NGSPA HUNGARIAN PARTRIDGE & NGSPA REGION 8 CHAMPIONSHIPS

Back-To-Back Championships At Richardson Ranch By Keith Richardson | Cheyenne, Wyoming | September 13, 2024

The 23rd running of the "Hun" Championship, which ran from September 13-22, was a wonderful and fun event. Competitors appreciated the extra Handler of the Year points for a species trial.

The weather was near perfect for running dogs. It was a little warm some afternoons, but there was plenty of water on course. The Richardson Ranch is nearly 7,000 feet in elevation and very dry, and attendees are always advised to drink a lot of water and use ample sunscreen.

The "Hun" Championship and Region 8 are held back-to-back at the Richardson Ranch and are two of the premier NGSPA Championships. The challenging grounds and difficult birds provide an extreme test for dogs and handlers. The two courses are remarkably different, each with its challenges. The end of the day brings a relaxing time in the Bunkhouse, including a wonderful homemade meal, beverages of choice, friendship, and hospitality.

We enjoyed the best lunches

and dinners of any trial in the country, expertly prepared by Marya Kerchner. Marya had the outstanding assistance of Diane Crabbs at all meals. Fine-aged wines from Keith's cellar were served by Gary Kercher. We hope our official "Field Trial Sommelier," David Quinn, will be able to join us next year. Other benefits of the facilities enjoyed by all were showers, laundry, electrical and water hookups, round pens and enclosures for horses, and ample areas for staking out dogs. Judges enjoyed first-class accommodations in either the Guest House or the Bunkhouse.

These two Championships provide unrivaled "on-the-job training." The large number of challenging multiple chukar and Hun finds, running coveys, large explosive covey flushes, and concentrations of "old" scent will teach the dogs things that cannot be learned in training setups.

The "Hun" is the only trial in the American Field (and the entire country as far as we know) that uses pen-raised Hungarian partridges.

The birds were young, strong, great flyers, and remarkably like wild Huns. Large covey rises, with birds exploding in all directions, tested the steadiness of every dog. A dog making it clean through the Hun Habitat continues up Shooting Dog Draw along the rim of a steep plateau where mixed coveys of jumpy chukars and Huns lurk. The immense pressure of many difficult, multi-bird contacts places the Hun Championship at a level of difficulty arguably exceeding that of the wild bird trials. Dogs that survived the "bird cover" demonstrated their endurance during a mile of undulating prairie with a draw on one side and a drop to the Habitat on the other.

This year, we experimented with using Shooting Dog Draw instead of Derby Draw to reach the rim, and it worked so well that it has become our new course. It added more time to the "bird zone" and less to the open prairie at the end.

During our two weeks of Championships, we were pleased to have two pros in attendance: Dan DiMambro and Rich Robertson. We missed Josh Nieman, who has reorganized his trial schedule. We were happy to welcome a number of amateurs from outside of the region: Ray and Tami Larrondo (ID), Dr. Fred Ryan (OH), Hank and Dina Lewis (OH), Kirk Loftin (TX), Sherri Tangsrud (MO), Bill Padovano (IL), Peter Coppens (IL), Terry Zygalinski (CA), and our "local" amateurs from Colorado included Keith Bryant and Robin Lambourn. Ziggy and his able assistant, Adolfo, also provided horses for judges and guests.

We had a slate of excellent judges, and our thanks go out to

each of them. Our Open Shooting Dog, Open Derby, and Amateur All-Age stakes were judged by Colin Kennedy (AB) and Peter Coppens (IL). Our Amateur Shooting Dog Championship was judged by Jadie Rayfield (SC) and Rich Robertson, who took over after Drew Bastian was injured. Jadie Rayfield (SC) and Drew Bastian (SC) judged our Open All-Age Championship.

The Hun course gives the judges an opportunity to evaluate a dog's "total package." The cast-off crosses a half mile of rolling short-grass prairie before entering the "Hun Habitat," which is a three-mile flowing line of dense willow-lined creek bottom bordered by large mown fields, stands of wild plum thickets and an irrigation ditch with dense grass and shrubs. The new course then heads towards the steep Shooting Dog Draw, allowing the dogs to reach to the slope to the east of the draw and hunt it before rounding the corner at the base of the draw. A right turn at the top takes the dogs along the Upper Rim, where a dog can hunt the rim or search the many pockets below the rim until reaching Suicide Bench, often loaded with large coveys all around its steep edges. The course continues along the Badlands with steep draws, which tend to draw the dogs backward. This demanding course finishes (time permitting) through the High Gate and along the edge to the right until reaching the main road to the Habitat and then flowing through the Habitat and possibly the Ferguson Gate until time is called.

We are grateful for our sponsors. Purina provided financial support and a pallet of Pro Plan for the winning dogs. We also welcome the sponsorship of SportDOG with their generous gifts of excellent training collars and bark collars. Our good friend, Jim Morehouse, continues to generously support our events. Beautiful Hungarian partridge mounts, generous cash prizes, gift cards, Purina product, and SportDOG collars were among the gifts to champions and runners-up. Our good friends, Eldon and Terry Hongo, who own the local Bunkhouse Bar and Grill, kindly gave \$50 gift certificates to all champions.

They also picked up dogs and helped keep us on schedule. Other behind-the-scenes "heavy lifting" was done by Justin Peppers and Brittiny Haberkorn, assisted by Nancy Kutchara.

NGSPA Hungarian Partridge Open Shooting Dog Championship

Starters: 17 GSPs

Huns can often be at a premium during the first stake of the trial, but this year, they were plentiful and flew as strongly as wild birds. The cover was good, but birds were often found feeding in the shorter grass, to the surprise of the unsuspecting dogs.

Slaterock's Mountain Heart (Rommel), handled by Dan DiMambro and owned by James and Andy Dynkiewicz, was named champion.

P W That Was Then This Is Now (Nova), handled by Rich Robertson, owned by Keith and Bobbi Richardson, was named runner-up.

The champion and runner-up came from Brace 7, the first brace of day two. The morning was sunny and cool, and both dogs put on a show. They cast off with speed and took direct courses to the front across the prairie and into the Habitat. Both dogs disappeared to the front as they headed into the Ferguson course. Both dogs were found standing at 14 with Nova backing Rommel. After passing through the double gate, Nova took the left willow line, and Rommel took the right side of the course. Both dogs had what looked like a divided find at 23 near the end of Habitat, but after working the dense willow stand, both handlers took an NP and moved on. Both dogs were sent up Derby Draw, with Rommel making a fast, powerful move to the steep bench on the right, flowing through the dense mountain mahogany stands and large rocks as he hunted to the top of the draw and rounded the corner to Suicide Rim where he was found pointing. In the meantime, Nova headed up the left side of the draw, taking a bit longer to get lined out before making a nice move to the top of Chukar Hill and around to Suicide Rim, where she backed Rommel. Both dogs were released. Rommel had a stop-to-flush at 31, and both dogs had stops-to-flush at 34, with Roma dropping down the hill and having a nice find at 37 with Rommel backing her. Nova had her final find on a covey below Cathy's Bench at 49, with Rommel coming in for a back. Both dogs had a strong finish. It was an exciting brace to watch as both dogs were very consistent, always hunting, always to the front, running with speed and power as strongly at the cast-off as at the finish. Their birdwork was flawless as they were presented with some difficult situations. The judges had to split hairs and, in the end, named Rommel champion because

of his stronger move up Derby Draw.

Other Notable Performances

Canyon Creek High Tide ("Dylan"), handled by Ray Larrondo and owned by Ray and Tami Larrondo.

Dylan held first place all through day one with nice finds at 22 and 42. She had an excellent shooting dog performance but slowed down during her finish.

Right Stuff's Rock N Roll ("Rock"), handled by Dan DiMambro and owned by Bill Padovano.

Rock had finds at 16 and 45, handling his game nicely and showing plenty of power and speed consistently throughout his race. He was hurt by an extended absence.

The Derby is run on an out-andback course from one end of the Habitat to the other, and there are some wide-open vistas so the biggerranging dogs can be easily seen. There is no cactus, so the dogs do not need to be booted.

PW Tall Dark and Dashing ("Tallie"), handled by Rich Robertson and owned by Keith and Bobbi Richardson, earned first place.

Chicoree's Willie B Front ("Willie"), handled and owned by Dr. Fred Ryan, earned second place.

Tallie and Willie were braced together in the second brace. Both dogs took off fast and strongly to the front, hunting along the way. They

were seen at 10 standing near each other but on separate birds, and both dogs stood through the shots as both handlers fired simultaneously. Tallie had a second nearly broke find and a stop-to-flush, and Willie had a second find. Both dogs looked great on their birds and were nearly broke. They were consistently forward with good ground races, and they hunted the cover. Tallie had a bit better application and range.

Deuces Are Wild ("Deuce"), handled by Dan DiMambro and owned by Arthur Grant, earned third place.

Deuce had a nice race throughout the 30 minutes with no birds. Her ground race was good but not as strong as the first two dogs.

Starters: 14 GSPs.

Twin Creeks Running Rocky ("Rocky"), handled and owned by Kirk Loftin, was named champion.

In true all-age fashion, Rocky blasted across the prairie and

disappeared over the ridge into the Habitat. He was not seen until 9, when he was spotted to the front, hunting the willow line before the double hills. After the handlers passed through the double gate, Rocky was not seen, but his bracemate was found standing at 18. Loftin continued riding to the front and was excited to finally see Rocky on point at the very end of the Habitat at 23. It was the culmination of what could only have been a huge all-age move. In the meantime, his bracemate caught the front and backed Rocky. All was in order, and both dogs were brought to the water troughs and sent up Shooting Dog Draw. Rocky took a direct line to the distant slope leading to Shooting Dog Draw, which he hunted nicely, going on point at 35 in the rocky cover high above the corner. His last find was at 48 along the top of the rim. He went on to work all available cover, including the draws of the Bad Lands, before passing through the High Gate and finishing deep into the Prairie, where he was spotted below Ziggy's trailer at time. During his entire run, Rocky did not use the roads; he was always to the front and he ran with power and allage range from start to finish. His birdwork was immaculate with high tail and intensity.

Hi N's Curtain Call ("Charlie"), handled and owned by Hank Lewis, was named runner-up.

Charlie cast off across the prairie to the Habitat, where he was briefly seen and did not show up again until he was found on point at 13 above the depression before the double hills. The Huns were quickly put into the air, and manners were perfect. His next find was at 23 at the plum thicket one-quarter mile from the end of the Habitat. He was watered and sent towards Shooting Dog Draw, where he had a find at 33 at the corner of the draw. He coursed well to the front all the way around the upper rim until breaching the High Gate and continuing through the prairie for a strong finish. Charlie's birdwork was exquisite, with a high tail and exemplary intensity, and his run showed consistent power and range. His use of the roads detracted from his performance.

Other Notable Performances

Chicoree's Glitter and Gold ("Glitz"), handled and owned by Dr. Fred Ryan, was braced with the champion. She had a strong cast off across the prairie and disappeared into the Habitat, where she was not seen until spotted on point at 18. She possessed wonderful style and bird work. She had a back at 38 where she took a few steps during the flush and was picked up. Until that time, she was looking really good.

NGSPA Hungarian Partridge Amateur Shooting Dog Championship

Starters: 16 GSPs.

Early in the running of this stake, our judge, Drew Bastian, had a horse wreck and was taken to the hospital in Cheyenne to make sure he was okay. In the meantime, Rich Robertson was selected to finish judging the stake for Drew. It turned out that Drew was OK, but the two days off were good therapy, and he returned to the judge's saddle for the Open All-Age. It was a tough stake because of the difficulty of the birds. The weather was good, and the Huns were often out in the open around a corner where the dogs couldn't see them until it was too late. The Huns were very explosive and didn't take much pressure to fly;

it was too much pressure for many of the dogs to handle.

Hi N's Curtain Call ("Charlie"), handled and owned by Hank Lewis, was named champion.

Charlie ran in the second brace of the first day when Drew Bastian was still judging. Throughout his performance he showed himself to be a very intelligent dog, hunting every minute of the hour with birds on his mind. He was mindful of his handler and was beautiful on his birds. On the cast-off, he stayed front until dropping into the Habitat, where he hunted his way along the willow line the entire way through the Habitat. Near the end, at 25, he had a really showy find, and immediately after being released, he had a picture-perfect natural back. Charlie continued forward up Shooting Dog Draw and along the upper bench, where he was lost to the front for a while. Scout and handler worked their way forward searching all of the likely cover without finding him. He was eventually spotted deep in the cover at the bottom of a steep draw for what the judge described as a "dinger"—one of those best in-stake finds that sets a dog apart. Handler produced a covey of over 10 birds, and Charlie's manners were perfect. He had a strong finish through the High Gate. Overall, Charlie exhibited a consistent, powerful run with solid shooting range.

