided that wandering away was better than ground tying. Cliff Monroe quickly mounted his scout horse and galloped after the horses. Cliff returned with one horse and reported that the second had continued rapidly toward the clubhouse. (He was later found beside his trailer.)

Finally, at 10:45, Quickmarksman's Dan, PM, owned by Mike Hester, although with Adam Dubriske today as bracemate for Smoke Rise Doc, PM, another owned by Fred Rose with Tony Bingham, were collared, judges given location devices, and dogs unleased. When the whistles sounded, the dogs were independent across the grass and up the slight hill in the area. Doc ran at a moderate range while Dan hunted at a distant range. At about 20, both dogs were beyond the area adjacent to Derby Road, and everyone could relax. As the wagon turned, we could see the pair running in tandem past "Jacobs Corner" toward Bear Claw. Something seemed amiss as the pair were tagging along. Doc acted as if Dan were a female ready to be bred. The dogs were separated and watered. Dan was taken to the left and turned free. Doc was also watered and taken to the far right; however, nothing changed with Doc racing to Dan and pinning him on the ground. Doc was leashed, and Dan returned to hunting. Dan continued hunting forward satisfactorily, stopping at 40 and then moving in before the handler arrived, and a covey fluttered skyward out of the plum thick shelter. The next 30 minutes was a ride back to the clubhouse, where hamburger pie was awaiting us. With everyone full, the wagon was loaded, maybe even overloaded, dogs put in dog boxes, and the mounted gallery went down to the breakaway where, by 1:35, we were once again under way in search of quail.

Lincoln County Buddy Boy, PM, owned and trained by Gary Whitworth, was with Tony Bingham paired up with Henry's Suzie Q Dot, ESF, owned and handled by David Theroux. Wasting no time, brace No. 10 saw both dogs rapidly up the path and out of sight. Dot quickly turned to the left at the top of the hill while Buddy Boy marched straight on. We saw very little of Buddy Boy, catching a brief glimpse at 17 down over the lower right edge. Shortly thereafter, he was checking with the handler more frequently in search of water; however, with temperatures near 70, the handler elected to return him to the wagon. On the other hand, Dot ran a snappy race, increasing her range and determination as her hour progressed. Dot's frequent check-in with the handler allowed her to be watered frequently, plus having some water in this area of the course was helpful. She showed no distraction from the heat; however, she located no birds.

Brace No. 11 had Miller's Hopped Up Version, PF, owned by Carlos Escalante with Mark Hughes and Margie Ridings with their family-owned PM, Georgia Born Windstorm. By this time, the temperatures were well into the low 70s, resulting in hot, dry sand. Windstorm ranged forward up each small hill and cast to the right into the woods. At 20, she emerged from the cover to pass the wagon. She was leased at 26, with the heat snapping her energy. Miller's Hopped Up Version covered the ground with a brisk gait, although he came in frequently for water. She had a nice find at 33 as we approached the soldier's camp; however, as birds flushed, she turned and marked their flight. This was too much when she gave a few hops as well.

As the wagon passes by the soldier's camp area, many spectators get off and walk a short distance to the clubhouse. Today, many folks chose to walk back and head home early. Brace No. 12 would end the day with Aristotle, ESM, owned by John Fort, with Calvin Curnutte and bracemate The Treasure Chest, PM, owned and handled by Cliff Monroe. Both dogs were quickly forward; however, Treasure Chest continued on independently charged in her hunting tour; consequently, a retrieval device was put into action at 34. Aristotle is a very large white Setter with a strong athletic gait. He ran with an eye-catching, classy style. Despite the high temperatures this afternoon, he maintained a solid power on the ground. He required some scouting and took

some water; however, he maintained a stretching gait unaffected by the heat. He went birdless.

The day got off to a poor start with Smoke Rise Hanna, PF, with Tony Bingham, whose owner, Fred Rose, was present to observe. Jimmy Crandall had his PM, Jake The Joker, as bracemate. The pair were eagerly forward to reach the open area beyond the piney woods area behind the barn. As the two turned right, their paths were obscured by the plum brush. It appeared the pair had gotten into a little foot race as two sets of paw prints were found in the sand road crossing at 16, and no dogs had been seen since the corner. With scouts riding wide in search of their charges, handlers continued calling and walking. At 26, both handlers took their retrieval devices. (The scout reported one dog standing under plumthick and the other dog returning on its own, albeit a little late.)

