Monkeyshines Callme The Breeze Wins Open Shooting Dog

The NGSPA Region 19 Championships took place in Rhame, North Dakota, for the third consecutive year. The club once again offered Open All-Age and Open Shooting Championships.

The Jacobson Ranch was greener than anyone could recall, the result of heavy summer rains. Wild bird populations were not quite as strong this year as in the past two years, as nesting conditions were less than ideal. Nevertheless, almost every dog that stayed down for the hour had opportunities. Pheasant contacts were a bit more plentiful than grouse contacts this year. The weather cooperated for the most part, with cool mornings turning into warm afternoons, with highs in the upper 70s to low 80s. The beautiful rolling badlands crossed by brushy draws provided the perfect setting for a wild bird trial, as always.

NGSPA Region 19 Open Shooting Dog Championship

Monkeyshines Callme The Breeze Wins the Open Shooting Dog with a Lofty Shooting Dog Race; Macke's Jim Bob, Runner-up.

The Open Shooting Dog Championship drew a strong field, with several contenders showing the race and bird work worthy of recognition. When the dust settled, Monkeyshines Callme The Breeze, handled by Dan DiMambro, scouted by April DiMambro, and owned by Helmut Schoen, emerged at the top. "Breezy" had a forward, powerful ground race and two well-executed finds, leaving a lasting impression on the judges. Breezy wasted no time showing her intentions, breaking away with strength and determination. She handled the course with an attractive, forward

pattern, reaching the edges while maintaining a smooth rapport with her handler. Her first find came deep on the left, where she was found standing with intensity and style. All was in order at flush and shot. She scored again later with a mannerly piece of bird work, high and tight, showing the kind of composure that complements a big, reaching race. Breezy finished forward and to the front, still driving when time was called, leaving no doubt of her quality.

The runner-up champion was Macke's Jim Bob, handled by Dan DiMambro, scouted by April DiMambro, and owned by Abe and Katelyn Macke. Jim Bob also ran a strong, forward race that pushed the winner to the very end. Jim Bob applied himself with determination, handling kindly and showing great strength on the ground. He was credited with two solid finds, each handled with polish and style. His application to the course was consistent, and he too finished with plenty left in the tank, leaving the judges with a worthy choice for second. Both dogs represented their owners and handlers with distinction, and together they set a high standard for the stake.

The judges withheld championship placements in the Open All-Age, awarding first place to BMB's Supernova and second place to P W Lightening Bolt after

downgrading the stake to a Classic. The judges withheld third place. The stake drew some competitive entries, but unfortunately, some dogs ran all-age but did not locate game; other dogs had bird work but did not run all-age, and some dogs did neither.

The first- and second-place dogs both had productive bird work with power shooting dog applications on a warm day. "Nova" was handled by Brandon Blum and scouted by Robin Lambourn. Running in the fourth brace after a quick lunch, she scored an early find at 7 on a hen pheasant at the edge of a field after a powerful breakaway. Nova stood with style and composure with the bird pinned 10 yards in front of her nose. She continued making nice moves, especially at 20 along a ridge to the left, but slowed a bit in the last 30.

After some watering, Nova finished nicely at time on the other side of a fence to the right.

"Bolt" was handled by Rich Robertson Jr., scouted by Brandon Blum, and is owned by Keith and Bobbi Richardson. Running in the heat of the day in the fifth brace, Bolt

made some impressive swings in the first half of the brace, taking the fence to the right and front after breakaway. Bolt had an ambiguous stop to flush on a hen pheasant at 30. The judges could not see whether the bird left before or after the dog stopped moving, but Bolt was found standing with everything in order after the flush. Like the first-place dog, Bolt succumbed to the heat a bit in the last 30 minutes, which probably cost him the championship. Nevertheless, both dogs had strong performances in difficult running conditions.

Idaho Open Shooting Dog Championship

Named champion was Edge's Ghostbuster (PM), owned/handled by Gordy Jones, and scouted by Mike Robbins. The runner-up champion was Perkins Sawyer's Warrior (PM),

owned/handled by Christopher Perkins and scouted by Bill Owen.

Edge's Ghostbuster drew the third brace/third course of the stake. Right from the beginning, Ghostbuster ran up and over the hill towards the gate out of sight. Once riders climbed the first hill,

Ghostbuster could be seen in the distance moving along the fenceline towards the gate opening. He was later found pointed at 7 near the gate opening, and Sharptail grouse were seen leaving. The handler fired, grabbed the dog, and sent him on into the wide valley beyond the

gate. Ghostbuster disappeared from sight and shortly after was found pointed at 15 by the scout, and more Sharptails were produced. After his second find, Ghostbuster proceeded through the thick cover of the valley, over the hill, and down to the road crossing without delay. He climbed the following hill and through the upper gap towards the Quonset Hut. His final piece of work was in the last basin on Sharptails at 53. He finished the hour with plenty in the tank to the front.

Perkins Sawyer's Warrior drew the seventh brace/first course of the second day. He took off up the hill and caught the far-left ridge out of sight. The scout road up the ridge for a look and found Sawyer's Warrior pointed at 5. Handler arrived, dismounted, and flushed a pair of Huns in front of a steady dog. Quickly, Sawyer's Warrior was sent up the center ridge and disappeared over the top. When the riders arrived at the top, Sawyer's Warrior was seen on the far spine in the distance and was rounded up and sent down the long ridge towards the road crossing. Right before the road crossing, Sawyer's Warrior and his bracemate were found pointed at 28. Both handlers flushed, but no birds were produced. Sawyer's Warrior crossed the road and proceeded deep to the front into the following rolling hills and long valley. He was later seen by the sharp turn in the course, reconnected with his handler, and sent into the final valley for a great finish.

Edge's Ghostbuster drew the third brace/sixth course. He took off up the first hill towards the gate opening out of sight. Ghostbuster was found pointed at 8 near the gate opening, and the handler flushed Sharptails in front of him. He was then sent through the gate and proceeded far to the front into the wide valley. He took the whole valley, proceeded to the top of the hill, was sent off the left side by the handler, and later shown towards the road crossing in a very impressive move. Ghostbuster was

then found pointed at 43 right before the road crossing, and the handler produced a large covey of Huns. He was then sent across the road and through the upper gap into the last valley for a large finish.

Touch's Too Much drew the sixth brace/sixth course. In the heat of a warm afternoon, Too Much started off strong, away from the Quonset Hut and up the far hill. He disappeared to the front towards the group of trees in the distance and was later found pointed on the edge of the trees at 12. As riders approached, a group of Sharptails was seen leaving, and Too Much stood, watching admirably. He was then sent along through the upper forest path and far down the wide ravine towards the gap. After the gap, he proceeded up across the flat and down towards the road in a great finish in the challenging heat.

In first place was Black Rocks Snow Goose, owned by Nick Cummins, handled by Christopher Perkins, and scouted by Robbie Thompson. Goose drew the sixth brace/sixth course of the day. Goose was sent over the edge into the ravine by his handler and was seen

taking the large climb of the main ridge out of sight. Minutes went by with no trace of Goose, and once riders proceeded to the top, Goose appeared above the upper tree line and was sent along the upper bench. He was seen disappearing out of sight again, far to the front, and reappearing again before the descent to the road crossing. Goose then had to be gathered up by his handler, and once they reconnected, he proceeded across the road and over the hill out of sight for his final move. He then reappeared at 58 and was quickly sent by his handler for a strong finish to the front.