Uodibar's Robbi Jo ("Robbi"), handled by Kirk Loftin and owned by Sherri Tangsrud, was named runnerup.

Robbi had four finds at 33, 45, 51, and 57, all with good style and manners. She had a good forward race and handled nicely. She lost some time in the Habitat where she was gone for a while but showed near the spot where the judge saw her go in. She hunted the cover nicely and had a good forward race handling kindly throughout, with good shooting dog range. She didn't match the power and range of the Champion.

Honorable Mention

Windjammers Gemma ("Gemma"), owned and handled by Terry Zygalinski, had a really nice run. She was forward and hunted the cover intelligently with good shooting dog range, and the handler let her "do her thing" without any need to hack or scout. She stayed off the roads and was always seen searching for birds. She backed her bracemate but had to be "whoa'ed" into it, and she loosened up a bit while the handler was flushing out of sight. Judges weighed these against Robbi's absence. Gemma was a "hair's width" from winning the runner-up title.

Starters: 16 GSPs

This was a high-quality all-age stake. There were four dogs that were worthy of being named champion, except for the dogs that ran before them. It was a difficult course, with the dogs having to "beat the prairie" to show a good finish. They all showed strong allage races with plenty of endurance. They showed consistent power throughout the hour with strong finishes. However, the two placing dogs "owned the course" with two brilliant performances. They exhibited excellent rapport with their handlers, and they had "no quit" in them. The judges were also impressed with the quality of the trial and the people involved. Everything flowed smoothly and on time. Meals were outstanding and the booting of the dogs was fast and flawless. They observed that the dogs were unaffected by the boots.

P W Race To The Front ("Raycee"), handled by Rich Robertson and owned by Keith and Bobbi Richardson, was named champion.

Raycee immediately grabbed the eye of the judges with her ground speed and the direct line she took from cast-off, disappearing over the hill several minutes ahead of the handlers and judges. No other dog matched this start. She remained unseen due to her distance to the front until she was finally spotted after handlers passed through the double gate. She was briefly seen on the south side of the habitat willow line to the distant front. She crossed back to the inside (north) of the line and was seen on point at 25 at the far end of the Habitat. Handler produced the bird after taking only a few steps into the cover, and her manners were perfect and intense with no letdown. After watering, she again took a fast, direct line to the base of Shooting Dog Draw, where she disappeared into the cover and was found on point by the handler, with a covey of birds running all around her. She handled this difficult situation beautifully. After release, she was immediately out of sight

until five minutes later; she was briefly seen working the cover on Chukar Hill, where she disappeared again. She was seen working the draws in the Badlands, and a glimpse of her was caught as she passed through the High Gate, where she finished at the end of the course. Every cast was a huge all-age move, and she was mindful of her handler who merely sang and road. She ran with birds on her mind from start to finish with no use of the roads. By all measures, Raycee put on a true allage show.

Chicoree's Riden High Trixie ("Trixie"), handled by Dan DiMambro and owned by Rondal Alexander, was named runner-up.

Trixie ran in the third brace of the first day and made a huge opening cast, making a move that no other dog had made. She coursed to the right, working the hillside above the Habitat before she dropped into it, taking the willow line. She was spotted far to the front a few times while working the cover until she was seen on point near the end of the Habitat. The birds proved elusive, and the handler could not produce them despite a snappy relocation.

Her next move was a speedy line to Shooting Dog Draw, where she worked the cover before moving up the draw. She was seen periodically as she worked the edge of the steep plateau. A judge spotted her pointed on a steep edge, and she exhibited excellent manners and style. She rolled on through the Badlands and the High Gate and finished strong deep into the prairie. Throughout her run, Trixie possessed consistent all-age range, power, and endurance, handling exceptionally well for Dan, requiring no hacking and very little scouting. She was hunting throughout her brace, refusing to take the roads, and had a huge finish. The judges agreed that she had set the bar, but she was edged out by Raycee who ran in the next brace. Both dogs ran in the heat with a very strong wind.

NGSPA Region 8 Championships

The Region 8 Championship was a success, with a good entry in all stakes and participants from all over. Most of the competitors also attended the NGSPA Hungarian Partridge Championship that was held previously.

The venue is not only scenic but also provides great objectives for dogs to hunt and display their ability to find and handle difficult game birds. The course is unlike any other in the country. The cast-off is over several hundred yards of prairie to Suicide Hill, named for the large number of birds inhabiting it and the fact that most infractions may be seen one-quarter mile away. Then, around the hill's base, there is a cove defined by the steep escarpment of a curving high bench about a mile long with a steep escarpment holding large rocks and dense shrub cover. We pass Derby Draw, which cuts through the high bench, and

continue along the bottom of the escarpment until heading up at Shooting Dog Draw. We climb to the top of the bench and spend 15 to 20 minutes hunting the upper brushy edges of this steep chukar habitat anchored by the extensive rim along Suicide Bench. The next leg offers a run through the prairie on the left or a steep series of draws on the right known as the Badlands. The High Gate is entered, and the dog finishes on the prairie, but time permitting, the dogs may be brought into the Habitat heading west towards the cast-off. The finish allows the judges to clearly observe the stamina and range of the dogs.

During their run, the dogs will experience running coveys, large explosive covey flushes of 20 or more chukar, with birds flying back over their heads, and concentrations of "old" scent left by recent coveys that have flown off. The birds are healthy, young, and strong fliers. Any dog that completes this course is ready for Eureka, a few weeks away!

We were pleased to have had several pros in attendance: Dan DiMambro and Rich Robertson. We missed Josh Nieman who has Championship rearranged his schedule. We were also happy to welcome a number of amateurs: Keith Bryant (CO), Brandon Blum (CO), Robin Lambourn (CO), Kirk Loftin (TX), Shari Tangsrud (MO), Hank and Dina Lewis (OH), and Ray and Tami Larrondo (ID). We were happy to see Diane Crabbs (WY), who was a big help in the kitchen. Terry Zygalinski (CA) and his protégé, Alfonzo, brought horses for the judges and gallery.

We had excellent judges, but due to last-minute cancellations, we really appreciate John Bonner offering to judge all of our broke dog stakes. He was very attentive and a pleasure to have around. Rich Robertson and Terry Zygalinski, very

B M B's Madison Avenue ("Madison"), owned and handled by Brandon Blum, was named champion.

Madison ran in the first brace of day two. She guickly reached Suicide Hill where she had a find at 3 and was solid with no movement and a high tail. She had a divided find at 10 in the depression before Derby Draw with all in order. She then hunted the cover in the hills and worked her way up to the rim, where she had a find at 16. Handler produced a big covey of chukar that ran all around Madison and then flushed like little rockets. Madison remained solid and intense with perfect manners. They dropped back down to the course, and she had another find at the top of Shooting Dog Draw. Her fourth find was at 32 further along the rim, and everything was good. After Madison was released, she worked the draws of the Badlands and entered the prairie through the High Gate. She had a big finish, but before time at 56, she was down in the Habitat working her way up the hill when Brandon rode up some birds that flushed over her head. She immediately froze for a perfect stop-to-flush. She had a strong finish past Cathy's Bench, hunting the rim. Brandon did a nice job handling Madison. He simply rode in front of the judges at a steady distance and pace with little vocalization. Madison ran a perfect shooting dog race. She was always to the front maintaining a consistent fast pace with appropriate range. Birds were her focus, and she hunted the cover intelligently without using the roads. All in all, Madison ran an attractive shooting dog race with outstanding birdwork, clearly earning her the championship.

Uodibar's Robbi Jo ("Robbi"),

handled by Kirk Loftin and owned by Sherri Tangsrud, was named runnerup.

This was two years in a row that Robbi earned runner-up. Her first find was on Suicide Hill at 5, with excellent manners and style. Her second find was in the depression before Derby Draw at 10. She crossed the draw, went around Chukar Hill, and hunted the steep escarpment, climbing to the top for her third find at 20. After her excellent birdwork, she was taken back to the bottom, where she had a back at 27 at the corner of Shooting Dog Draw. Her fourth find was on the upper rim at 33. She was sent on and Robbi was out of sight for a while and was found standing deep in the draw at the end of Suicide Bench for her fifth find. After a nice piece of birdwork, she worked the Badlands and passed through the High Gate. She had a nice finish past Cathy's Bench along the rim. During her run, Robbi applied herself very nicely to the cover. The handler needed to handle her hard at times, especially to turn her, which detracted from her performance. Otherwise, her run was very close to that of the Champion.

Other Worthy Performances

Canyon Creek High Tide ("Dylan"), handled by Ray Larrondo and owned by Ray and Tami Larrondo, and BMB's Supernova ("Nova"), handled by Brandon Blum and owned by Tim Heydorff and Karen Bravender.

Dylan and Nova were braced together, and they both caught the attention of the judges as they continued to run "neck and neck" for the whole hour. Both handled kindly, with the handlers holding a good pace in front of the judges. Their range and power were of solid shooting dog quality, and they both had challenging birdwork and handled it well with nice style. All four dogs were pretty equal on the ground. The main difference was that the placing dogs had a bit more birdwork.

P W Race to the Front ("Raycee"), handled by Rich Robertson and owned by Keith and Bobbi Richardson, was named champion.

Raycee ran in the first brace and quickly set the bar for the stake. On the cast-off she went around the bottom of Suicide Hill and had her first find at the corner of Shooting Dog Draw. In between, she was seen periodically at a great distance, working quickly through the cover. Her second find was along the rim at 24, and after release, she sped around the rim and was seen briefly on Chukar Hill, where she dropped down and climbed back up the base of Derby Draw and was spotted pointing her third covey around the corner of Suicide Bench at 33. All three pieces of birdwork were flawless, with intense high head and tail and no letdown. She took the difficult path through the Badlands and was pointed out briefly as she passed through the High Gate into the prairie. When the handler got to that spot, he was able to point her way out on the right of the prairie, where she dropped into the Habitat, worked her way forward, and was seen at time along the far fence. It was a huge, powerful finish with no reduction in speed, range, or power throughout her race. Her run was allage in its entirety, and all the handler

needed to do was ride and sing. He never blew the whistle nor in any way had to push her along.

B M B's Free Ride ("Lewey"), handled and owned by Brandon Blum, was named runner-up.

Lewey took a direct line to Suicide Hill when he was cast off and was rewarded with a find at 4. His manners were perfect with great style, and after being sent on he was seen pointed in the Hun Habitat. The handler could not produce the birds after a long time trying and sent him on a relocation. Lewey finally found the birds, and all was in order. His third find was on the rim above Shooting Dog Draw at 33, and his fourth find was at the far end of Suicide Bench. Lewey had a big finish and ended the hour with his fifth find in the draw below Cathy's Bench at 58. All Lewey's birdwork was flawless and he ran the course from start to finish with consistent speed and power despite a very strong wind. His range was all-age but less than that of the champion. Brandon and Lewey were well connected. with Brandon riding and remaining quiet while Lewey put on a show.

Chloe ran as a bye-dog in the second brace of the second day. She headed to Suicide Hill and worked the lower area before moving on. She continued to work the steep hillside cover of dense mountain mahogany and large rocks as she hunted, staying to the front. Her first find was at 18 on Chukar Hill on the other side of Derby Draw. She looked beautiful with a high head and tail and was rock steady throughout. She went on to have her second find at 26 on the corner of Shooting Dog Draw. It was a nice covey of running birds, and her style was perfect. Her third find was on the corner of Suicide Bench above Derby Draw at 32, and her fourth find was on the far side of the Bench at 36. All of her finds demonstrated beautiful style and intensity. She passed through the High Gate with 11 minutes left to run in the prairie, where she finished strong. During her run, Chloe kept in touch with her handler and flowed around the course with eye-catching grace, never using the roads. She required very little handling or

Heaven Scent's Red Raider ("Raider"), handled by Dan DiMambro and owned by Cary and Linda Waterhouse, was named runner-up.