Brace No. 14 followed with an enthusiastic crowd undampened by the brief race. The gallery had 12 mounted riders and eight riders on top of the dog wagon, all followed by several trucks. Super Storm Cliff, ESM, owned by Mike Rosano, was here to watch Adam Dubriske guide his hunting trip. His bracemate was Double Deuce Zeke, PM, belonging to Doug McMillen and handled by Mark Hughes. Cliff is an orange and white Setter who guartered at a good range and proper speed, his merry tail always visible. At 5, he had a nonproductive, with a lengthy relocation attempt failing before he was tapped on. As he made his way through the thick cover before the brook, he stood and waited for the handler to flush one lone quail as his bracemate had just passed through and had a covey flown by his handler. When Cliff became overly cautious, stopping and starting, selfrelocating, he was picked up. Double Deuce Zeke moved with a consistent pattern, showing plenty of motion as he checked out all the appropriate spots to locate quail. He had one nice covey pinned on the hillside adjacent to the brook at 22. He ran a nice race and had that one find, but judges did not like that the handler had taken his dog on at one point where judges thought the dog had been pointing.

Brace No. 15 was a moving brace, which took us to the clubhouse in time for lunch. Cairds Lefty, PM, owned by the Ridings and handled by Sam Ridings today, was braced with ESM, Emert's Grouse Ringer T, owned and handled by Daryl Grantham. Each of these dogs covered the ground in front of the judges with a pleasing motion at a good hunting range in a windshield-wiper pattern. Lefty has recovered from a serious health issue but showed that he still loves to hunt and be a strong player in the field trial game. Ringer T executes his casts at a wider range, nevertheless moderate in range and fancy moving. Neither dog had any bird contact.

Brace No. 16 started at the bottom of the hill below the clubhouse off Nursery Lane Road. At the sound of the whistle, the pair appeared to have been blasted from a cannon, with both dogs rounding the top of the slight knoll and disappearing out of sight. These two were Pinekone Rappatomac Hawk, ESM, owned and handled by Jimmy Crandall, and Miller's Special Upgrade, PF, owned by Carlos Escalante, with Mark Hughes. Obviously, neither dog completed their hour, although Special Upgrade did have a nonproductive at 30.

At 2:37, brace No. 17 called Sweet Grass Skipper, ESM, owned and handled by Dave Huffine as bracemate for Mohawk Mill Knight Hawk, PM, with Tony Bingham. (Mohawk Mill Knight Hawk is covered under winners). These two dogs covered a lot of ground quickly, with power on the ground as they dug into the cover in search of quail. Both handlers gave water to their dogs at 12 before releasing them to return to their hunting role. At 35, the dogs cast to the lower side of the long field with a slight hill in the middle seeming nothing to the pair, although a warm jaunt to the handlers. A small covey lifted as Skipper spiritedly raced across the field to join his bracemate, Mohawk Mill Knight Hawk, for a back. Skipper was returned to the truck.

The final brace of this third day before the much-anticipated handlers' dinner set for 6:30 found Backwoods Wild Fire Blaze, PM, owned by Justin Mason, with Mark Hughes as bracemate for Georgia Born Braveheart, PM, owned by Sam and Margie Ridings, with Margie handling. Both dogs went directly to work in a moderate hunting pattern, checking many probable spots; however, not finding anything to point ranged out a little wider. Both dogs showed good style and good range. At 14, both were off to the left, checking a double football field area of deep and high grasses adjacent to two very large, long-leaf pines. Hughes called point as Braveheart was heading in his direction. Braveheart did not back, perhaps distracted by a brave redtail hawk who had been following the trial party. The hawk was seen to have landed in the big pine and then to divebomb to the grounds and snatch a quail before flying to another tree at the forest edge. As the hawk swooped down, a huge covey lifted with Braveheart now collared and Backwoods Wild Fire Blaze still standing. This had been a wildlife adventure, as usually seen on a wildlife discovery program; however, we all got to see it firsthand. AWSUM! Braveheart was returned to the wagon, while Wild Fire Blaze went on hunting with exaggerated speed, although keeping a close proximity to the handler. He scored a second find at 47 with all in order.

As we gathered on Sunday morning, we were all a bit apprehensive as the weatherman was predicting sun, heat, and possible showers, all demons for the field trialer and his dog.