Affinity, owned and handled by Austin Turley and scouted by Gordy Jones, drew the second brace/second course in the morning. Right

off the breakaway, she was seen disappearing out of sight to the front. After being absent for a few minutes, she reappeared up front just after passing the group of trees. She proceeded across the middle flat and was sent down the long ravine far to the front towards the gap. She made it through the gap and was sent up across the valley and at 52 established point. A covey of Huns was flushed by her handler for a great find. She was sent up the long hill for a well-presented finish.

Haney's Tennessee Fire, owned and handled by Gordy Jones and scouted by Austin Turley, drew the eighth brace/ second course. Fire left the breakaway in a hurry and was found backing his bracemate at 5 and stood through a find of Sharptails

from his bracemate. He then disappeared to the front for some time and later was seen way down on the upper flat, headed towards the Quonset Hut. He reconnected with his handler towards the end of the ravine near the gap and was sent up towards it. After going through the gap, he went up the long hill and finished towards the top, doing a respectable job.

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NATIONAL AMATEUR PRAIRIE SHOOTING DOG CHAMPIONSHIP

Erin's Rebel Attraction Named Champion; Notorious Dominator's Reserve, Runner-up

This year, 34 dogs took on the six challenging courses at the Buena Vista Grasslands at Wisconsin Rapids, Wisconsin, home to the largest population of Greater Prairie Chicken east of the Mississippi. Year in and year out, the grasslands have produced an impressive number of chickens on which to hold a quality championship. Despite pressures from other interests and developments in the area, the Wisconsin DNR has committed substantial resources to provide for this population of chickens. It is truly a unique place, having hosted bird dog events for more than 40 years. It has been the only home of the National Amateur Prairie Chicken Championship since its inception. Easily, the Greater Prairie Chicken is the most common upland bird on these lands, with the

occasional pheasant and woodcock.

With a strong partnership between the field trial club, the Wisconsin DNR, and the University of Wisconsin at Stevens Point, a primary provider of future Wisconsin Wildlife employees, along with local residents, this event has proven to be a win-win-win for all.

Noticeably lacking this year throughout the prairies west of the Mississippi were large, healthy coveys of Sharptail grouse and Prairie chickens. Pheasant and Huns seemed to have fared better. There's been a debate about why, since no one event or source provides an obvious cause. Nevertheless, the lack of coveys was also evident on the Wisconsin Grasslands, and most contracts were single or paired birds, with an occasional small covey

scattered in. The good news is that there are still a good number of birds that, if blessed with an average winter and calm nesting season, should do well in 2026.

Once again, we give thanks to all who help with this event, which runs hand-in-hand with the National Open Prairie Chicken Championship. Ed Liermann, year in and year out, does a yeoman's job of putting together all the necessary pieces to make things work. Gary Wolf has been the flawless dog wagon driver for some 20+ years. Mark Johnson works with me to co-chair the event and ensures it runs smoothly. Many other people pitch in to help guard roads, scout, and marshal, and it's all very appreciated.

Judging this year were two capable men. Rich Boumeester, having won here numerous times with his dogs, knows the challenges and the uniqueness of this event. His partner, Mike Vicari, also has been a lifelong patron of the sport as part of a highly successful family with performing bird dogs. Both gentlemen were attentive and supportive, and in the end, their decisions were well-received.

This year's champion, Erin's Rebel Attraction, distanced himself from the rest of the field with an impressive effort. In this reporter's opinion, his performance was never really challenged. Rebel Attraction is owned, raised, and handled by Brian Sheehan of Carol Stream, Illinois. He's a strongly built, handsome 5-year-old male pointer. He was in the first brace on the third day with

Ed Liermann's Cedar Creek Anthem, who failed to stop when birds flushed almost immediately after being turned loose. That gave Attraction the course to himself.

During Anthem's mishap, Attraction was making a deep forward move to the north, and while the course turned west, Attraction headed back to gain the front and had a nice stop-to-flush on a covey of five chickens. Going west and after crossing Griffith Road, Attraction once again showed his wheels and once again had a good stop-to-flush on a single chicken at 18. After crossing W, Attraction drove south, found and pointed a covey of four chickens at 28, thought to be the same covey pointed by our runner-up champion, Notorious Dominator's Reserve, in the first brace. Attraction's style, character, and manners were of high quality.

Shortly after, at 31, Attraction pointed again, and after an extended flushing attempt with handler closing in on the dog to release him, a single chicken flushed from directly in front of the dog. Impressively, Attraction's character and style never flinched as he stood like a soldier and was more confident at this point than the

handler! Attraction continued the second half impressively, reaching into the country and handling kindly. His performance set a very high bar that was never really threatened by the other competitors.

Our runner-up champion, Notorious Dominator's Reserve, a 2-year-old pointer male youngster owned and handled by John Mathys, was braced by Erin's Wild Atlantic Way with Sean Derrig. John Mathys's Reserve, after crossing W, headed straight into the course south, found and pointed a covey of three Greater Prairie chickens with high intensity and style and perfect manners. Reserve challenged by tough cover gained determination and independence as his hour progressed, but relented when called on. His performance never faded despite very challenging cover. Like he began, he finished strong. A performance easily good enough to win most years.

I won't go through all of the braces, but will mention those that made their way into the discussion.

In the fourth brace, Rip Nation, a pointer male handled by Scott Jordan, and Worsham's Spitfire, another pointer male handled by Joe

Worsham, shared a divided find at 8. Spitfire had a good find on a covey of four chickens with Nation backing at 10 off to the left, with all in order. Nation had a good find on a single at 13 and a stop-to-flush on three chickens at 38. Both dogs hunted well and finished their bids.

In the fifth brace, Notorious Southern Son, a pointer male handled by John Mathys, had a nice find at 35 on a single and a stop-to-flush at 40 on a single. Son admirably prevailed on an extremely challenging course to finish well.

Notorious Sweet Cargo, in the 14th brace, a pointer female handled by John Mathys, had a good find at 35 on a single and ran a pleasant race.

With the announcements and congratulations given, another year's event is formally in the books.

Lunches and dinners were delicious and timely. Dave Hughes and Mark Hughes once again provided invaluable support, supplying water tubs along the course and with Dave driving the dog wagon. Their efforts were especially important given the dry heat. Mary Tracy and Muriel

Primm handled numerous behind-the-scenes details essential to the trial's success.

We offer a special commendation to those who consistently step forward—no matter the task—to help the trial run smoothly: Greg Strausbaugh, Stacey Goodie, Bobby Verderosa, Casey Tracy, and Kevin Joyce. Whether picking up bird feed, catching or planting birds, assisting with the drawing, handling judges' books, or marshaling, these individuals always bring reliability and a positive attitude.

The club extends heartfelt thanks to the many handlers and owners who supported this year's event. Multiple dogs were capably shown by Doug Ray, George Tracy, Mike Tracy, Matt Basilone, Mark Hughes, and Brooke Lanning.