NATIONAL PRAIRIE CHICKEN OPEN SHOOTING DOG CHAMPIONSHIP

Nine To Five Nation Named Champion; Pearl Jam Nation, Runner-up By Ed Liermann | Bancroft, Wisconsin | September 22, 2024

The 2024 renewal of the National Prairie Chicken Shooting Dog Championship started on September 22, following the Amateur Championship. The setting was a little different this year as a wet spring produced an abundance of cover; the goldenrod especially had a robust growing season that presented some challenges for the dogs and handlers. Chickens were plentiful, and we moved them on all of the courses.

Our judges were Jay Lewis from Ashland, Missouri, and Eddie Berendzen from Higbee, Missouri. Both men are well-traveled and bring a wealth of experience in handling their own dogs and judging championships. It was a pleasure riding with them.

The Winners

Breaking away at King's Ranch in the second brace, Nine To Five Nation, coming 4-year-old white and orange female Pointer, emerged as the new champion with a powerful, attractive race and four finds for owner and handler Dave Moore from Big Lake, Minnesota. She had a find at 15 after crossing the road, then again at 30, 46, and again at 57 after a huge cast down the left side of the course with a nice covey find to finish the hour and be named champion.

The runner-up was Pearl Jam Nation, a coming 3-year-old white and orange female Pointer owned and handled by Scott Jordan. Pearl Jam ran a far-reaching forward race with a nice find at 59 with all in order to end a strong hour on the ground and garner runner-up.

Every field trial has a cadre of people who work tirelessly to

The Running

Smooth Talkin (Ray) and High Enchantress (Hadley). Both out quickly, with Smooth Talkin pointing at 5 and Enchantress backing. Smooth Talkin ran a nice race, had an unproductive at 25, and finished the hour strong. Enchantress, making some nice casts, had an unproductive at 45 and finished the hour running a nice race.

Cole Fusion (Hennes) and Nine To Five Nation (Moore). Cole hunted hard through the cover but was not pleasing handler and was picked up at 25. Nine To Five's performance was described earlier.

G F Parabellum (*Dunbar*) *and I'm Spartacus* (*Ray*). Both dogs out quickly off the breakaway. Parabellum had five nice finds at 12, 34, 37, 41, and 47, all in order, and finished the hour working through heavy cover to the front. Spartacus was running big, covering a lot of ground, and was lost at 30.

Erin's Southern Comfort (Derrig) and Absolute Tornado (Ray). Southern Comfort was running a nice race and was lost at 45. Tornado had a stop to flush at 15 with all in order and a bird at 30 and was up.

Hatteras High Tide (Hennes) and Erin's Wild Atlantic Way (Derrig). High Tide hunted hard through the cover and was picked up at 45. Wild Atlantic Way ran a nice forward race through the cover but had no bird contact.

Saginaw Luke Skywalker (Johnson) and Touch's Cocaine Blues (Hadley). Luke had a nice race and made some big casts but had no bird contact. Cocaine Blues had a stop to flush at 4 and released himself to end his hour.

Hatteras Riptide (Ray) and Due Respect (Tande). Riptide was going nicely through heavy cover; he was not pleasing handler at 20 and was picked up. Due Respect, running a forward race, hunted hard throughout the hour, and made some nice casts but no birds.

Cross Country Ryan (Hennes) and Cedar Creek Sixgun (Liermann). Ryan failed to back at 8 and was picked up. Sixgun had finds at 8 and 10. His race shortened on the backstretch, hunting through heavy cover. After crossing the road, he made a nice cast and had a find at 55 to finish the hour.

Notorious Immortal (Mathys) and Hatteras Storm Watch (Ray). Immortal had a nice race and a covey find with about six chickens to the front at 33 and finished the hour strong. Storm Watch hunted hard along the ditch and was not pleasing the handler and picked up at 35.

Sellers Pascha Skylos (Ray) and Pearl Jam Nation (Jordan). Skylos had a nice race with finds at 10 and 18 and was up at 59 for failing to back. Pearl Jam's performance was reported earlier.

B G K's Luke (Bell) and Absolute Dominator (Ray). Luke had a nice race with an unproductive at 20 and another at 40 and was up. Dominator was just getting started; birds were in the air at 3, and he was up. Cottonwood Bud (Hennes) and Great River Stallion (Ray). Bud hunted the hour with an unproductive at 8 and a back at 10. Stallion had a nice race and made some nice casts with a find at 10 and finished the hour going away.

Confident Nation (Jordan) and Hard Truth (Ray). Both dogs were out fast and forward. Nation, off to a good start, was not pleasing the handler and was up at 20. Hard Truth, off to a good start, had a find at 19 and finished the hour hunting the heavy cover.

A Buccaneer (Ray) and Erin's Tin Lizzie (Johnson). Running a good race, A Buccaneer had a find at 15 and left with the birds. With a nice forward race, Lizzie had a find at 10 and finished the hour hunting through heavy cover.

Wiggins Pree Dawn Reward (Hennes) and Aim High Elhew Hadley (Hadley). Pree Dawn Reward had a find at 26 with all in order, an unproductive at 39, and finished hunting the cover. Aim High had a consistent forward race with finds at 38 and 48 and finished the hour.

Two Spot Tommy (Ray) and Erin's Doc Holliday (Bell). Tommy ran a nice race with an unproductive at 17 and an unproductive at 28 and was up. Doc ran a good race with a find at 12, producing an eight-bird covey and a find at 35. He finished the hour with a nice forward race.

Luke's Gospel Truth (Hennes) and Hatteras Sand Storm (Ray). Both dogs moved out fast through the cover. After making some nice casts, Luke was lost at 10. Sandstorm had a nice race going with a find at 25 with an infraction and was up.

CS Four Season's Gunner (Ray) and Grouse Feather Witcher (Dunbar). Four Seasons, out quickly with some big moves, had an unproductive at 13 and an unproductive at 38 and was up. Witcher made some nice casts off the breakaway but shortened as the cover took its toll. He finished the hour hunting likely places but didn't have a bird.

The Winners

This year's winner was the same as last year's winner. Jolene Jolene notched her second championship under the guidance of handler Mike Tracy. She ran in the 11th brace, starting at the end of the outer loop against Wayward Flyin Tomato, who was picked up early. Jolene Jolene hunted the bottom side of the outer loop and crossed to the left. She was found standing across from the rock pile where Mike flushed a pair of pheasants. She was sent to the front and was quickly out of sight. She was found standing as we crossed the next road. During the relocation, a pheasant lifted, and Jolene stopped. Jolene was sent on, handling the only turn on the course with ease. Along the breakaway hedgerow, she stood with perfect manners and style for the flush. The judges were looking for a strong race, and Jolene finished the rest of the hour showing her strengths as a bitch that can put on a strong forward race. She ran out front through the locust grove and over to the left, where she had success in the past. She was gathered up and watered before being sent on toward the pond on the right and swinging up the ridge. She continued to make strong casts to the front, finishing the hour going into the outer loop. She continued to get stronger as the hour got longer. Jolene was smooth, making it look easy. It is quite impressive to win this championship back-to-back. This is the first time this feat has been done since I started reporting this trial. Congratulations to the syndicate owner team of Joe McHugh and Dave McKay.

The runner-up honor was awarded to Miller's Lock and Loaded, handled by George Tracy and owned by Muriel and Bill Primm. Lock and Loaded was in the 15th brace with Miller's Automatic Upgrade. Lock and Loaded was found standing at the end of the breakaway autumn olives with fine style. He hunted to the front over to the locust grove and through. The bracemates traded casts out to the ridge and through the outer loop. Lock and Loaded pointed with fine manners just off the milo strip on the return of the outer loop. George flushed a pheasant and sent him to the front. As we exited the outer loop, George called point for Lock and Loaded in the field across the road. It took an extended flushing effort to flush the running pair of pheasants in the planted milo field. He finished the hour strong, showing fine manners and backing an unproductive at time.

The judges named three honorable mentions this year: Waybetter Rebel and Miller's War Bonnet, handled by Mike Tracy, and Double Deuce Zeke, handled by Mark Hughes.

The Running

The first brace featured Erin's Big Casino (M. Tracy) and Hillhavyn's Wild Child (G. Tracy). They were off just after 3 p.m. on Tuesday. Wild Child struck first with fine manners on the left side of the breakaway hedgerow. She was released at 4. Erin's Big Casino was charged with an unproductive at 4. Both dogs hunted the front end, with Big Casino standing on the right side on the bottom of the ridge. All was in order for the flush. Both dogs showed well up the hill to the outer ridge; Big Casino was found standing high and tight with Wild Child backing along the sorghum feed strips. As the handlers rode to the dogs, a pheasant lifted, but there was also one right in front of Big Casino. Both dogs rounded the outer loop, were watered, and hunted the bottom side. They both finished strong.

Starting at the main breakaway, Miller's Hopped Up Version (M. Hughes) and Waybetter Rebel (M. Tracy) were off in the final brace of the day. Both dogs made strong moves along the autumn olives, swinging down and to the left. Waybetter Rebel had a find on the left edge going up the hill. He hunted the locust grove to the front and was rewarded with a find at the end, with the scout calling point and a hen bird taking flight as Mike rode over. Miller's Hopped Up Version had an unproductive across from the pond and pointed a pile of feathers on the left side of the ridge. Going up the hill, she pointed in a sorghum strip; during the relocation, a bird took flight, and Mark picked up.

Wednesday morning brought much-needed rain. Faithful (M. Tracy) and R Q's Saddle were off at 8 a.m.; both dogs were to the front for a divided find along the main breakaway hedgerow. They showed nicely, with Faithful scoring finds across from the rock pile and on the right side of the locust grove before a lapse of manners ended a serious bid. Saddle was picked up at 35.

From the top of the ridge, Ramey's Elhew Independence (M. Tracy) and BK Real McCoy (B. Lanning) were down and away, showing at the top of the next hill. McCoy is a fancy moving dog on the ground. He was fresh off placing second in the Futurity; he had one stylish find and a wide race before a lapse of manners. Independence had two finds and showed fine manners in a tough situation before the handler elected to pick up at 45.

Bragabull (M. Hughes) and Miller's High Heat Index (M. Tracy) were off from the main breakaway, with the rain having just stopped. Miller's High Heat Index scored two finds with fine style and two unproductives. Bragabull had two finds and a back before having a slight infraction.

Miller's War Bonnet (M. Tracy) and Miller's Strolling For Gold (G. Tracy) were off from the main breakaway at 2 p.m.; Strolling For Gold was rolling, and the tracker was called for at the end of the locust grove. War Bonnet ran a big race but showed well to the front. Point was called just beyond the ridge with a big snapping turtle; Mike took her on. She had a stylish find to the right of the tree at the start of the outer loop. She continued to make strong forward casts while always in tune with the handler. She finished the hour strong.

The Secret (J. Lordi) and Triple Nickel Carbon Copy (M. Tracy) started from the main breakaway. The Secret was seen going up the hill after the breakaway. Both handlers called for the tracker in the locust grove.

Mo's Curtain Call (M. Tracy) and Double Deuce Zeke (M. Hughes) were released at the start of the locust grove. Curtain Call was jacked up for a find at 2. She had a divided find just before the pond and was running a good race before a slight lapse of manners on the bottom of the ridge. Zeke was a bird-finding machine; he was dialed in for a guick find at 2 and then a divided find on the milo strip at the end of the locust grove. He made a nice swing around the right side of the pond and swung to the front. He stood tight for a find at the bottom of the ridge. He made a nice move up the hill. Zeke was standing on the outer loop, but no bird was found. Zeke was taken on and locked up about 50 yards away for a stylish find. He was released and, about 100 yards away, had to stop to flush. He was not seen at the end of the outer loop; deep in the milo, he was barely visible as we turned to come back from the outer loop. All was in order for the flush. Zeke made some nice moves, finishing the outer loop and was then headed to the rock pile. He continued to run to the front with a find as we crossed the road.

He finished under the whistle on the breakaway hedgerow.

Calico's Sky's The Limit (M. Tracy) and Miller's Special Cinderella (G. Tracy) were off on Thursday morning in the ninth brace. Sky's The Limit scored finds at 5 on the breakaway and backed with ease at the start of the locust grove. Cinderella was running big and had a find right at the start of the locust grove and then in the milo just past the locust grove. Sky's The Limit pointed twice on the ridge with fine manners and looked to be making a serious bid before taking a hard left toward the hills. She was gathered up, but the handler elected to pick up. George called for the tracker at the top of the ridge.