Brace No. 19 started with a small morning gallery to watch Knight's Last Chipster, PM, owned and handled by Dennis Beauford, and bracemate Tenacee Rowdy, PM, with Greg Isenberg. These two dogs darted forward, passing straight into the large area of tall grasses. By 5, the handlers and judges had reached the corner, and judges spotted both dogs standing with only

heads and tails seen. Birds were flushed as a divided find. Everything was in order, so the group moved on. Chipster checked in a few times while moving forward with an animated, albeit spiral, pattern. During these 20 minutes, Rowdy was living up to his name by not checking back in until 18. Unfortunately, the weather affected their performance today, causing inconsistent hunting. Chipster obediently scored a back at 37 and 45; however, he missed the scent of quail approaching the nearly dry water hole, his hour ending early. Rowdy had unproductives at 37 and 45, preventing 60-minute performances.

Joining the bid for a championship was Hirollins All American, ESM, owned and handled by Warren Parrott with PM, Meghan's Special Edition, owned by Meghan and Travis Riggs with Sam Ridings handling.

Brace No. 20 found both dogs quickly into admirable hunting patterns at appropriate ranges. Hirollins All American's speedy forward race began to change, and despite the handler watering several times, he was returned to the wagon at 43. Following an absence, Special Edition was offered water again, although, by 47, he was also returned to the wagon.

Brace No. 21 called another of the Ridings' dogs to the line, this time with Georgia Born Apache Wind, PM, owned and handled by Sam Ridings. Bracemate was Attitude's Night Train, PM, owned and handled by Dennis Beauford. On the ground, these two dogs maintained a good cadence with diversity in the woods and some through the tall waving amber grasses. The course crosses Firetower Road and travels west along Derby Road toward the Jacobs' winter residence before turning right, rounding the traditional bear claw area (now often referenced as Jacob's Corner). With Apache Wind casting well to the front, Night Train had to catch the front after being a little difficult to turn at the bear claw corner. (Thanks to Dave Hughes for driving Derby Road edge to prevent dogs from getting onto the blacktop where traffic can be dangerous). Apache had a nonproductive at 35 with a back at 53. His manners failed a little here, and he was taken to the truck. Night Train

ran a good ground race, some in the woods and some in the grass, although seen from a distance most of the time. With 8 minutes to go, Night Train stood to await the handler to flush his game; however, when quail lifted, he went with the quail as they flushed.

Brace No. 22 called Daryl Grantham to the line with his ESM, Lincoln County Jack, as bracemate for PM Tenacee Franklin with Greg Isenberg. Jack's long stride did not hold up in the heat today despite being given water. Handler elected to pick him up early. Tenacee Franklin had a strong forward race, maintaining a consistent pace in the heat. He, unfortunately, had unproductives at 31 and 51.

Beaver Meadow Bit, PF, owned by Joe Cammisa, with Mark Hughes, comprised brace No. 23 with Roger McPherson's PF, Suemac's Wicked Sister under the whistle of Tony Bingham. These two dogs stretched their legs from the start, Beaver Meadow Bit having possible birdwork at 17; however, nothing was flown, and Bit raced onward, requiring the retrieval device as we approached the soldier's camp. Suemac's Wicked Sister was equally evasive, allowing us to get a glimpse here and there; however, she, too, needed a retrieval device to be returned to the truck.

*Handler Bingham took the tracker and borrowed a horse from owner McPherson. After 45 minutes, he had not returned, and a truck was sent to check on him as he was in the next brace, and the dog was also in the truck. With no success and time ticking on, the judges called the day's running, and the gallery was divided into groups to locate Bingham. EMS was notified that there might be a problem; however, just within the two-hour limit, the handler and dog returned. The swamp had prevented them from a speedy or safe return.

Brace No. 24 was ready at 8 a.m. with Santee River Pawley Girl, PF, owned by Mike McKenny, with Tony Bingham, and Mulberry Fields Molly, SF, owned by Norm Meeder, with Mark Hughes, all eager to get started on Sunday morning. Pawley Girl checked in at 7 and was found standing at 12. The handler failed to produce quail, and she did not

relocate. When tapped on, she was out of sight and seen only after a retrieval device located her at 39. Mulberry Fields Molly is a small, mostly white Setter with lots of punch. She bounces through the cover, whether tall grasses or the 2 feet scrub oaks. She was picked up at 43 after she pointed, stopped, selfrelocated, and repeated the process without solidly pointing to indicate game.