Our appreciation goes as well to the Southern Bird Hunters Association (SBHA) for their support and dedication to our sport. Their website provides detailed, up-to-date standings and information about their seasonal awards. Please check it out.

Eukanuba generously provided a handlers' dinner, dog food for the

winners, and beautifully embroidered jackets for the judges. We are deeply grateful for their ongoing support. Jeff Haggis and Lion Country Supply again contributed \$100 gift certificates to each of the four honorable mentions.

Judging this year's championship were Tony Bingham of Shelby, North Carolina, and Aaron McAfee of Clinton, Illinois. Both men rode hard throughout, giving every dog its full hour and evaluating performances with fairness and consistency. They sought a forward-running dog with independence, stamina, and demonstrated bird-handling ability—and they found their champions.

The Winners

Champion

Four-year-old Miller's Promotional Upgrade, an orange and white pointer male owned by David Steele and handled by Doug Ray, delivered the defining performance of the championship. Running in the 16th brace, he broke away from the far end of the outer loop and immediately established a strong, forward pattern. His aggressive swing toward the tower—one of the most difficult moves on the course—was executed flawlessly before he met Doug in the valley. After being heeled to the rock pile and sent on, Promotional Upgrade resumed his forward drive with confidence.

His bird work was exceptional throughout the hour. He stopped to flush in high grass, then pinned birds on relocation along the autumn olives almost immediately. At 24, he was found standing again with perfect manners at the end of the main breakaway hedgerow. Minutes later, he recorded a high-style find in the sorghum feed patch, followed by another just uphill. After a substantial sequence of finds, he demonstrated maturity by shifting back into a powerful, forward ground race—a challenge for many dogs after heavy

bird contact.

He navigated the risky right side of the course with skill, an area where many dogs become lost or overextend themselves. Promotional Upgrade handled it with maturity, rejoining the front smoothly. He crested the tower hill with ease before charging up the ridge, where he recorded his final find. He finished the hour out of sight, delivering a complete and polished championship performance.

Runner-up Champion

Miller's Lock and Loaded, owned by Bill and Muriel Primm and handled by George Tracy, set an early benchmark for the championship from the very first brace. His movement across the grounds was fluid and confident. He scored a stylish find as we hit the autumn olives. He was found standing at the end of the breakaway hedgerow with all in order for the flush. He scored his third find on the left side of Locust Grove. He made strong forward casts but handled nicely throughout Locust Grove. He was charged with an unproductive at the end of Locust Grove. He continued a strong ground effort, making the tough conditions look easy. As we started on the outer loop, he locked up for his fourth well-mannered find. He completed the outer loop with precision, and George called point for a fifth find up on the hill. All was again in order, and he was released with a minute to go and flew up the hill, going out of sight at time. This was another fine performance under tough conditions, earning a well-deserved runner-up title.

Honorable Mentions (Top Contenders)

The four dogs judged closest behind the winners were:

- Miller's Special Cinderella, handled by George Tracy
- Miller's Upgraded Patent, handled by Doug Ray
- Mohawk Mill Lady Justice, handled by Matt Basilone
- The Gray Ghost, handled by Matt Basilone

Each delivered strong, high-quality performances under challenging conditions.

The Running

The opening day of competition began warm and dry, conditions that would test the endurance and discipline of each entry. The morning started with A Buccaneer under Doug Ray, whose bid ended early when the tracker was required around the 15-minute mark. Miller's Lock and Loaded, also in the first brace, immediately established himself as a top contender with fluid movement and multiple well-mannered finds.

Smoke'N'Mirrors (M. Basilone) and Deena Jet Boyer (M. Tracy) followed in Brace 2. Despite both being accomplished winners, neither was able to overcome the conditions. Deena Jet, stepping up from an exceptional derby season, carded a stylish find and an unproductive before an infraction ended her run. Smoke'N'Mirrors had difficulty in Locust Grove and was picked up.

The morning concluded with a standout effort from Miller's Special Cinderella, who delivered five well-spaced finds and a strong ground race, placing her among the closest competitors to the winners. Hatteras

Rip Tide, her brace mate, showed a bold race before requiring the tracker at thirty.

The afternoon brought heat, but The Gray Ghost (M. Basilone) handled it well, notching two solid finds and finishing strongly enough to earn an honorable mention. His brace mate, Parkway (M. Tracy), recorded a stylish find before the handler elected to pick up.

Next up was Two Spot Tommy (D. Ray) and Miller's Little Duce Coupe (G. Tracy), each displayed heart but were undone on their second bird contacts.

The final brace of day one featured High Drive Drinkaby (M. Tracy) and Miller's Special Upgrade (M. Tracy). Both dogs made some nice moves on the ground, but with each only having an unproductive both handlers elected to pick up prior to the hour.

The second day opened with Pal's Prestigious Pete (M. Tracy) standing early but self-relocating after a prolonged flush. Miller's Promotional Upgrade (D. Ray) delivered his winning performance (see write-up under the winners).

Wild Covey Derecho (M. Basilone) ran a wide, attractive race but never connected on birds before his handler called for the tracker. Sellers Pashca Skylos (D. Ray), after an early bird contact, was up shortly thereafter.

Backcountry Jacob (M. Tracy) logged a covey find but was undone by an infraction on his second contact. Mohawk Mill King Pen (M. Basilone) had a good find and was running well before disappearing at 35.

Faithful (M. Tracy) stood early but suffered an unproductive and was later missing, while Hatteras High Tide (D. Ray) notched a classy find before the handler picked up.

Miller's High Heat Index (M. Tracy) required the tracker at 35, while Mohawk Mill Lady Justice (M. Basilone) used the conditions to her advantage with multiple stylish finds and a strong finish, securing an honorable mention.

Miller's Automatic Upgrade (G. Tracy) suffered an early unproductive before being lost at 35, while Miller's Upgraded Patent (D. Ray) recorded a polished find and completed the hour.

Heavy overnight storms continued most of the morning and postponed the start until early afternoon. When the running began, Steel Valley Raven (M. Tracy) delivered two stylish finds and a bold race before trouble in the Black Hole forced the handler to use the tracker. Backwoods Dine & Dash (M. Hughes) carded a find and an unproductive before an infraction ended his attempt.

Fort River's Lucky Charm (M. Basilone) produced three impeccable finds—including a particularly impressive one at the end of the breakaway hedgerow with pheasant going everywhere—before a slight lapse of manners on his fourth contact stopped his bid. Miller's Strolling For Gold (G. Tracy) was withdrawn after his first bird contact.

Mohawk Mill Bad Boy (M. Basilone) backed Cool Hand Luke (M. Tracy) on an early find before Luke was lost at 20. Bad Boy continued with a promising race and a find on the ridge but faltered shortly into the outer loop.

Since we had some early pickups, we elected to continue. Calico's Sky's The Limit (M. Tracy) and Miller's Promotional Upgrade (D. Ray) were off from the far outer Loop, and both made big casts to the front. Sky's The Limit swung to the far right, and point was called towards the pond. Out of my sight, there was some cautioning by the handler, and her bid ended. Upgrade was detailed under the winners.