In the next brace, Pal's Prestigious Pete (M. Tracy) and Parkway (M. Hughes) were off on the outer loop. Pete had a slight lapse of manners just off the breakaway. Parkway had an unproductive and stylish find before he pinned a pheasant at 10; the flush was too tempting, and he was picked up.

Jolene Jolene (M. Tracy) and Wayward Flyin Tomato (M. Hughes) ran in the 11th brace. Jolene Jolene is written up under "The Winners." Flyin Tomato pointed quickly on the bottom side of the outer loop before going on but chased a pheasant shortly after on the top side of the outer loop.

Miller's Heat Seeker (G. Tracy) and Steel Valley Raven (M. Tracy) laid down one of the more exciting braces. Raven was locked up for a find on the left side of the breakaway hedgerow. She displayed fine style and manners for the flush and was sent on. Heat Seeker had a find just ahead but out of my sight. Raven answered again with a stylish find and was sent on. Both were running strong forward races. Raven was locked up for a find across from the rock pile, again displaying fine manners. Raven took the left edge of the locust grove, and Heat Seeker took the right. Both finished the hour to the front.

Miller's Special Upgrade (M. Hughes) and Raag's Rich and Rare (M. Tracy) started at the rock pile going toward the parking lot. Raag's Rich and Rare handled two finds perfectly with fine style and made a beautiful cast going up the hill before having a slight breach of manners. Miller's Special Upgrade ran a good race with two stylish finds but suffered two unproductives.

Cheyenne Jack (J. Lordi) and Reedy Creek Dial Tone (M. Tracy) were released starting on the outer loop. Dial Tone had an unproductive, and Mike called for the tracker at 25. Jack ran a medium race, scoring a find on a rooster along the breakaway hedgerow. He had a chukar find on the hill to the right of the pond. He pointed a fresh kill on the ridge and finished the hour.

Miller's Automatic Upgrade (M. Tracy) and Miller's Lock and Loaded (G. Tracy) ran the final brace of the day. Lock and Loaded was written up under "The Winners." Upgrade hunted the front but was only charged with an unproductive at the end of the main breakaway field, with Lock and Loaded backing to finish the hour.

B K Lapaloma Blanca (B. Lanning) and Backcountry Snake Eyes (M. Tracy) are two young dogs with a bright future. They showed great style on the ground but were both up early.

Trump (M. Tracy) and Miller's Little Duce Coupe (G. Tracy) were sent out from the flat area after the locust grove. Both dogs were making nice casts on the right around the pond and up the hill. Trump pointed just past the hill; all was in order as Mike flushed a hen bird. Close to the top of the ridge, point was called for Little Duce Coupe. She stood with excellent style for the flush. Trump was on point as Little Duce Coupe gained the front. She failed to back, and Trump was tempted too much.

Bittersweet War Cry (M. Tracy) started off Friday afternoon, with the weather changing as the winds picked up. He was the first of three bye braces. War Cry had a stylish find pointing away from the hedgerow. War Cry was hunting and hitting some ground that few, if any, dogs hit. He stood at the seven, where the handler tried to move him on, but War Cry stood, and eventually, a hen was flushed. He added a nice find in the locust grove. He continued running a forward race. He was working a bird when a bird behind him got up, and then the bird he was working got up; among the

commotion, War Cry took one step too many.

Erin's Envy (M. Tracy) is a beautiful, well-built Pointer male. He was released from the bottom of the ridge. He handled well, hunting the right side of the hill. As he entered the outer loop, he stood on the left. Mike called flight, but it was not seen, and Envy was taken on. We flew down the center, and point was called. During the flush, Envy relocated and was picked up.

Pine Straw Hot Chocolate (M. Tracy), in the swan song of the trial, was away from the far end of the outer loop. Hot Chocolate hunted the middle, with point being called at 2. While Mike attempted to flush, Hot Chocolate moved slightly to end the trial.

ith sunny skies and cool temperatures, the 2024 edition of the Northeastern Grouse and Woodcock Championship kicked off. Our judges for this three-day event included Jamie Leitch from Vermont and Dale Hackett from New Brunswick. Both are well-seasoned in the cover dog world and prepared to watch over a strong field. When time was called and the final discussion made, it was my privilege to announce Wynot Lottie (PF) as champion and Mohawk Mill Miss You (PF) as the runner-up. Lottie, owned and handled by Al Robbins, came out of the seventh brace. Lottie was braced with Doodle Ridge Elroy (Mueller) on Course 1, The Cut. Lottie, a black and white Pointer, is very strong on the ground and has plenty of bottom. Very few dogs in this trial had the drive that she did. Working well with her handler, she finally slammed on the brakes at 38. With a woodcock flown and all in order, she was off to the races only to be stopped again at 40, which produced her second woodcock. Turning up the dirt, she pushed

forward and carded her third find at 48. The sound of the woodcock fluttering away and the echo of the shot in the quiet morning made all in tow smile. No question, the dog to beat!

The runner-up, Mohawk Mill Miss You, owned by Bill McFadden and handled by John Stolgitis, came out of the first brace. Pearl was braced with Elhew Snakewood (Doherty). Pearl went to work early. She dove down to the right of the course and stopped about 70 yards in. After a lengthy search in thick cover, she was found stacked up, and Stolgitis produced a woodcock for her. Back on course, Pearl glided through the woods with a crackling tail. A site to be seen! Her final find came in the cut at 36. Deep off the path to the left, she was finally located, standing picture-perfect as Stolgitis produced the bird for her. A great run that was witnessed by the gallery but, more importantly, her owner.

Once again, the Northeastern Grouse and Woodcock Championship was blessed with

great fortune, and the thanks are never-ending. The grounds were in great shape with the work completed by the club but also the town. As everyone knows, we run our trial on public land, and once again the town of Frankfort repaired the road in time for our trial. Without their support, the trial would not happen. We moved 38 birds, so each dog had ample opportunity to get it done. We had a strong draw from far and wide, including the Maritimes, Pennsylvania, New Hampshire, Rhode Island, Massachusetts, Vermont, and, of course, Maine. Trials like this do not happen without the support from Greg Blair and Purina. No one can question that they don't produce a product that builds champions! To the owners and handlers, as usual, the Northeastern does not happen without you. The camaraderie is second to none and while stories are told and performances are watched, there are always the end of the day gatherings. To me, it is one of the most important pieces of the trials. It is a time when people who have not seen each other for months and sometimes years can sit, reminisce, and enjoy great food and drink. Add in the fall foliage and strings of dogs; you can't ask for much more. The Mid-Coast Field Trial Club tops it off with their lobster and steak handlers' dinner on Saturday which everyone walks away happy.

The Running

The first brace has already been described.

In the second brace, Higby Arcade (PM/Stolgitis) was braced with Cairds Cracklin Rosie (PF/Little). Cade had a very strong and fancy race, in fact, one of the strongest. Cade stopped but was unable to be located and eventually was moved on—a tough break for the dog and handler. Rosie had a UP at 37 and stopped at 45 but was moved on.

In the third brace, Wild Apple Pop's Dorothy (PF/Doherty) and Chasehill Wicked Wilma (PF/Stolgitis) ran solid races, with Dorothy stopping at 46 with a woodcock. Wilma had a stop at 17 but was moved on.

There was nothing to report for the fourth brace.

In the fifth brace, Snuff Hill High Caliber (ESF/Dellinger) and Chasehill Snoop Dog (PM/Stolgitis) work their way around the Beaver Hole course. Strong and fancy, Cali could not come up with a bird. Snoop stopped at 19, and after a long search and not looking certain, he was sent on to only pop the bird, ending his day.

There was nothing to report for the sixth brace.

The seventh brace has already been described.

In the eight brace, Calamy's Soul Man (PM/Robinson) and Mohawk Mill Double E (PF/Stolgitis) ran well on the Beaver Hole course. Elwood scored a woodcock at 30 with a UP at 43. Elwood was picked up by the handler right after.

In the ninth brace, Old Glory Ben (ESM/Parsons) teamed up with Asper Hill Bandit (ESF/Cullen) on Powerline. Excitement was quick, but not in a good way. Ben failed to back at 3, and Bandit was picked up shortly after with an injury.

In the 10th brace, Carolina's Great Pee Dee (PF/Joyal) and Boomer of Backwater (PM/Flewelling) worked the cut. The dogs ran well, with Boomer having a find on a woodcock at 44.

There was nothing to report for the 11th brace.

Paucek's Up For Adventure (ESF/ London) and Sunkhaze Vera Masardis (PF/Flewelling) finished up day two in the 12th brace. Addie had a quick stop at 5, which produced a grouse. Unfortunately, later on, she moved up during the flush to end her strong performance. Vera had a woodcock at 43 but was a little too much on the edge of the bell.

In the 13th brace were Wynot Roscoe (PM/Robbins) and Chasehill Poison Ivy (PF/Stolgitis). Roscoe was strong on the ground but could not produce a bird. Ivy suffered UP at 23 and 43 and was picked up.

There was nothing to report for the 14th brace.

In the 15th brace, Wild Apple Siri (PF/Rizza) and Mohawk Mill Miss Ellie (PF/Stolgitis) had the final run of the trial. Siri nailed a pair of grouse at 36 but lacked the ground race. Ellie had a couple of stops but was not able to pin anything down.

he 2024 running of the Region 19 Amateur All-Age Championship was successfully completed with a good field of competitive dogs and a healthy population of sharptail grouse observed on each of the three courses. Overall, the Namekagon Barrens cover was the best it's been because of the diligent management efforts of the WI Department of Natural Resources. We are grateful for the continued burning that has occurred to maintain the ideal habitat for the sharptail grouse. One of those burns occurred a few weeks before the trial, and it made pointing out the dogs running through the open valley a thing of beauty. Unfortunately, a few dogs felt so unrestricted that they just kept running right off the course and out of judgment.

The winner and runner-up champions competed on Course Two, which had a mixture of open vistas and heavy cover, showing the dogs' ability to run and handle. This course also provided several consistent spots for locating birds, including a lek. Champion Ramblin River's Natural had, as one would expect, a natural forward race, making owner and handler Bill Stapleton's job look easy. The champion's efforts were rewarded with a find on sharptail grouse at 40. His strong finish extending into the next course was more impressive since most of his brace was run with a 25-mph headwind. Runner-up Champion Pearl Jam Nation ran a consistently forward race, adjusting to the cover as needed. Like all of handler Scott Jordan's dogs, Pearl had a strong desire to please and

continually popped out to the front with minimal handling efforts by Scott. Pearl had two finds to garner the runner-up position.

The Open Derby stake had multiple dogs that could have placed. Running in the brushy sharptail cover adds an extra challenge for young dogs, but the winners did a nice job running hard to the front. First place, Shady Street, pleased the judges and handler Adam DeLude. Cal, named second, ran a strong race for Austin Turley, and Confidence had a forward race to obtain thirdplace honors for Jim Tande.

Running field trials become more and more difficult as competitor numbers dwindle. Running quality championships takes a village. Judges Lance Schulz and Doug Swingley went well beyond the call of duty by volunteering to help judge the All-Age Championship after our original judges had health issues. Jarrett and Allison Bell stepped up and volunteered to judge the Open Derby. Trial Chairman Todd Manns did a great job running the trial. His able assistant, Fran Kelly, helped with the food and treats, hosting happy hours and delicious cookouts. Our long-time dog wagon driver, Don Dak, should have gotten an award after bouncing along the rough terrain for all of the stakes with several broken ribs. We are very grateful to sponsors Purina and SportDOG for their generous donations.

This was quite an hour. The dogs placed first and second. The third-place dog, Mauck's Wyeast Owyhee Ajay, had a great limb find on a covey of Huns and a find on a released Chukar.

warm and dry August in Wisconsin carried over into October September and with unseasonable weather. It was downright uncomfortable to be in the woods, with temperatures quickly climbing through the 70s each day. There is no question the conditions hampered the trial, especially the afternoon braces. But the show must go on. Despite the tough conditions, a good number of dogs got it done on the ground and put themselves in contention with a slant toward woodcock work. Good work on Ruffed grouse was tough

this year.