Brace No. 25 was a good race for dogs with a gallery watching. Doodle Ridge Elroy, ESM, owned by Bruce Mueller, was under the whistle of Mark Hughes and Erin's Battle Cry, PM, owned by Hope and Dennis Beauford with Tony Bingham. This 9:20 breakaway had two very competitive dogs, with animated and stylish movement at a good range, as they flew through areas where birds should have been waiting. The pair were released beyond a nearly dry water hole and were found standing forward several fields away, both in the amber tall grass for a divided find. Doodle Ridge Elroy is a very white setter who shows his excitement with leaps and bounds, stopping at 26 for another well-located find. Erin's Battle Cry reached out and forward, standing at 26 for a back and then returning to his hunting trip through the scrub oak trees that carpet the ground under the longleaf pines. At 56, while Doodle was being watered, it was noted that Battle Cry was missing. When his hour ended, he still had a few minutes to be located, which he was. The judge recorded that the dog had been found standing well to the front—a covey was with him.

Brace No. 26 found Cliff Monroe with My Way Coal Train, PM, owned by J. D. Waters, as bracemate for West Wind Big Jake, PM, owned by Gerry and Jane Mercatoris with Mark Hughes. Coal Train was briefly with us, although his hour ended when he was returned to the wagon via the use of a retrieval device. Big Jake had a close-ranging, although very animated, race. At 32, he had a stop to flush and a return walk to the dog truck.

Brace No. 27 was another exciting hour filled by Bob's Elhew Sage, PF, owned and handled by Bobby Phillips, and braced with Smoke Rise Jake, PM, handled by Tony Bingham. (Smoke Rise Jake covered with the winners). Sage is a small-framed female who flies through the cover with purpose and determination, with a gait that catches your eye. She was seen at a distance, making everyone look closely to determine who was who. At 16, the course climbs a rather steep hill, crosses an open area, and then traverses through a piney woods area. At 18, in these piney woods, Jake took some water while Sage made her way forward on the left, deep in the woods. She pointed; however, no birds were flown. With only three minutes left, the dogs reached the knoll to take them down a small hill, their handlers heavy on their whistles, encouraging them to finish with strength and continued drive. Both dogs finished going away with both handlers and judges smiling.

Brace No. 28 called for Mooselook Texas Star, PM, owned by Jack McNulty, was with Adam Dubriske as bracemate with Mohawk Mill Shake Up, PM, owned by Gary and Ellen Winall and handled by Cliff Monroe and Tony Bingham. The air was cooler on this final day; therefore, these dogs were eager to be free of their cages after five days, as evident in their spirited launch off the breakaway. A real nice breakaway that was topped by Mohawk Mill Shake Up pointing at 8, with Mooselook Texas Star backing. All in order for wing and shot allowed both to be taken on. The pair hunted independently, ranging well with animation and ease of handling. Water was given to the pair a couple of times, Moose checking for some at about 50 near the wagon. At 54, Shake Up had a nonproductive after a change of handlers.

The final brace was filled by Blue

Water Reb, PM, owned by Tom McCluskey, although handled by Daryl Grantham today. His bracemate was Braggabull, PF, with Mark Hughes. Dogs were on the ground and into a hunting mode immediately. Blue Water Reb made game a few times before stopping at 26, where he had an unproductive. He did not complete his hour. Braggabull moved as the veteran she is, although she did not complete her hour with bird contact.

Haney's All In Wins Open All-Age

The West Tennessee Field Trial Club hosted its Open All-Age and Open Derby stakes February 14-17, 2025, with 30 all-age and 25 derby entries. The warm, familylike atmosphere and hospitality, for which the club is renowned, prevailed throughout, and two nights of wicked rain and wind did not hamper the running staying on schedule.

Haney's All In, owned by Steve and Stacey Croy and handled by Mark McLean, won first place in the Open All-Age stake. The twin brother owners were present to enjoy their Pointer's win. Second place was won by Valor's Lace and Grace, an English Setter owned by Ray Carter and handled by Korry Rinehart. World Class High Def, owned by John Kumpeter and handled by Patrick Siebels, was the third-place Open All-Age winner.

Beeler's Master Design, owned by Gordy Jones from Utah and handled by Ike Todd, was the first-place winner in the Derby stake. Jones was present throughout the running, accompanied by his daughter, Elsie, and her friend, Sophie Robbins. The second-place derby was Miller's Triple Crown, owned by Al Bryson and handled by Korry Rinehart. Third place was won by Seranoa's Ramblin' Man, owned by Alex and Bryana Rickert and handled by Mark McLean.