Mo's Curtain Call (M. Tracy) produced two excellent finds before a bird rose unexpectedly in front of her, ending her chance. Mohawk Mill Jacked Up (M. Basilone) delivered two finds before an unproductive prompted his handler to pick up.

Fog delayed the morning start. Erin's Envy (M. Tracy) displayed admirable manners on the breakaway hedgerow while B K Lapaloma Blanca (B. Lanning) failed

to back and was up early. Envy added a stop-to-flush and a find on the ridge before a minor infraction on the outer loop ended his run.

Erin's Big Casino (M. Tracy) ran ambitiously before being lost at the end of Locust Grove. Mohawk Mill Patriot (M. Basilone) produced two fine finds before an infraction ended his challenge.

Smooth Talking (D. Ray) suffered a break on the flush at one minute. Miller's Southern Gossip (G. Tracy) displayed a strong race and a pretty find but was withdrawn after an unproductive.

Mohawk Mill Gangster (M. Basilone) built momentum with multiple stylish finds, though an abrupt turn back ended his effort. Millers Customized Upgrade (G. Tracy) was undone by an unproductive and failure to back.

Waybetter Rebel (M. Tracy) was up early after an infraction, and Hatteras Sand Storm (D. Ray) was withdrawn following a find and an unproductive.

The final brace on Thursday featured Hard Truth (D. Ray) and Miller's Heat Seeker (G. Tracy). This brace started from the main breakaway. It was an exciting brace from start to finish. Heat Seeker scored the first two finds with Hard Truth backing. Hard Truth answered with two finds of his own with Heat Seeker backing. They traded casts for much of the hour. At the end of the outer loop, both were standing with neither handler able to locate a bird. They were relocated, but neither could pin the tricky bird. As they were gathered up to go on, a hen took flight. Both dogs were sent on for the final minute of the hour.

The final morning began with Miller's Hopped Up Version (M. Hughes) recording a stop-to-flush and a find before being lost at 39. Pine Straw Hot Chocolate (M. Tracy) showed steadiness under pressure as a flushing bird flew directly at her. She ran well but was stopped by consecutive unproductives.

Two-time defending champion Jolene Jolene (M. Tracy) ran a bold race but was lost without bird contact. Hatteras Storm Watch (D. Ray) carded a stylish find before his handler opted to pick up.

I'm Spartacus (D. Ray) showed range but was withdrawn, while BK Real McCoy (B. Lanning) had multiple well-mannered finds, which included a difficult extended flush and a stop-to-flush. He finished the hour.

Trumped (M. Tracy) and Saddled Up Sadie (M. Hughes) began the afternoon with a divided find amid considerable bird movement. Trumped added a second find with Sadie backing. Both handlers elected to end the brace shortly after the half-hour mark.

Bittersweet War Cry (M. Tracy) and CS Four Season's Gunner (D. Ray) each ran strong, forward races, but both handlers elected to pick up due to the heat prior to the hour.

The final dogs of the championship were Miller's Extreme Heat (M. Tracy), who required the tracker at 25, and Absolute Dominator (D. Ray), who handled smoothly before an unproductive at 30 ended his attempt.

The NBHA Sharptail Championship is a highly contested championship held on one of the toughest venues in the sport of field trials. For the fourth year in a row, the trial drew over 40 dogs, with a total of 42 coming to the line vying for the title of champion. The Namekagon Barrens provides a unique challenge to both dog and handler, with both the openness of the prairie and the cover of the grouse woods. Justin Crook of Jasper, Missouri, and Scott Hadley of Sayre, Oklahoma, took time out of their schedules to judge the championship. Both Crook and Hadley are no strangers to quality dogs. They both compete across the country with their own string of dogs. They were attentive, as well as helpful, during their time in the saddle.

Those earning top laurels this year were handled by two men who are no strangers to the podium. Pointer male Grouse Trails Little Bud was named champion, owned and handled by John McKellop. Bandit Hill Bess, a pointer female, earned the runner-up title for handler Paul Cook and owner Klaus Schmidt.

With birds being at a premium this year, the top two dogs covered the ground well, were biddable, and handled their bird work with style and class. Bud ran in the 14th brace on Friday morning, while Bess drew the ninth brace, which ran on Thursday morning. During his time on the ground, Bud ran strong to the front. His stylish bird work included a find at 10. The birds were not interested in lifting, and he was able to withstand birds running. McKellop was able to lift the birds after a noteworthy relocation. Bud also had another clean piece of bird work at 40. Bess was biddable during her hour and had a find at 30. She continued to hunt diligently during the hour and had an unproductive around 40.

Dogs' performances worth noting include Cates Rocket Girl, who ran the first brace of the championship and carded a woodcock find for handler Zach Erne. The English setter female is owned by David Cates. English setter male Boatrights Iron Eagle, handled by James Kleve and owned by Terry Boatright, also turned in a solid performance but was unable to point any birds during his hour. Crouse's Comeback Kid, a pointer male, owned and handled by Mary Sue Schalk, had an unproductive, forward ground race and a breach of manners at the end of the hour, thus ending his bid.

Outcast Siren Song, an English setter female, was fancy on the ground and had a forward ground race. She, too, was unable to produce a bird during the hour for handler James Kleve and owner John Clough. Tom Waite handled Foxy Lady Sadie, an Irish setter female, owned by Mike Fox. Sadie was another dog the judges wanted to commend for her efforts over the course of her hour.

The companion Jeff Hintz Derby Classic drew and ran 24 young

competitors. Scott Hadley returned to the judicial saddle, joined by Steve Snyder, who previously judged this championship in 2022. A trio of pointer males took the table. John McKellop once again rang the bell, taking first with Grouse Trails Chippewa Warrior and second with Grouse Trails Legend. Finishing out the placements was Mike Taylor with Lil Elhew Chief Snakefeather.

The Open Puppy stake completed the event. Todd Manns and Brad Peterson filled the judicial role for the final stake. First place went to Jennifer Taylor's Hackberry's Snake Lady McGee, a snappy liver and white pointer female. Littermates took the second and third place spots, bred by John Clough. Second place went to Clough's Mischief Brew, an English setter female, owned and handled by John Clough. Braden Persinger owns and handled the third-place puppy, also an English setter female, Persinger's Five Roses.

The championship continues to provide memorable performances for all. This event would not be possible without club members who dedicate their energy to flagging courses,

course to herself with a late scratch. Pearl, a super fancy female pointer, broke away under warm conditions. With a very wet spring and then a dry summer, everyone knew that birds would be at a premium. Pearl, running on the Beaver Hole course, did not disappoint. Pearl stopped in the alders at 22 just off the edge of the course. Stolgitis walked out in front to flush with the judge, and as he was doing so, the grouse doubled back and blew out in back of the dog. The handler took Pearl on, and they headed across the powerline. Once they got across, Pearl would stop again at 37 on the course, but in more open timber. Not a very likely bird spot. Given her style and confidence, Stolgitis flushed, and a grouse erupted just as he stepped in front of the dog. Pearl finished the hour going strong in the warmest part of the day.