Another thing these grounds are noted for is groomed trails that the club prunes and cuts each summer in preparation for the fall trials. Eight different, one-hour courses cover about 20 total miles of trails, which need to be pruned and cleaned each year. If courses need to be optimized and changed, as they often do, even more effort is needed to create a fair field trial course for dogs and handlers. Colin Peterson led all contestants by logging the most hours in the woods with pruning equipment. Roger King, Alex Anderson, Tom Goltz, Denny Bauman, Mike Luebke, Rod Lein, Brent Sittlow, Lydia Sittlow, and Ben Mergens all tried to keep up with Colin, as we pitched in as much as our summer schedules would allow. Of course, all of this great woodcock and grouse cover would not be possible or accessible without the fine work that the Eau Claire County Parks and Forestry Department does on these multi-use grounds. Our club has developed а great relationship with the department. Since 1968, we have been grateful for their endorsement and permission to use the county forest to test and compete with our dogs on wild birds.

The Winners

Lake Effect Ali (Kaufman) bested a field of 37 entries competing over three days. Ali was cut loose on the Crash Course on the fifth brace of the trial. She traversed past the first stream crossing, and her bell indicated that she had darted left of course towards the Eau Claire River. She was found standing on point at about the 10-minute mark on a steep embankment that overlooked a low bowl. The bowl was a rare, moist, and shaded spot on the course that contained likely woodcock habitat. Kaufman confidently walked past his fancy Setter and flushed for her. Three or four woodcock took flight, which had clustered in that cover. After Kaufman sounded his blank gun, we glanced up the embankment to see Ali overlooking the bowl with style and intensity—a very nice piece of birdwork. Ali's bracemate was not pleasing his handler and was picked up at about the 25-minute mark. This left the rest of the Crash Course open for her and her alone. She was looked for at 35 when her bell stopped in a very thick cover. She started up again on her own before she was found and continued on. No harm, no foul. By this time, the hot sunny skies were really baking the sandy ground, and her stamina would be tested. Her bell went silent again at about the 40-minute mark in another rare damp spot on the course. She was found on point with perfect style and another woodcock was produced. Taking advantage of the cool, damp spot, Ali was watered and sent on to complete the onehour brace. She was stopped again when time was called at 60 and searched for. But she started up again on her own before she was found. She was quickly gathered up by Kaufman and led out of the woods. Her purposeful race and application, during the heat of the day, separated her from the other contestants that also had suitable birdwork during this trial.

Grouse Trails Black Knight (McKellop) was on the Horse Creek Course for the seventh brace of the first day. Knight is a young black and white English Pointer raised and trained primarily in Pennsylvania. Knight covered the first half of the Horse Creek Course in fine fashion but lacked bird work. On the second half of the one-hour brace, he kicked it into gear when you need it most. He racked up three separate woodcock finds with steady manners through flush and shot. Again, what separated Knight from other dogs was his independent bird seeking and searching for ground race.

NATIONAL RED SETTER ALL-AGE CHAMPIONSHIPS

Firefly's Beeline Wins Red Setter National Championship; Cedar Creek Sixgun, Runner-up By Bonnie Hidalgo | Grovespring, Missouri | October 16, 2024

Firefly's Beeline claimed the National Championship title for 2024 with a two-find performance. The 8-year-old female is owned by Dennis and Bonnie Hidalgo of Brighton, Colorado, and was handled by Bonnie. Cedar Creek Sixgun was named runner-up in the National Championship with one find. He is owned and handled by Ed Liermann of Palmyra, Wisconsin.

Cedar Creek Sixgun came back in the National Amateur Championship to acquire the victory for Ed Liermann. He scored one find in a great race. Firefly's Power Play took the runner-up honors for owners Robbie Nesson and Bonnie and Dennis Hidalgo. "Puck" was handled by Bonnie Hidalgo and scored two covey finds in a good race.

Amy Gauthier of Bay City, Michigan, with her nice male, Cedar Creek Asa's Reign, easily won the one-hour Red Setter Open Walking Shooting Dog Classic. Second place went to Firefly's Beeline and Bonnie Hidalgo.

In the Open Derby, Quantonas Reckless Abandon took first place for owner-handler Kelli Aitken Thompson of Box Elder, South Dakota. Slingblade was second for owner and handler Roger Boser of Seven Valleys, Pennsylvania.

The winner of the Walking Puppy stake was Come Back Misty Bay and her owner-handler, Amy Gauthier.

Big Red Machine won the Open Walking Derby for his owner and handler, Mike Fox of Patriot, Indiana. Come Back Misty Bay was second for Amy Gauthier.

The National Red Setter Field Trial Club's 2024 National Championship trial was held on the well-respected

Field Trial Sportsmen's Club grounds at Grovespring, Missouri. The event began on Wednesday, October 16. The grounds were in beautiful shape with good feed plots along the edges. With new personnel at work, the grooming of the fields was somewhat different than usual. but other than Horse Killer hill. it worked well. The courses still had a good flow to them. The September pre-release of multiple coveys of quail on each of the three courses was successful, but they were hard to find, especially at the start of the event. Even with the pre-release birds, the club felt the need for daily supplementing with more quail. They were planted in strategic places along all of the courses in an attempt to draw the coveys back on course. It appeared to work as we started finding coveys in the derby stake, and they continued to be found for the duration of the trial. The members of the NRSFTC are grateful to the people who manage and care for this excellent venue. Thanks to Treasurer Sharleen Daugherty and Directors Andy Daugherty, Bob Burchett, and Tony King for their various efforts.

The drawing was conducted by Milt and Wendy Schafer at their home in Oshkosh, Wisconsin, on Sunday evening, October 13. The National Championship drew 13 dogs, while the Amateur Championship drew a dozen entries. The second annual, one-hour Red Setter Open Walking Shooting Dog Classic drew an entry of 10 Setters. In the Open Derby, five dogs were entered, and the same went for the Open Walking Derby; the Open Walking Puppy drew three entries.

We were pleased to welcome two gentlemen who are wellrespected judges, William Smith, Moscow, Tennessee, and Chris Rider, Smithville, Pennsylvania. They served as our judicial panel for the duration of the event. William and Chris are very pleasant and courteous people who also have a good sense of humor. They were attentive and helpful to all dogs and their handlers. William is very familiar with this venue and knows how to set the best pace for the courses. Both judges did a great job of keeping the speed consistent. They deliberated carefully, and their decisions were well received. William took note of the fact that your scribe was carrying a heavy workload due to Dennis being on crutches and took it upon himself to saddle my horse for each session of the running. This kindness lightened my load and stress level considerably.

There were handlers and club members present who hailed from Colorado, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Missouri, Michigan, Nebraska. Pennsylvania, South Dakota, and Wisconsin. It was great to be gathered together again, catching up with good friends and making a few new ones. It was wonderful to have Tom Norton back in the mix. In memory of his much-loved wife, Sue, Tom added \$500 to the National Championship purse. In doing so, he made sure that the payouts to the champion and runner-up were more similar.

Once again, Milt Schafer and Dennis Hidalgo co-chaired the fall trial; they put on a well-organized event. Milt ordered birds, ordered judges' gifts, took the entries, conducted the drawing, and printed out running orders with the aid of his wife, Wendy. Dennis secured the judges and put the trial ad together with Bonnie's assistance. At the trial, Milt and Dennis did the early morning plant from Milt's UTV. Milt then followed behind the gallery to replace birds that were pointed and flushed so that the afternoon dogs would have the same opportunities to find game. Milt took awesome care of his broken-legged co-chair and was often seen on his side-byside, giving Dennis a ride up or down the clubhouse slope.

Don Beauchamp drove the dog wagon for the first three days and was a huge help. During the Walking Classic and Walking Derby, Clayton Thompson drove the dog wagon. Your scribe kept the dog wagon stocked with cookies, candy, hardboiled eggs, coffee, water, Gatorade, and soda. The refreshments were well received and eagerly consumed. Lunches were served daily in the clubhouse for a nominal fee. Sandwich fixings and chips were available every day. National Championship

The Winners

Firefly's Beeline ran as a bye-dog on Thursday morning. She warmed into her race in the breakaway field and was briefly out of pocket before Double Gates field. Once she returned, Bee ran a strong forward race, taking the lines. After a beautiful edge running move in Davis bottom, she was found on point on the cross row at 31. She had her birds stylishly located and remained lofty beyond flush and shot. At the end of Davis. she headed toward the dry creek and was next seen in the Island field. Bee took its left edge to its completion and went up the hill, out of view. She was spotted on the right edge before Horse Killer hill. She stood pointing, high on both ends at 48. Bee showed excellent decorum on her game. She finished her hour on Apple Tree hill. Beeline was bred and is owned by Dennis and Bonnie Hidalgo. Bonnie handled her to this win.

Cedar Creek Sixgun was awarded the runner-up title. He is owned and handled by Ed Liermann of Palmyra, Wisconsin. Appearing in the first brace of the stake, he drew Course One on Wednesday morning. Sixgun ran a strong, mostly forward race. He showed well on the edge through much of Davis bottom and the Island field. On Apple Tree hill, he pointed stylishly at 50; a covey was produced with the dog remaining tight through the shot. He finished forward into Little Vine.

The Running

Come Back Delta Dawn (K. Aitken-Thompson) and Cedar Creek Sixgun (E. Liermann) turned loose on Wednesday morning to kick off the trial. Sixgun's hour is given above. Delta scored a beautiful find at 12 in the Double Gates field. She was forward in pattern for the majority of the hour. Gratitude (R. Boser) and Firefly's Power Play (B. Hidalgo) were released up the Little Vine hill. Gratitude was the more powerful of the two. He made a bold move through Sycamore and was rewarded with a great find at the cross row at 25. Grady was high and tight throughout. Both dogs were predominantly forward for the hour. Power Play went without game contact.

Snowy River's Rock'n Red Ruby (C. Verdoorn) with Quantonas Reciprocal (K. Aitken-Thompson) headed into Clubhouse loop. Ruby was animated and ran a fair race. Reason pointed at the pond at 12, with Ruby backing nicely. Both dogs were mannerly throughout. At 24, near the twin barns, Reason was pointing with Ruby honoring. Both dogs showed excellent style and manners. At 32, in the alley, Reason had a stop to bump and was up. Ruby continued across the road and past Daugherty's. Near the cemetery, she pointed beautifully at 53 but went with the birds to end the morning's running.

Brook's White Hot Blaze (L. Tewes) and Cedar Creek Anthem (E. Liermann). Both dogs broke straight away. Anthem was gone at the Rocky Creek crossing and was not seen until the tracker was pulled. Blaze showed a couple of times before the creek crossing but was out of pocket at Double Gates. He returned, only to be lost again, and the tracker came out.

Quantonas Reloaded (C. Thompson) and Firefly's Lucky Penny (B. Hidalgo) started the hour in Davis bottom. Lucky was a handful and was eventually lost on Apple Tree hill at 36. Neo ran a predominantly forward race. She pointed birds with style at 36, just into Little Vine. Her manners were excellent. She finished the hour to the front at the head of Sycamore bottom. Cedar Creek Shindig (E. Liermann) ran with Red Bird's The Fifth Element (K. Aitken-Thompson). Shindig was forward with good moves through Sycamore and up Daugherty's ridge. Both dogs were forward into the bull pasture. Shindig went up a draw coming out of Climer's and was not returned in judgment. Griffin ran a forward pattern with some good moves but shortened late and was picked up.

Firefly's Beeline (B. Hidalgo) ran as a bye-dog on Thursday morning. Her winning performance is related above.

Open Derby

This was the second stake on the roster, and it ran in its entirety on Thursday, following the conclusion of the National Championship. There were five starters, which limited the number of placements to two dogs. Both placing dogs appeared in Brace Two. The Judges were William Smith and Chris Rider.

Quantonas Reckless Abandon, bred, owned, and handled by Kelli Aitken Thompson, emerged as the victor. This red female ran an exuberant, predominantly forward race with one bird contact.

Slingblade took second with a good forward race and one bird contact. Roger Boser bred Slingblade and is also his owner and handler. Slingblade was sired by the recently deceased young winner, Wayward. He is out of Slingshot, who produced last season's derby sensation, Shotput.

National Amateur Championship

This stake commenced on Thursday afternoon. The first three braces were completed, and the last three ran on Friday morning. The weather was still pleasant but slightly warmer than during the Open Championship. Judges William Smith and Chris Rider presided.