Jim Lawless from Sparta, Illinois, and Mark Haynes from Brownsville, Tennessee, judged both stakes. Lawless was accompanied by his wife, Kay Morrison, who celebrated her birthday while in Tennessee. Haynes' wife, Gail, renowned for her culinary skills and wonderful restaurant, joined the evening festivities.

Purina was again the primary sponsor of this long-running event, and their generosity was acknowledged and much appreciated.

The West Tennessee clubhouse is on land owned by Bill Currie and Allen Currie. The brothers are the fifth generation of their family to own the land, which has passed through the Edwards lineage of the paternal grandmother. In addition to the Currie land, several other owners of the adjoining land permit the three one-hour courses used by the club to traverse across their farms. Those owners include Skip Taylor, Mrs. Jan McCloud, Dr. Gene Spiotta Jr., Ed and Alice McClanahan, Gordy Jones, Larry and Janeal Humber, Ike and Marty Todd, and Alex and Bryana Rickert.

Stalwart members of the club were on hand continuously to take care of all the work of hosting the trial and taking care of their guests. They hauled dogs and horses, cooked meals, marshaled on the courses, kept the clubhouse comfortable, and stoked the fire, among many other things. Those members included Bill Currie, Allen Currie, J P Hathcock, Chris Mullin, Crutcher Stoots, Ike and Marty Todd, and Gary Brown. The efforts of the club members were complemented by a low country boil provided by the Croy brothers, shrimp stew prepared by Gene Spiotta III, and breakfast prepared by Marty Todd.

All-Age Winners

Haney's All In won the All-Age stake with his strong 13th brace performance. After being gone a short while on the first hour course, Mark McLean had him in sight and running a true all-age race. He scored his first find at 20, backed his bracemate at 25, and achieved a second find at 43. He ran the course independently with strength and style and ended the hour with a strong finish. Steve and Stacey Croy enjoyed watching and were very pleased with their winner's performance.

Valor's Lace and Grace placed second. She backed her bracemate at 11. Then, at 25, she handled the situation well, which initially appeared to be an unproductive. Yet after Rinehart remounted, she immediately pointed again, and birds were flushed. She then had a find at 33 in pines near Gordy Jones place. Then she finished the hour on the Todds' land, where she ran the large wheat and corn fields fast and well.

Third place was won by High Def. He had a find at 21 and looked good on both the point and flush. He ran well and ended the hour with a strong finish to cinch his placement.

All-Age Running

Haney's Silver Dollar, owned and handled by Chris Cagle, was paired with Touch's Midnight Rider, handled by Mark McLean and owned by John Milton and Grant McCall. Silver Dollar had birds at 26 near the back of the loop on the first hour course but later slowed and was picked up at 45. Midnight Rider went off course, and McLean asked for his tracker at 37.

Matt Brown was in the gallery during the second brace where Mark McLean handled his Sunset Sam Houston. The second dog in the brace was World Class Migraine, owned by John Kumpeter and handled by Patrick Siebels. Sam Houston had a find at 11 while on the McClanahan land. Both dogs then shared divided finds, at 11 and 18, first directly behind Dr. Spiotta's Fayette County home and again in the area of numerous pines and Johnny houses. At 40, Sam Houston pointed, and McLean flushed, yet a straggler bird had not initially flushed and was knocked, causing Sam Houston to end the effort that had begun extremely well. World Class Migraine continued until 46, where he pointed at the north end of the Todds' cornfield but moved during the flushing effort and was put into a road harness.

Como Rain, owned by Ric Peterson and handled by Brody Byrd, was paired with Haney's Storm Warning, owned by father/son Chris Cagle and Chris Cagle Jr., and handled by the father. Both dogs stood at 18, and birds were flushed, with Como Rain in the superior position. Byrd asked for his tracker at 38 when returning to Blalock Road. Storm Warning continued moving southward, crossed Blalock, and had a nice find south and west of the clubhouse at 46, thus being the only dog to finish the first three braces.

Rock Acre Yellow Hawk, owned by Ric Peterson and handled by Brody Byrd, was loosed with the third-place winner in the fourth brace. He was lost early, and Byrd asked for his tracker.

Mayfield Storm Messenger, owned by Scott Mason and Jake Davis, was handled by Patrick Siebels and competed in the fifth brace. He was paired with the second-place winner. Jake Davis attended the competition. Storm Messenger found birds at 11 in dense vines and again at 23. But when crossing Fayette Corner Road, he failed to turn into the Humber tract, and Siebels hurried to bring him back safely but did not return to the course.