The runner-up came in the seventh brace. Chasehill Snoop Dog, owned by Bill McFadden and handled by John Stolgitis, ran a very strong race. He was braced with Snuffmill Callie, a fancy female setter. Both ran really well, but it was Snoop that had the good fortune on this day. After scouring the first part of the course, Snoop was rewarded with a woodcock at 32, and with that, a sweep of the trial for Bill and John.

While the spring was a wet one and the summer was a dry one, the wild bird game can be a challenge, to say the least. Added to that, our entries were down this year for a variety of reasons, but most call it life. That being said, birds were seen on all the courses, so they were out there to be found. Once again, we could not ask for nicer weather, great

people, classy dogs, and fabulous food to make this such a fun event. What is better than a warm fall evening, eating steak and lobster while catching up with old friends after a day of running dogs?

Without the support of people both far and wide, this event would not happen. The Mid-Coast Maine Field Trial Club would like to thank Purina once again for its gracious support. Each and every owner that enters a dog, whether it's one or 10, makes this a successful trial. 52nd Running

The 52nd running of the NGSPA Pheasant Championships marked our second year at the Mingo Sportsmen's Club Field Trial Grounds in Bloomingdale, Ohio, and what an outstanding event it was. We had a fantastic turnout and are grateful to every one of you who traveled and spent your time with us.

A heartfelt thank you goes to Bill Monk and the Mingo Sportsmen's Club for once again opening these premier grounds to the NGSPA and allowing our championship to follow the National Open Pheasant Shooting Dog Championship. This scheduling provided our handlers and dogs the advantage of abundant pheasant populations, and it showed.

Mingo's terrain demands a true bird dog: one that hunts with intelligence, uses the wind efficiently, and shows determination across vast open country. The decision to relocate this championship to Mingo has clearly proven to be the right one, both for the sport and for the dogs we evaluate.

Grounds and Conditions

Although the weather had been dry leading into the trial, the grounds were in excellent shape. Rolling fields of native grasses and large, healthy food plots stretched across the property. Scenting conditions were favorable, and nearly every dog encountered birds, with many recording multiple finds. Several braces produced coveys of a dozen or more pheasants erupting at once.

With approximately 300 pheasants released, along with hundreds of birds still present from the prior event, opportunities for bird work were plentiful, and the level of competition intense.

NGSPA Pheasant Open Derby (14 Dogs)

On October 2, we opened the Pheasant Championship with the Open Derby—seven braces of up-and-coming young dogs, several ready to card their first pheasant find. With Judge Sherri Tangsrud delayed in arriving, Abraham Macke stepped in to judge. We ran a 30-minute out-and-back course. As the first brace broke away that sunny Thursday afternoon and topped the first hill, large coveys lifted, an early sign of just how many pheasants were on the grounds. Fortunately, these youngsters didn't see the birds and give chase; they paused only to listen to the cackling as the coveys crossed the field.

MSK's Fast Eddie in Brace 2A, owned and handled by Dan DiMambro, lived up to his name and stayed in high gear throughout. The judges put him on top for his bold, forward moves across the terrain and fluid gait that demanded attention, marking him as a youngster with clear all-age potential. Though he

reached out, he stayed connected when called and recorded one very stylish find.

Second place went to Chicoree's A Stitch in Time (6B), owned and handled by Fred Ryan. This young dog separated himself with a strong forward run and polished handling. Although birdless, his ground application distinguished him. His range wasn't as consistent as the winner's, but the judges noted a strong foundation and bright future.

Third place was awarded to MSPW A Need For Speed (5B), owned by Keith and Bobbi Richardson and handled by Dan DiMambro. Compared with the top two, she showed more hunt with slightly less range, but impressed with her independence, terrain use, and a stylish, steady point—maturity beyond her years. These juvenile dogs are on track for outstanding field trial careers, and we look forward to their future accomplishments.

Depending on weather and conditions, the first and last braces at Mingo are often the toughest due to pheasants pairing up and running around, in addition to the morning

"salted" birds.

This brace had judges, handlers, and spectators on the edge of their saddles as both dogs produced an abundance of bird work throughout the hour. Rommel carded seven finds, one divided find, and two backs, while Woody recorded four finds plus one divided find. The brace started from the breakaway field near the parking area. Rommel notched two finds before the rock-pile area of the road, and the pair was later found standing on a divided find in tall grasses past the food plots before the power lines. Both dogs hunted independently, displayed impeccable style and manners, and finished to the front. Woody was found standing at time just past the rock pile as you come back towards the breakaway fields. Judges noted several dogs could have won this competitive stake, but this brace set the standard. Both dogs did an excellent job for their two amateur handlers. The decision ultimately came down to "splitting hairs." Rommel sealed the win by showing slightly more of the shooting dog application they preferred, while Woody's range was a bit further.

As the championship continued, temperatures warmed, and more pheasants moved in the midday sun, tempting conditions that led to breaches of manners for a number of entries.

Out of Brace 6A came the champion, Amateur Shooting Dog winner Slaterock's Mountain Heart, owned by the Dynkiewicz family and handled by Dan DiMambro. Rommel carded numerous finds and kept his manners in check throughout the hour. A seasoned dog, he rolled through the Mingo grounds, consistently finding birds off the paths as he dug in and hunted. Rommel's style and composure were exemplary, earning him the win.

Runner-up champion Monkeyshines Callme The Breeze in Brace 4B is owned by Helmut Schoen and handled by Dan DiMambro. "Breezy" wore her all-age wheels, maintained a consistent forward race, and spaced her finds well over the hour. Her style on pheasant coveys was outstanding. Judges remarked that the difference between champion and runner-up was primarily the number of clean finds—it was that close.

This was a large and very competitive stake judged by Mark Calder and Cory Roy. As pheasants began to covey up, it made for thrilling moments when a dog went on point and multiple birds erupted in different directions.

The champion, a seasoned performer at the Pheasant

Championship with multiple recent placements, was In Country's Hurricane Jane, co-owned by Robert Reynolds and Chris Young and handled by Chris Goegan. Drawn in Brace 12A, "Janie" ran the last brace of the day. With temperatures easing and a light breeze, conditions were ideal. From the breakaway, Janie was all business, carding several finds over the hour and maintaining excellent style and manners on her game. Early in the brace, it was clear she would be hard to beat; her application through the terrain and off-the-path finds stood out. She stood like a statue as pheasants cackled overhead on the flush and ran a strong, forward, classic Shooting Dog race.

Runner-up champion Two Ponds Blanco Roux, owned by Jason

Bernard "Bud" "Buddy" Bertolina, the youngest of three boys, was born in the coal mining town of Hahntown, Pennsylvania, to Frank and Mary (Brocco) Bertolina on October 19, 1934, and died peacefully on Wednesday, October 15, 2025.

Bud married Doris Ralph on October 22, 1955, and they had two children, Mark and Teresa. They all predeceased him.

Bud came to Toledo in the 1950s to work as a hairdresser in his Uncle Jim's salon, Burton's, until the early 1970s, when he took a job in maintenance at St. Charles Hospital. He retired from St. Charles.

Bud was an auxiliary sheriff's deputy in Lucas County and Genoa for many years and would ride his horse Demon at festivals (apple butter, Lucas County

Fair) and parades, controlling crowds.