The Winners and Others

The newly named National Amateur Champion, Cedar Creek Sixgun, was handled by his owner and breeder, Ed Liermann. Sixgun ran a brilliant all-age race to capture the win. He was off quickly from the breakaway, showing a few times on his way to the rocky creek crossing. Next, he showed on the far-right edge, which he took to the edge of Double Gates field, where he slammed on point. He was standing on the north side of the tree row; his handler attempted to flush, then asked the dog to relocate. Sixgun hunted to the edge of the feed strip and styled up; Ed flushed the bird, fired, and collared the dog out of the strip. Sixgun crossed the field and hit the edge. He crossed the creek bed and kept to the right edge. Once in Davis bottom, he took the west edge forward. He was found pointed at 27, on the right side of

the cross strip. A lengthy relocation did not produce his bird, and he was taken on. Sixgun took the left edge to the end of Davis before heading to the creek bed. In the Island field, he rimmed the left edge to the end of the field. He was next seen well forward before Horse Killer hill. He disappeared briefly but showed on top, going on to finish well on Apple Tree hill. Cedar Creek Sixgun turned seven in August 2024.

Firefly's Power Play started at the gate to the bull pasture. At 4, Puck was pointed stylishly near the trees on the left: his bracemate honored. The birds were flushed, with both dogs standing high and tight. Power Play made a big move through Horse Corral bottom and showed on the hill before the clubhouse. He was forward through the clubhouse loop, where he backed his bracemate. He was absent at the twin barns but returned in the alley. Puck ran the edges around the end of Sycamore. He went out of sight at the double gates but was found standing at the edge of the pond at time. A big covey was flushed for the staunch dog, who retained his style through flush and shot. Firefly's Power Play, a 9-year-old male, is owned by Robbie Nesson and Bonnie and Dennis Hidalgo; he was handled by Bonnie.

Quantonas Reloaded was carried for placement until Sixgun ran. Her race began at the top of Fox hill. "Neo" scored a nice covey find at 15, all in good order. Her race was forward and strong; she showed well on the edges of Sycamore bottom. She had a big forward finish and was only faulted for a couple of immature moves. Clayton and Kelli Thompson, Box Elder, South Dakota, own her, and Clayton was her handler.

The Running

Quantonas Running Mate (K. Aitken Thompson) and Firefly's Lucky Penny (B. Hidalgo) appeared on course one. Pence showed well and was predominantly forward for the hour. Lucky ran a big race but was a handful. Both dogs finished on Apple Tree hill.

Cedar Creek Anthem (E. Liermann) with Quantonas Reloaded (C. Thompson) began at the top of Fox hill. Reloaded was considered for placement, so her performance can be found under "Winners and Others." Anthem started well but shortened. She scored a nice covey find on Daugherty Ridge at 53.

Firefly's Power Play (B. Hidalgo) and Gratitude (R. Boser). Powerplay's performance was described earlier under "Winners and Others." Gratitude honored stylishly at 4, in the bull pasture. He made nice forward moves from the bull pasture through the clubhouse loop. He pointed in a likely spot in the loop, but no birds were produced. In the alley below the barns, he pushed a covey at 49 to end his performance.

Come Back Delta Dawn (K. Aitken Thompson) was braced with Cedar Creek Sixgun (E. Liermann). They were the first brace on Friday. Delta was lost early, and the tracker was out before Davis bottom. Sixgun won this Championship, and his performance is recounted in the Winner's section.

Quantonas Reciprocal (K. Aitken Thompson) and Firefly's Beeline (B. Hidalgo) were set free at the top of Fox hill. Reason crossed Apple Tree hill with speed and range that belied her age. Beeline crossed to the left and was first down the hill. Bee was found pointed at the cross row below, with Reason honoring at 7. All was in good order for both dogs. Bee made the Little Vine loop in short order. Reason came off the hill loop in harness after joyfully flushing a covey of quail, once again belying her age and many titles. She turned 10 in November. At 21, Bee was seen forward; at 23, she slammed on point; a pile of feathers was all that

could be found. She ran the next field's west edge and quickly moved on to Sycamore bottom. There, she ran the right edge all the way to the road. She swung left and climbed the hill; a lengthy absence ensued; she came from the rear at 58 and finished just past the barns.

Cedar Creek Shindig (E. Liermann) and Red Bird's The Fifth Element (K. Aitken Thompson) turned loose west of the barns. Both dogs kept to the left at the big pond and to the bull pasture. Shindig made a nice move down the west side to the back corner of the pasture. Griffin was moving forward through the bull pasture and Climer's but was not his usual self. Kelli opted to pick up at Horse Corral valley. Shindig started down Horse Corral valley and came around to climb the hill. She showed near the clubhouse gate and climbed up the ridge. Shindig was briefly absent at the top, then was forward to the barns and through the alley. She crossed the road, finishing forward near the cemetery.

Open Walking Shooting Dog Classic

There were 10 dogs drawn in this stake, but only nine started. Birds were plentiful, to the detriment of several dogs. Cedar Creek Duke appeared in the first brace and looked unbeatable until his sixth find when the birds got the best of him. Foxy Lady Sadie had four flawless finds and was on her way to a win but wrecked on the next covey. There were many quality dogs, including a champion who picked this stake to misbehave; one brace ended in less than a minute. Judges Chris Rider and William Smith were left shaking their heads and were relieved to end the stake with two clean dogs and one of those with a near-ideal performance.

Cedar Creek Asa's Reign won this stake with two beautiful, wellmannered finds. He ran an attractive race and was responsive to his handler. Asa is owned and handled by Amy Gauthier. He appeared in the

Her race was smart, but her range was a bit large and, at times, unruly. Bee is owned by Dennis and Bonnie Hidalgo and was handled by Bonnie in the fifth and final brace.

Neither of the men are leaving the club but are allowing others to take a turn as officials. Greg Johnson is wellqualified to fulfill his new role as president, and Neil Anderson and Ed Graddy assumed the roles of secretary and treasurer, respectively. Tim Kaufman will maintain his role as vice president.

Amateur Championship

Highly respected judges were in good attendance for this championship. Neil Anderson of Duluth, Minnesota, and Jordan Pharris of Brainerd, Minnesota, know what to look for in a quality field trial performance. Both men own high-quality dogs that have seen much success.

Runner-up Champion Bad Habits

"Lucy," a 3-year-old Pointer female, has claimed the title of runner-up champion. She was handled by owner Ben Mergens and was bred by Rod Lein of Over The Hill Kennels. Lucy's flashy running style carried her along edges and to objectives containing likely cover. Early in the brace, Lucy stopped left of the course. Scout Greg Johnson located her on an edge; however, no flush was produced. Upon being released, Lucy pressed forward until she stopped at the 20-minute mark. This time, a woodcock was flushed while Lucy exhibited great style and steadiness. On another occasion Lucy displayed good manners by

backing her bracemate. Her pace was as rigorous at the end of the hour as at the beginning.

Champion Grouse Trails Little Bud

Newly crowned champion Bud is owned, handled, and bred by John McKellop. Shortly after the breakaway, Bud stopped on a swamp edge just right of the course. Bud's bracemate charged in and backed upon spotting Bud standing. This exciting moment exhibited excellent manners. While no flush was produced, Judge Neil Anderson noted woodcock splash in the vicinity. With a strong forward race, Bud applied himself to proper cover while handling with ease. On several occasions, Bud's bell faded out of hearing, and John used these opportunities to exhibit cooperation by reeling him in. Nearing the end of the brace and seeming to have run out of likely cover, Bud had not given up. At 59, the bell stopped straight ahead of the gallery. While closing the distance to Bud, his bell started up briefly, then again went silent. Spotting Bud standing tall and proud, John moved in to flush. The grouse, which Bud handled to perfection, took flight, leaving the dog standing in place.

INTERNATIONAL PHEASANT CHAMPIONSHIP

Haney's Silver Dollar Named Champion; Comanche, Runner-up By Tessa Hughes | Moulton, Alabama | October 25, 2024

n October 25, 2024, in unseasonably warm temperatures, Haney's Silver Dollar, a 3-year-old white, orange, and ticked English Pointer male, with Luke Eisenhart of Leesburg, Georgia, as his handler, swept the International Pheasant Championship at the Sandhills Wildlife Management Area in Hoffman, North Carolina. Silver Dollar is owned by Chris Cagle of Woodlawn, Tennessee. Eisenhart also handled the runnerup champion, first-year all-age dog, Comanche, a white and orange English Pointer male owned by Tucker Johnson of Hobe Sound, Florida.

The Championship began its running at the new venue at Hoffman on Thursday morning, October 24, 2024, with 33 Pointers and Setters competing for the title. Conditions were sunny and dry, with a temperature of 54 degrees for the morning breakaway. The temperature quickly climbed into the 70s by mid-morning and topped 80 by midday.

Dr. Fred Corder, the club stake secretary, and manager, made opening announcements, including that, given the current location of the Championship, the Club was continuing its practice that the pointing of a pheasant was not required for the naming of a champion. This author and her husband, Joe Hughes of Moulton, Alabama, were honored to serve as judges. The International Pheasant Championship is one of four National Championship qualifiers that comprise the Carolina Jamboree, a fun season kickoff event taking place at Hoffman for the second year in a row. The handler whose dog garners the highest overall points in all four trials of the Jamboree this year wins a \$10,000 purse.

So many people worked hard

to make this trial a success: Greg Robinson faithfully drove the dog wagon every day, ensuring the dogs were ready to go and on the wagon and providing water, coffee, and snacks to everyone at every brace. Lefty Henry, when not in the saddle, served as another road marshal. Corder and Bob Youngs also served as marshals. In addition, Rita Corder served delicious lunches each day. Carl Owen and other participants in the Jamboree served us an absolutely delicious Frogmore Stew on Friday night (for those of you who may not know, Frogmore Stew is another name for a shrimp boil). There is also work that goes on behind the scenes, including a great deal of care of the grounds and the quail that are put out and then fed, much of that done by the North Carolina Game & Fish Department.

The Championship Brace

Our champion, Haney's Silver Dollar (Eisenhart), and Game Heir (PM/Corder) were our last brace of the second day. Conditions were hot and sunny with temperatures at around 75 at the start. Both dogs broke away strong, running hard. Silver Dollar is a son of Ransom, and, in his hour, he showed some of his sire's uncanny ability to find birds, racking up four finds despite the heat. He is also a son of the great blue hen, Haney's North Star, who is now the dam of more than one dog qualified for the National Championship.

After the dogs left the breakaway, Game Heir first had a very classy find at 4, looking extremely stylish on the left-hand side of the course. He held well for both wing and shot. Both dogs moved on through the countryside, setting a rapid pace and showing well. Silver Dollar then garnered a beautiful find at 8, standing perfectly still, head and tail high, although birds boiled out all around him. He traveled on for his handler, moving at a fast clip, showing always to the front, and was next found on point at 25. Again, he stood perfectly for the find, and again, birds flew in every direction, some flying directly in front of his face. However, Silver Dollar never turned even his head, standing up like a champion through it all and the shot. Dr. Corder requested the tracker for Game Heir at 25, and he was up. At 29, we were moving into the pine trees on the thirdhour course, and Eisenhart was searching hard for Silver Dollar, and so was his scout. Judd Carlton. At 32, we found Silver Dollar standing in the pine trees on point. Eisenhart went into flush, but no birds were flying. I could hear birds calling, and Eisenhart relocated Silver Dollar, and he again pointed. The birds were running on him, and Eisenhart again asked Silver Dollar to relocate. This time he did, ever so delicately, and he locked the birds down on this relocation. When Eisenhart flushed, birds went everywhere, all around Silver Dollar, and seeing it would make hairs stand up on your arms. They kept on flying and flying. Silver Dollar never moved, standing head and tail high. Eisenhart shot and returned to release his dog. When turned loose, Silver Dollar left like a shot to go hunt some more birds and return to the front, making a beautiful cast at approximately 48. For a brief time, we then did not see him. Eisenhart was looking for him to the front, and Carlton was searching, as well, and time was then called. Carlton then called point for Silver Dollar in the next field over. Eisenhart went in to flush for Silver Dollar in heavy cover. He held well for that find, also, and all was in order, thus concluding the brace.

The Runner-up Brace

Comanche (PM/Eisenhart), our runner-up champion, and Quickmarksman's Excalibur (PM/ Mike Hester) were in the sixth brace. Both dogs were away fast from the breakaway. Excalibur scored a nice find at 10 and held well for wing and shot. Comanche was running hard and showing us he was a beautiful dog on the run, too, setting a scorching pace through the countryside. He had a perfect find at 12, with Excalibur backing, Comanche looking outstanding on his game. Comanche's head and tail were both high in the air, and he held perfectly that way for the flush and the shot. He then had an almost flawless race, always to the front, showing well, and scoring another find at 49, with Excalibur backing again. Again, he looked perfect on his game and held that way for both wing and shot. The startling thing about this young dog is that, as soon as Eisenhart turned him loose, he then hit the trail running hard, not fazed by the miserable heat and dust, searching hard for more birds. Again, he scored a find at 54 and looked extraordinary again. He held that pose throughout the flushing and the shot for his handler. He then went on to resume that hard-running pace again despite the dry heat. Hester called point for Excalibur at 58, but no birds were produced, and Excalibur finished his hour during that flushing and relocation attempt. Comanche finished strong to the front, running hard.