Bud was a true outdoorsman. He loved hunting, fishing, gardening, NASCAR, and animals. He could train any animal to do anything. His horse, Demon, would bow and pray. Sandy, his dog, would get a beer from the fridge and bring it to him. He bred and raised a National number one-ranked German Shorthaired pointer named Rip.

Bud was also a great cook. His Italian mother and aunts were great teachers. He made the best Italian bread. You never knew what you were eating at Bud's house; it could be smelt, perch, quail, pheasant, duck, or deer. A memorable meal was pheasant under glass. He just told all of us that it was chicken. Didn't matter what it really was. It was just chicken!

Bud owned the Double B stables

where he boarded, raised, and trained horses. Every year, he had the most wonderful hobo dinner on the stable property, and everyone looked forward to it.

Tom Davis adds, "Bud was the last surviving member of the group of men who formed the NGSPA in Toledo. The others, Paul Kiles, Bill Wooten, and Vince Herr, have all since passed. Bud is one who helped me get started in American Field type field trials."

Bud is survived by granddaughters Alicia (Michael) Pemberton, Angela (Lance) Fisher, Andrea (Andy) Klunk, Alivia (Michael) Ford, and 11 great-grandchildren, with one more on the way.

Touch's Too Much Named Champion; Carbonado's Silver Sage, Runner-up

The Region 19 of the Amateur Field Trial Clubs of America held its annual Amateur Shooting Dog Championship at the Namekagon Barrens Wildlife Area, the first weekend in October. This year's field consisted of 22 dogs: 17 pointers, four Vizslas, and one setter. Eleven handlers from as far away as Montana, Missouri, and Texas came to compete on sharptail grouse.

The Namekagon Barrens Wildlife Area is owned by the State of Wisconsin and managed by the Department of Natural Resources. The nearly 6,000-acre wildlife area was established in the mid-1950s for the preservation of its unique barrens habitat and rare native species, most notably, the sharp-tailed grouse. A strong partnership between the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources and local field trial clubs helps make these unique grounds available for field trials through a special permit.

This year, unseasonably warm temperatures and recent prescribed burning in some areas of the Barrens Wildlife Area presented extra challenges for Chairman Bill Stapleton, who worked tirelessly to ensure that each participant had the best possible opportunity to showcase their dog. Each of the four continuous courses cut through challenging terrain comprising sand hills, scrub oak, and native prairie. The rolling landscape provided many opportunities for a great view of dogs working amidst the picturesque fall prairie grasses and colorful scrub oak.

Judging for this year's trial was ably handled by two well-qualified gentlemen, professional handlers/trainers, James Kleve and Justin Crook. Much thanks to each of these men for riding for three straight days in high temperatures and for staying ever-alert and attentive to each and every dog. The judges' final decisions

were well received by all.

A judges' dinner was held on Saturday evening. The food was outstanding, and a good time was had by all.

Special thanks to Fran and Todd Manns for hosting a post-trial dinner for all participants at their home, located a few miles from the grounds. The meal was fantastic, and an opportunity to unwind and celebrate a successful trial was greatly appreciated.

The Winners

Touch's Too Much, handled by Austin Turley and owned by Keith Wright, was declared champion. The orange and white pointer, "Chief," powered through the tough cover with enthusiasm, yet maintained good contact with his handler. After 25 minutes of hard hunting, Chief stopped at a patch of scrub oak cover, but no birds were found. As if to make amends, the pointer put on a show just 10 minutes later when he made a bold cast around the south edge of "sharp-tail slew" and came to a confident stop along the edge of tall cover. His handler called point and held his hat high, and as if on cue, sharp-tail grouse took flight

from various points around the slew. As the judges and gallery made their way to the dog, single birds continued to lift on all sides. Chief's style and manners were exemplary on point despite an egregious backing infraction from his bracemate, who was collected up. But the show wasn't over yet—several more birds the dog had pinned took flight as his handler flushed and fired. All was in order. Chief continued on and finished the hour with a strong ground performance, but no additional birds were found. Earlier this fall, Chief was named runner-up at the Region 9 Amateur Shooting Dog Championship, and he was declared champion of the Big Sky Open Shooting Dog Championship in the spring.

Carbonado's Silver Sage was named as the runner-up. Handled by Austin Turley and owned by Michelle Turley, the black and white pointer female had an attractive forward race and hit all the likely objectives during her hour. Sage had a beautiful find at 20 along an edge of scrub oak. Backed by her bracemate, Sage stood confident and proud as her handler approached, flushed a covey of sharptail, and fired. No additional birds were found on a

second stop at 40. Sage finished the hour strong and to the front. Sage has a history of strong performances at the Region 19 Championships. She was the champion of the 2024 Region 19 Amateur Shooting Dog Championship and placed first in the 2021 Region 19 Open Derby.

The organizers would like to thank Purina and SportDOG for sponsoring the AFTCA Region 19 Amateur Shooting Dog Championship. Purina provided bags of Pro Plan for the winners, and SportDOG provided a

training collar for the champion. Their contributions and continued support are vital to the competition and are much appreciated.

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MINNESOTA GROUSE DOG CHAMPIONSHIP

Over The Hill Try Named Champion; Over The Hill Morgan, Runner-up

The 2025 renewal of the Minnesota Grouse Championship commenced on October 6 on the Rum River State Forest near Mora, Minnesota. Eighteen setters and 10 pointers competed over two and a half days to name a champion and runner-up on native Ruffed grouse and woodcock. To be named champion, a Ruffed grouse must be pointed.

Opinions vary across regions as to the relative difficulty of pointing dogs handling Ruffed grouse, but be assured, a clean find on a grouse was at a premium during this Championship. Birds were there on

each of the six courses, but extremely dry conditions hindered optimal scenting for the dogs. The Minnesota Grouse Dog Association thanks the club members who came together for this annual Championship. From cutting and marking courses to marshaling braces and providing food and refreshments, there was nothing left to chance; another well-run wild bird championship. Judges for this renewal were Vance Butler from New Era, Michigan, and Paul Cook from Danbury, Wisconsin. Vance was a long-time professional handler and trainer for well over 20 years. He has competed in and won this championship along with

many others. His experience and attentiveness are exactly what should be sought after in a judge. Your scribe has been competing for 20 years in field trials as an amateur and turned professional in 2021. It was a great privilege to be able to judge for the Club on these grounds. The Club would also like to thank our sponsors Purina and OnX Hunt for their continued support.

Emerging as a first-time champion was pointer female Over the Hill Try, owned and handled by Rod Lein. Try ran on Course 6 in the fifth brace. She perfectly handled grouse at 26 and ran to all the right places while maintaining consistent contact with her handler. Runner-up champion was last year's champion here, pointer female Over the Hill Morgan, owned by Robert Zielke and also handled by Rod Lein. She is a littermate to the champion. Morgan laid down a consistent forward pattern, pointing woodcock at 4 and again at 8, then backing her brace mate at 12. She finished going away in the big open timber at the end of Course 7.

The Running

The running began with Northwoods Cedar (E. Saetre) and Clover Valley's Mulak (Furnish). Cedar was hitting the swamp edge

deep on Course 1, but as dry as it was, she eventually caught the other side. She was brought back on course but picked up at 57. Mack's bell stopped before the half. As handler approached, he relocated, and a bird got up just as he stopped again. Handler continued flushing and produced another Grouse. Mack finished the hour.

Bad Habits (Mergens/Lein) was braced with Grouse Trails Bathilda (McKellop). Lucy had a nice find deep left of course at 25, where she had to stay with a running bird as it took us a while to reach her. Unfortunately, she went with the shot to end her bid. Tillie finished the hour without bird work.

Blind Faith (Pharris) was pushing the front hard. She stopped at 35 deep right of course, but her handler had gotten behind. She stood a grouse for what was likely several minutes until the bird began to walk away on her, and she put it up upon relocating to end her hour. One Acre Wood Lucky's (Rector) bell clearly stopped for quite a while just before time was called, but an extended search failed to produce.

Berg Brothers Doc Holliday (Bukovich) was hitting a lick, reached the road, and was eventually picked up at the trucks. Woods R Callin Apollo (Frahm) got down to business and was rewarded with a woodcock find, finishing his hour.

One Acre Wood Bandit (Rector) pointed directly on course at 7 with a grouse flushed from deadfall, all in order, and finished his hour. Over the Hill Try (Lein) was reported above.

Planet Queen (Anderson) had a nice woodcock find at 12 but was picked up at 40. Grouse Trails Bud (McKellop) was put on the hook as well.

I'm Easy Money (Peterson) handled a grouse cleanly at 52, finishing the hour. Fireside's Wallace (Rosario) had the tracker pulled at 58.

One Acre Wood Flash (Rector) finished the hour without bird work. Clover Valley's Evans (Furnish) was picked up on a bird at 38.

Grouse Trails Black Knight (McKellop) ran big, finishing without birds. Northern Slopes Allie (Graddy) had a single find near the halfway mark where a woodcock and a grouse flushed, finishing her hour.

Northwoods Cedar Edge (L. Saetre) and Blue Sugar (Hough) hit the course hard, both finishing without bird work.

Big Big Energy (Pharris) and Rebellious Fearless Fred (Luebke) ran well but also finished without birds.

Over the Hill Morgan (Lein) was reported above. Woods R Callin Saddle (Frahm) was picked up moving on a grouse at 12.

Northern Slopes Bell (Graddy) and Northwoods Dexter (Rosario) both showed well for the hour but produced no birds.

Birdogn True Confidence (Pharris) stopped a couple of times in likely

places but finished without birds. Grouse Trails Warrior Cat (McKellop) lost contact with her handler near the halfway mark.

NGSPA Region 3 Amateur Shooting Dog Championship

16 Dogs

The NGSPA Region 3 Amateur Shooting Dog stake commenced on October 11 under sunny skies

and cool fall temperatures—ideal conditions for running bird dogs without risk of overheating.

This year's Amateur Shooting Dog Champion title was awarded to Hi N's Dirty Secret ("Badger"), owned and handled by Hank Lewis. Running from Brace 5A later in the afternoon, Badger delivered a polished and consistent shooting dog performance throughout the hour. Although she slipped out of sight on occasion, she remained easy to handle, showing maturity and responsiveness. A seasoned competitor, Badger demonstrated excellent style and manners on all her finds, with multiple pheasant contacts spaced evenly across the course. The judges noted that her overall range and ground application—showing herself more frequently and purposefully than the runner-up—distinguished her from the field.

The runner-up champion was High Standing Cuttin Edge ("Woody"), owned by Anthony and Dayna Rusciano and handled by Chris Young. Although Chris had not previously handled Woody, the dog worked for him with the same respect and responsiveness he shows his owners. Chris did an excellent job keeping Woody forward and in pocket. Woody ran a strong, honest shooting dog race and was found standing on three pheasant coveys and one covey of quail. His bird work, composure, and ground application were admired by the judges, carrying his placement out of Brace 1B.

The judges also remarked that several other dogs delivered admirable performances and that the differences separating placements were minor—a testament to the quality and competitiveness of this year's entry.

The NGSPA Region 3 Championship extends sincere thanks to all who participated in this stake. We warmly welcome GSP owners interested in field trialing to join us in 2026. This stake serves as an excellent entry-level opportunity for newcomers to learn, compete, and enjoy the sport.

With a lot of torn pads from the dry grounds and dogs that ran multiple times already from the previous stakes, this all-age stake was going to test these dogs. The NGSPA Region 3 All-Age Champion title was awarded to Chicoree's Riden High Trixie, owned by Jeff Alexander and handled by Dan DiMambro. Trixie, running from Brace 8A, delivered the kind of bold, forward race expected of an all-age dog. Shortly after a powerful cast off from the breakaway, she recorded a well-earned dug-up find. Later in the brace, she recorded a stop-to-flush following a relocation on a running pair of pheasants, and all manners were in perfect order—no easy task on these challenging pheasants.

Trixie continued forward with speed and determination, ultimately carding another find on quail after reaching the front past the gas wells. Her ground race was fast, forward, and purposeful, and her bird work was marked by exceptional style. These qualities combined to earn her

the All-Age Champion title.

The runner-up champion was Macke's Jim Bob, owned by Abraham and Katlyn Macke and handled by Dan DiMambro. Jim delivered a strong all-age race with big, forward casts and multiple finds, each handled with excellent style and composure. His final find came after a sweeping cast to the front, where he was discovered standing with flawless manners. His performance closely paralleled that of the champion, with the judges noting that the decision between the two was a narrow one.

Congratulations to both the champion and runner-up, and sincere thanks to all who competed in this highly competitive stake.

NGSPA Region 3 Open Shooting Dog Championship 28 Dogs

The NGSPA Region 3 Open Shooting Dog stake concluded two full weeks of championship competition. By this point, owners, handlers, and dogs were understandably feeling the effects of long days in the saddle, making this final stake a genuine test of endurance, consistency, and competitive edge. Our judges for the stake were Diane Vater and Justin Smith. A total of 28 dogs were drawn, and clear weather prevailed throughout the stake.

The champion emerged from Brace 11B: Two Ponds Blanco Roux, owned by Jason Brooks and handled by Hank Lewis. Roux was briefly out of pocket early in the brace but returned to put down a fast, snapping, forward shooting dog race. She recorded stylish quail finds at 33, 38, and 41. At 56, Roux was found standing in heavy cover, though no

birds could be produced. Her strong ground race, excellent handle ability, and polished birdwork earned her the Open Shooting Dog Champion title.

The runner-up champion came from Brace 10A with "Spike" (P W Evolution's Recreation), owned by Keith and Bobbi Richardson and handled by Rich Robertson. Notably, 10-year-old Spike began the brace standing in the middle of a group of eight to 10 pheasants just two minutes after the breakaway. He handled the situation with the composure and steadiness expected of a seasoned veteran. Throughout the hour, Spike added five more pheasant finds at 6, 14,

Grouse Trails Warrior Cat Named Champion; Over The Hill Try, Runner-up

It was decided by club members to run the Wisconsin Championship two weeks later than normal. Two reasons: Many of the leaves are off the trees and underbrush, and the migrating woodcock would add to the opportunities for dogs to point a bird. It turned out to be the right decision. The judges were better able to see the dogs, and the woodcock were plentiful-sometimes too plentiful. Temperatures ranged from high

30s in the mornings to low 60s in the afternoon, except for Friday afternoon when it reached the mid-70s. In addition, we had some much-needed rain at night to help scenting conditions.