The Running

Our first brace was comprised of Rester's Cajun Spirit (PM/Carlton) and Touch's Shadow Rider (PM/ Mark McLean), last year's runner-up champion. Although both dogs ran ambitious races, Cajun Spirit had no birds during his hour, and McLean asked for his tracker at 21, after Shadow Rider had not been seen since the breakaway.

Nighthawk's Rebel (PM/Eisenhart) and Game Surge (PM/Corder) were in the second brace of the day. They left well from the second-hour breakaway and ran hard. Eisenhart called point for Rebel at 38, with Game Surge backing. However, no birds were flying, with Rebel suffering the unproductive. Both dogs continued on well, and then Surge scored a beautiful find at 45. He looked sensational on his game and held well for both wing and shot. Rebel was lost shortly after his point, and Eisenhart asked for his tracker at 55. Surge ran always to the front and finished the hour running strong.

Papa Joe (PM/Hester) and Bandit's Hill Avenger (PM/McLean) were in the next brace. Although the dogs made nice casts away from the breakaway, Joe was not seen again, and Hester asked for his tracker at 23. McLean called point for Avenger at 23, but no birds were flying, and Avenger suffered an unproductive. He went on to have a good, forward race, hunting aggressively, but he had no bird contact. He finished the hour strong, always to the front.

Rampage (PM/Eisenhart) and Southern Nation (PM/Lefty Henry) were in the first brace after lunch (Brace 4). Both dogs left the afternoon breakaway strong, and Rampage scored a beautiful find at 8, standing well for wing and shot. He and Southern Nation ran aggressive races, but neither had any further bird work. Rampage finished the hour well. Unfortunately, Nation was lost, and Henry asked for the tracker at 55.

Erin's Happy Hour (PM/Carlton) ran as a bye-dog in the fifth brace. He ran well from the breakaway but scored an unproductive at 3 and an unproductive at 5 and was up.

The next brace was the runner-up champion brace, which has already been covered.

The seventh brace of the trial started us off with our second day of running on Friday, which dawned hot and bright. Our day started with Haney's All In (PM/McLean) and Rocky River Halo (PM/Stevenson). Shortly after the breakaway, as we were veering to the left through the pines, Jerry Raynor, McLean's scout, called point for All In on the right. After relocation, birds were flying for All In, who held well for the flush and shot. All In was then away, running hard for his handler. Unfortunately, Halo was not sighted again after the breakaway, and Stevenson requested his tracker at 20. At 26, McLean called point for All In again, and again, All In handled both the flush and the shot with perfect manners. Unfortunately, All In was not seen again after 45, and McLean requested the tracker at 1:00.

Dominator's Wild Bill (PM/Carlton) and Woodville's Yukon Cornelius (ESM/McLean) comprised our eighth brace. Both dogs set a fast pace away from the breakaway, and Cornelius scored an impressive, beautiful find at 18. He then hustled, snapping through the countryside, with McLean pointing him out, with him always to the front. Carlton called point for his dog at 24, but no birds were flying, suffering an unproductive. Cornelius then suffered an unproductive at 39 and continued hunting aggressively, always to the front, impressing us all with his aggressive ground race under difficult conditions. At 58, Raynor called point for McLean, and Judge Joe Hughes traveled with McLean to find Cornelius on point. He looked beautiful, and McLean flushed for his dog, Cornelius holding well for wing and shot. This concluded the brace.

Erin's Wild Atlantic Way (ESM/ Eisenhart) and Touch's Malcolm Story (PM/McLean) were in our ninth brace. By then, temperatures had climbed even further, but the challenging conditions did not slow these dogs. The Setter scored a beautiful find at 29, looking perfect on his birds, with Malcolm Story backing. All was in order. Eisenhart requested his tracker at 29 for Way. Malcolm Story suffered an unproductive at 34. He finished the brace well and had a very nice find at pickup.

Rester's Johnny Ringo (PM/ Eisenhart) and Haney's Easy Money (PM/McLean) comprised our 10th brace. Both dogs ran strong races, ever forward, with Ringo scoring a beautiful find at 46. Easy Money suffered an unproductive around the same time. Both dogs were lost at pickup.

The next brace was the championship brace, which is covered above.

Lester's Storm Chaser (PM/ Henry) and Sandhill Ike (PM/Jerry Raynor) were the 12th brace. Storm Chaser scored a beautiful find at 15, showing excellent style on point and beautiful manners. Unfortunately, he was thereafter lost, and Henry requested his tracker at 35. Ike ran a forward race, a classy dog, but was lost after approximately 25, with Raynor requesting the tracker at 45.

Miller's Heat Advisory (PM/ Carlton), last year's champion, and Heisman (PM/Hester) were our 13th brace. Heat Advisory ran a strong, aggressive race just as he had the year before, and Heisman matched him for a good deal of the brace until he was lost, with Hester requesting the tracker for his dog at 38. Heat Advisory scored a beautiful find at 4, looking perfect on his birds, and held well for both the flight of birds and the report of the gun. Traveling on, point was called for him again at 11, and again, his manners were again impeccable. He was then absent to the front for a fair amount of time, and when he was found at 51, he was on point and perhaps had been for some period of time. Carlton chose to flush for his dog, but it may

be the birds had left him by that time, and Heat Advisory suffered an unproductive. Heat Advisory finished his hour strong, always to the front and hunting hard.

Erin's Perfect Storm (PM/ Eisenhart) and Touch's Midnight Rider (PM/McLean) made up our 14th brace. The dogs ran aggressive races, showing nicely to the front, and they scored a divided find at 50, both holding well. They continued, running hard, with Midnight Rider scoring another find after pickup had been called, but within time. He also handled this find well and looked beautiful on his game. Perfect Storm also finished strong but had no further birdwork in his hour.

Haney's Storm Warning (PM/

Eisenhart) and Game Nation (PM/ Corder) comprised our 15th brace. It was extremely hot and dry for this brace. The dogs ran well from the breakaway, in spite of the heat, and both handlers called point for their dogs at 21, but no birds were produced on the flush. Continuing on, both handlers made the decision to pick up their dogs at approximately 45.

Touch's Breakaway Fred (PM/ McLean) and Erin's High Note (PM/ Carlton) comprised our 16th brace. Breakaway Fred had no game contact and was not seen after the breakaway, with McLean requesting the tracker at 24. High Note ran a strong race, but he had no bird contact. The heat was extremely harsh, and Carlton picked him up at 31.

Game Star (PF/Corder) ran as a bye-dog in the 17th brace. She ran a beautiful race, scoring a classy find at 25 in heavy cover in a thicket and holding for her handler through both the flush and the shot. She moved on with class and speed, and Corder called point for her again at 34, but this time, no birds were flying. Corder decided to pick her up at this juncture, thus concluding the championship.

Daylight comes late at this time of year, and we began Wednesday morning as soon after 8 a.m. as possible when the lighting conditions were acceptable.

The Winners

Grouse Ridge Mags was named the 2024 Lake States Grouse Dog Champion. This spunky little tri-color female English Setter, handled by Scott Forman of Prattsburgh, New York, is owned by William Ballin III of Norwich, New York. Mags is not new to our grouse woods here in Michigan. Last fall, as a 3-year-old, she took her first big win as champion at the Michigan Woodcock Championship. A couple of weeks later, during the Grand National Grouse Dog Championship, Mags suffered a near-fatal puncture wound to the chest. After months of convalescence at home, she went back to her handler, Scott Forman, who got her back into shape and returned to handle her here at the Lake States Grouse Dog Championship this fall. Now, as a 4-year-old, this little spitfire returned to again take top honors here in the grouse woods of northern Michigan. This winner came out of Brace 17

on Courses 1 and 2 after the coffee break on Day 3. Grouse Ridge Mags with handler Scott Forman and Stan The Man with owner/handler Tom Fruchey hit the line with optimum conditions. The first birdwork came from Stan at about 25 minutes in. He carded a nice woodcock find in likely cover. Mags ran extremely well to the front and out on the edges. When hitting the first road crossing on Course 2, both dogs got hung up off to the left of the course. Both handlers tried to get their dogs moving out of there, to no avail. Finally, Stan started moving towards his handler and stopped just before getting to him. Tom called again to get him in, and right into a grouse he did go. Tom went in and picked Stan up while Mags' bell went silent. Scott sent in his scout, Jeff Keller, to take a look. With no movement from Mags, Scott and Judge went in to look, moving several more grouse as they moved in. Mags was found standing majestically with her tail poker straight and proudly poised as that brood flew away, finding one more grouse still in front of her. Mags stood her ground through the shot with all in order. With two and a half minutes to go, Mags went on to finish as strong as she started. Mags showed her power of range and made some very serious casts throughout the hour.

Runner-up Champion was awarded to Ralphy's Chasehill Rip. Rip is owned by Brian Ralph of Grove City, Pennsylvania, and was handled by Scott Chaffee of Clare, Michigan. Ralphy's Chasehill Rip is no stranger to the winners' circle. The 2x CH/R-U CH was the 2023 Grand National Grouse Champion and, more recently, the 2024 Ontario Grouse Championship winner. He was released on Courses 9 and 10, the last brace of Day 3 of the championship, along with bracemate Timberdoodle Farms Sal, handled by Marc Forman. Sal scored a great

woodcock find on Course 9, coming down the hill. The weather had improved but was still warmer and dryer than usual. At the turn up the hill on Course 9, handler Scott Chaffee lost bell contact and sent in his scout. The scout reported that she flushed two different grouse while looking for Rip and Scott, and judge Larry Guild joined the search. Rip was subsequently found, but as the birds were already put to flight, he was sent on. Rip ran to the front and was lost from Scott for several minutes but kept in contact with scout Tammy Chaffee and the other handler and judge. Scott caught the group at the end of Course 9 going onto Course 10, and Rip continued with a big and animated run, hitting all the available cover. Sal continued onto Course 10, stretching out as she went. Sal scored a beautiful grouse find off the left of the tote road on Course 10. As the group wound around to the end of 10, Rip's bell went silent, with about one minute left in the brace. Scout, handler, and judge Vance Butler headed into the scrub oaks, and about 200 yards from the course, point was called by the scout, and a grouse was seen to flush back over the staunch pointer.

Other dogs that were in consideration during the trial were E J Jonesy, handled by Scott Chaffee on Courses 5 and 6 on the first day of competition; Back Creek Lucy,

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WEST COAST OPEN SHOOTING DOG CHAMPIONSHIP

Tian Butterball Named Champion; Rocking J's Pearl, Runner-up By m Griffin | Cathey's Valley, California | October 26, 2024

The West Coast Open Shooting Dog Championship went off as scheduled on October 27. The trial followed the Northern California Bird Dog Club's multi-stake event at J. Ichord's Hornitos Ranch. San Joaquin Valley English Setter Club, with a major assist from the NCBDC's stalwarts, hosted the trial. The limited entry was a disappointment as in years past, this was a top-shelf trial in Region 11.

The Ichord family has generously made their ranch in the Central California foothills available to a number of the Region's clubs and ranks as a top venue. At this time of the year, the cover has been grazed down, and the spring-fed creeks are just a trickle. The released quail find cover in ample deadwood and rock outcroppings. The multiple courses traversed most of the ranch including the wide open that spreads out below the high pass above the second breakaway.

The Club was fortunate to secure the services of two well-respected and experienced judges, Jim Rose from Clayton, California, and Mike Wilkin from Reno, Nevada. These gentlemen set a consistent pace throughout the running. The Club thanks them for their time in the saddle and careful consideration of each dog.

The running commenced on a sunny day with temperatures in the 50s and warmed to the mid-70s. Tian Butterball, a 6-year-old Pointer male handled by owner Cliff Mesnard, was named champion. Bo had a very strong forward race. At 14, he was found on a picturesque stand on the lip of an abandoned dugout at the top of one of the hills that define the back side of the ranch. Cliff flushed birds that were in the grass 6 feet below with all in order. Bo continued to search fast and forward and was rewarded with a second find in the rocks before the cowboy gate. At 53, Bo stood again where the course turns down the hill toward the creek, but no birds were produced. When turned loose, there was no let up for the balance of the hour.

Rocking J's Pearl, Jaryr Walton's young Pointer female, was named runner-up. Peal ran in the second brace and had a solid front-running hour. Her single find at 50 exhibited her excellent style and hour. The judges advised this reporter that they had two other contenders. Terry Erickson's Setter female Horizon's Bea and Cliff Mesnard's German Shorthair G R B's Gestapo. Bea had three well-spaced finds but was missing the finish the judges saw in the winning performances. Gus, the Shorthair, had four finds, but his application was not consistent.

The trial came together with the encouragement and boundless help of Sean and Dr. Julie Kelly. Sean helped release birds prior to the running and drove the dog truck that he and Paul Wells had recently reengineered. Dr. Julie Kelly helped with the drawing and lunches. The Club also wants to acknowledge and thank Purina and Greg Blair for their support of the trial and field trialing generally.

At the 34-minute mark, in the mile-long field, point was called by scout. Kelly rode hard on the right side of the field, finding Man on point standing in broom sedge with beautiful style. He had excellent manners at flush and shot. After being released, Man was seen far ahead at the top of the hill, heading to the front of mile-long field. He continued his forward race, swinging through the draws, headed toward the beaver pond on Course 1. Man finished the hour always forward and independent but at the same time maintaining rapport with his handler.

This performance set the standard of what the judges were looking for in an all-age dog.

Thank you to Neil Walker, Tracy Swearingen, and Luke Eisenhart for readying the property, taking care to maintain rerouted course legs for better flow and scouting. Thanks to Tracy Swearingen, Luke Eisenhart, and Judd Carlton for marshaling in between running their dogs and Clayton Cook for driving the dog wagon. Christy Swearingen and Debbie Hofer prepared daily hot lunches and prepared dinners for the judges; meals were delicious, and no one went hungry! A special treat was a fresh fish fry dinner (snapper & grouper from Carrabelle, Florida) caught and prepared by Neil Walker; the best fried fish this writer has ever eaten! Another bonus this year was that three sponsors stepped up to help make this event possible: Bennett Feed & Seed of Albany, Georgia, our friends at the Alabama Field Trial Association, and this reporter. And, of course, a big round of applause and heartfelt thank you to Purina and Greg Blair's team for all they do to support this sport!

Before describing this year's winning performances, this writer would like to acknowledge that the unusually warm and dry conditions put all contenders to a greater test. Scenting was more challenging and made for a higher competitive bar, clearly separating winners from their cohorts. Having said that, all of these athletes demonstrated what Robin always strived for in his own dogs—a strong, forward race with consistent hunting and pushing to the edge of course limits. Style and intensity on game with knockout finishes were always a Robin Gates hallmark.

Open All-Age Winners

Erin's Wild Atlantic Way ("Cap") claimed top honors for the second year in a row with three finds, an exhilarating race, and a quintessential finish in the last brace on Day 1. Owned by Sean Derrig and handled by Luke Eisenhart, Cap was one of only four Setters in this stake. His performance was punctuated by covey finds at 1, 6 (divided), and 40, with the 40-minute covey being the limb-find of the trial. Cap exhibited singular hunting prowess, high style, and class on the ground. Traversing forward the entire hour, he finished with determination, pushing the course limits, and had the judges and gallery up out of their seats!

Erin's Code of Honor ("Tip") earned second place with three finds timed at 15, 56, and 59 in the last brace of the trial. Owned by Allen Linder and handled by Luke Eisenhart, Tip hunted intentionally, with uninterrupted focus on the task at hand. His birdwork was stylish and flawless, showing in all the right places. He finished in strong fashion with a covey find at pickup. Tip continues to be a compelling force of nature on the all-age open circuit.

Woodville's Yukon Cornelius ("Rudy") snagged third place, and rightly so. This all-age circuit veteran, known fondly as Rudy, will be eight years young in January and still has what it takes! He's also one of only four Setters to compete in this stake-very exciting to have two Setters in this year's winners' circle. Owned by Carl Owens and handled by Mark McLean, Rudy effortlessly covered the course he drew with confidence, style, and skill. He only hunted up one covey in his hour at 16 but ran a formidable race and finished out front with another hour in him if allowed. Nice job!

Honorable Mentions

This stake also showcased several other contenders who finished their hour with birdwork but either didn't stay to the front throughout or didn't beat the winning races. Regardless, these six impressed the judges and this reporter and deserve mention in order of their running: Bandit's Hill Avenger (O: Anne Forrester; H: Mark McLean); Southern Thunder (O: Chris Campbell; H: Tom Shenker); Haney's Easy Money (O: Stacey and Steve Croy; H: Mark McLean); Haney's All In (O: Stacey & Steve Croy; H: Mark McLean); Dominator's Wild Bill (O: Jeff Arnold and Gene Brown; H: Judd Carlton); and Silver Wings (O: Tucker Johnson; H: Tracy Swearingen).

The all-age circuit is one of the toughest arenas to compete in because of the high standards

placed on an increasingly smaller aggregate of dogs and handlers. We often overlook how incredibly skilled all of the contenders are and what they bring to the sport and breeding programs around the country. So, this writer would like to commend all 28 athletes and their teams of humans who competed in this event and will give it their all in future contests. Bravo!!

Thank you to the following: the Arkansas Game and Fish, John Van Horn for marshaling, Treissa Robinson for the tasty lunches, judges Rita Ornsby and Diane Vater, Johnny Ornsby for donating an 8-hole dog box to the CRCA, Roger Martin and Ronnie Miller for running the dog wagon, and Robby Robinson for chairing the event. It takes a village.

The Winners

The winner came from Brace 9. It

was an exciting brace with a lot of good birdwork. The bottom dog in the brace, Mayfield Storm Charger (Vincent), was fast and forward. He had a find at 23. He was pointed again at 30, but no birds were produced. He was found honoring his bracemate at 40. At 47 point was called. Charger was pointed with his bracemate backing this time. A covey was produced. He had a big covey finds at 55. At 59, he was seen standing far to the front. After a relocation, birds were produced for a nice finish.

Second place went to the bottom dog in Brace 13, Chelsea's Mae West (Kinkelaar). She ran forward and fast. She was found standing at 22. Where the morning and afternoon course split south of the mountain, she went right and carried the treeline until she was found standing forward again at 53. She would finish well.

The third-place dog was braced with the winner in Brace 9. Levi Express Visa (Van Horn) started things off with a nice covey find at 17. He pointed again at 28. His handler elected to relocate. He moved up and pointed again. After a brief flushing attempt, he was again relocated and moved out wide to pin the running covey masterfully. It was a stellar piece of birdwork. He pointed another covey at 40. At 47, he was found backing his bracemate. He finished his hour with an unproductive at 59. Levi was wide and hunted hard throughout his hour.

The Running

Brace 1: Thunder Bolt's Storm (Kinkelaar) had a good race and hunted consistently throughout the hour. She had a find at 17 with a good style on a nice covey. At 48, her scout called point. She was pointed in heavy cover. She lost some intensity during the flushing attempt. The birds flew over her head, and a turn to mark was noted. Wynona's Nickleback Sugar (Vincent) was picked up at 13 for bumping a covey.

Brace 2: Game Street (Moore): both dogs got out of pocket before the mountain crossing. Game Street never materialized; his handler asked for the tracker at 17. Big Man On Campus (Kinkelaar) came back to cross the mountain but, after descending, was not seen again. Brace 3: Sandridge Big Iron (Vincent) was seen little after the breakaway. A tracker was requested at 24. LMO's True Grit (Moore) became increasingly absent as the brace went on. The handler elected to pick up at 50.

Brace 4: Sandridge Vanguard (Vincent) pointed at 7. He was picked up for relocating himself during the flushing attempt. Thunderbolt's Wild Agin (Kinkelaar) was MIA shortly after the breakaway, and the tracker was requested at 15.

Brace 5: Upfront's Southern Star (Kinkelaar) failed to make the turn up the mountain. The tracker was requested at 21. Wynona's All Business (Vincent) had a find at 30 but bumped on the relocate and was up at 49.

Brace 6: Blackhawk Lucky Charm (Vincent) started out with an unproductive at 2. She had a find on a single at 5. She pointed a covey at 26. All was in order until she went looking for them again after being released. Silver W Jill Z (Kinkelaar) lost contact with her handler before crossing the mountain. The tracker was pulled at 20.

Brace 7: Georgina (Kinkelaar) was picked up at 10 for a failure to honor. Dunn's True Reign (Vincent) had a nice covey find at 10. He had a mostly forward race.

Brace 8: Touch's Smokeshow (Vincent) was picked up at 10 for failing to stop to flush. White Privilege (Kinkelaar) had a find at 12. Handler elected to pick up at 15.

Brace 9: Levi's Express Visa (Van Horn) and Mayfield Storm Charger (Vincent) were reported above.

Brace 10: Upfront's McQuade (Kinkelaar) failed to keep contact with his handler after the breakaway. The handler asked for the tracker at 10. Outer Edge Jack (Moore) had an unproductive at 12, after which the handler elected to pick up his young charge.

Brace 11: Barshoe Forget Me Not (Vincent) was found standing in heavy cover at 3. After a relocation, birds were produced. She covered a lot of ground before being found, once again, in heavy cover. Again, a relocation with birds was produced. But this time, she went with the birds to end her bid at 57. Lester's Another Shockwave (Kinkelaar) seemingly vanished into thin air at the turn to the mountain crossing, and the tracker was requested.

Brace 12: Hunt's Full Moon Rising (Kinkelaar) was up at 2. After a quick honor, he went with the birds at the flush. World Class Instigator (Cochran) was off like a flash on the breakaway and seen standing on a stylish point. The other dog came in hard and fast and put on the brakes upon seeing him but was close. Unfortunately, both dogs went with the birds.

Brace 13: Touch's Steely Dan (Moore) was found backing at 22. He hunted well and had a good find at 53. Chelsea's Mae West (Kinkelaar) is reported above.

This year, the AFTCA National Walking Shooting Dog Championship was held at the Redwood Farm with 36 dogs running Friday through The NBHA Amateur Sunday. Invitational Championship started the next day. As always, there are plenty of birds at Redwood Farms to evaluate each dog's ability to find and maintain proper manners on their birdwork. Redwood is the ideal place to evaluate a Walking Dog Championship with the rolling hills and fields with edges of native grass and soybean. A creek that trickles through the farm and several ponds allow plenty of water for dogs

The Running

Monday morning was the start of the qualifying run in the Invitational. With the rain setting in for the day, the first brace had The Need For Speed (ESM/Chris Kobs, owner/ handler) running with Emert's Show Me Motu (ESM/Dave Emert, owner, and Cliff Monroe, handler). This was the first time that these two were running in the Invitational. "Speed" finished the hour and made some good moves but missed the opportunity in making the callback. "Motu" is a veteran dog, but on this day was not his to finish the hour.

The second brace had last year's winner, K Del's Eagle Magnum Hotshot (BRITM/Kenny DeLong, owner/handler), braced with Foxy Lady Sadie (ISF/ Mike Fox, owner/handler). Both of these dogs are running for their second time at this event. Foxy Lady Sadie was lost in her bid to run in the final hour. "Hotshot" ran a good race, having six finds earning his spot in the final hour.

The third brace had Erin's Gypsy Lady (PF/Matthew Puckett, owner/ handler) running with Baker's Shining Star Duke (GSPM/Mike Baker, owner/handler). This brace was unique, showcasing the most consistent NBHA Amateur-winning dogs in this trial. Raintree Blue Moon has been invited and ran in four consecutive NBHA Invitationals. Blue Moon was unable to finish the hour this year but the opportunity for him to repeat again for next year is still a possibility. While Craig's Runin Roxie is running in her five appearances, Roxie handled her way to the front with four finds and finished the hour to earn a run in the callback.

The sixth brace had two newcomers to this stake: Sky Hawk's Little Rascal (ESM/Rob Warner, owner/handler) running with Glover's Flintstone (ESM/Jack Glover, owner/handler). Both dogs broke away to earn the right to run again. "Flint" was secured by his handler midway through the brace, ending his bid to run in the final. Rascal hunted with a purpose showing good manners on his birdwork and finishing the hour to secure the opportunity to run again.