We were blessed to have two experienced judges who gave every entrant the fullest opportunity to win, always looking at the positive side of each situation. As we all know, native bird continuous course bird dog trials are hard to win. It seems

that more things can go wrong than you could imagine. Brian Ralph of Sandy Lake, Pennsylvania, and Brent Sittlow of Hudson, Wisconsin, presided over the Championship. Both are seasoned Cover Dog judges. Brian is the owner of the 2023 Grand National Champion, Ralphy's Chasehill Rip. Judge Brian Ralph mentioned the great hospitality that he and others felt at the 2024 Grand hosted by Chippewa Valley Grouse Dog Association, Minnesota Grouse Dog Association, and Moose River Grouse Dog Club. Our goal was to create a similar experience for him and all who attended this Championship. Our three clubs respect the tradition of the Grand and appreciate all the work over many years that has been done by all our friends to the East; Thank you! Brent Sittlow has judged numerous championships. He is a highly sought-after judge. He regularly gets asked to judge premier events, which are a testament to his knowledge, fairness, and the decisions he renders. We are blessed to have him as President of CVGDA and do not take his contributions for granted. As the saying goes in our club, call

1-800-Brent Sittlow for what you need, and it gets done, on time or sooner!

These trials don't just happen by themselves. We do not have planted birds or bird planters, but we do have course-cutting people, lunch providers, road marshals, field marshals, and people dealing with the other necessary ingredients for a successful field trial. Thank you to every one of them for their incredible hard work! In addition, Purina has been a longstanding supporter/partner of the Chippewa Valley Grouse Dog Association. For over five decades, Purina has supported us financially and rewarded our winners with its excellent products. Recently, Nestlé's parent company, which owns Purina, donated \$1 million in cash and 2.5 million in-kind to help families struggling with basic food needs. Needless to say, a strong statement of their cultural values as an organization. Thank you, Greg Blair, of Purina, for taking time out of your busy schedule to attend more of our trials than you miss and for continuing to grow our partnership.

Thursday evening, a Judges' dinner was hosted by Scott and Roger King at the King cabin in the heart of the Eau Claire County trial grounds. It's a unique setting on the Eau Claire River, lying between the Culvert course and the Diablo Jake course. In addition to judges Sittlow and Ralph, Ben Mergens, Tim Callahan, Rod Lein, Mike Luebke, Jerry Furnish, and Jordan Pharris, club officers and volunteers enjoyed a delicious meal. Woodcock hors d'oeuvres prepared in the black cast iron frying pan with onions and mushrooms on a tripod over a wood fire were enjoyed by all. Wisconsin is famous for Friday night fish fries, and arguably the best are panfish, namely Bluegills. They are not that big but tasty, sweet morsels, complemented with "Secret" Canadian fish breading again in the cast iron skillet. Finally, Pineapple Upside Down Cake in the Dutch oven, done to perfection over a bed of charcoal, received many compliments from the group.

Surrounded by friends telling stories and laughter abounding, it was a memorable evening.

The Running

The club diligently maintains eight courses of one hour in length. The cadence of the trial was six braces per day, picking up where we left off the next day. Therefore, the course order was as such: Highline, Culvert, Crash, Diablo Jake, County H, Horse Creek, Wilson Park, and Gas Line.

Blair's Holy Thunder (Waite) and One Acre Wood Bandit (Rector) started off the trial on the Highline course. The environment was good for this morning brace, but no birds were moved on this course.

Goodgoing Tickety-Boo (Edstrom) and Grouse Trails Little Bud (McKellop) got the Culvert course from the lunch area to the canoe landing. Tick was nimble, fast, and animated. She stopped once for woodcock, but it got the best of her and was up. Bud was strong and powerful for the first 20 minutes. He was observed making game near the halfway point, but got too close to a woodcock and was taken up.

Dirty Waters Chiltepin (Foley) needed the tracker at 20. Northwoods Cedar Edge (Saetre) had most of the Culvert course to herself. She converted a nice woodcock find at 15 in a thick new aspen cut. She was running and handling nicely to the river. She was stopped at 35 for a very long time while a search for her stand ensued. She ended up starting back up on her own and finishing in a very thick cutting at time.

After a delicious pulled pork sandwich lunch at Knight's Pool Pavilion, we shifted across the bridge and started Brace 5 on the Diablo Jake course. I'm Easy Money (Peterson) had an easy handling race and fished with a grouse find to his credit. Blair's Calvary Mountain (Waite) was tough to track. Very attractive at times, with extended casts to the front, but the bell would fade off, and he would inconsistently reappear from various vectors. Calvary finished the brace without

birds.

Grouse Trails Bathilda (McKellop) and Lake Effect Ali (Kaufman) started Brace 5 on the County Road H course. Ali had a nicely pinned woodcock at 10, just past the footbridge. She stood twice in likely cover near the halfway junction, but judge and handler had trouble finding her in thick prickly ash cover along the river. Numerous woodcock were flushed in the searching effort, but without the dog located, they couldn't be converted into credits. She finished the hour working hard as she always does. Bathilda was well behind the forward party and was taken up at half.

Blind Faith (Pharris) and Larix Laricina (Anderson) finished day one on the Horse Creek course. Both dogs looked very good with multiple stylish woodcock finds to their credit. By the time we reached Dack's Crossing, their races were strong, and pattern was good. The birds got the best of these two young dogs, and each was leashed by half.

One Acre Wood Flash (Rector) and King (Waite) started the second day on the Wilson Park course. Both dogs looked nice on the ground, with the slight nod to King in pattern and speed. Each negotiated the road crossing well and got to the second half of the course. Numerous grouse were seen and heard from treetop level, which makes it kind of hard for dogs to point! Both dogs finished without true bird work.

Berg Brothers Hatchet (Peterson) and Northern Slopes Bell (Graddy) broke away on the Gas Line course. Hatchet's bell went quiet, just past the pipeline crossing, and a lengthy search ensued. He eventually started up on his own and regained the front near the end of the brace. He had two woodcock finds near the road crossing and was credited with a divided find at the very end of the brace, with great style. (Note: Hatchet was handled by first-time handler Lindsey Peterson. By all accounts, she did an excellent job. Way to go, Lindsey!)

Bell had some pop in her race and

was energetically moving through the cover, seldom seen on path. She stopped in a thick green bottom at 25. As handler and judge moved in to find her standing, a single grouse blew out of the same covert. Scout Saetre found Bell standing less than a minute later, and she was shot over by her handler—a nice piece of work. Continuing with that same diligent effort, a woodcock find was tallied along the river at 53. A final divided woodcock find was produced at 57. A good finish for both dogs, which kept them on the board until the very final braces of the trial.

Raintree Blue Moon (Waite) was vigorously covering the Highline course through the first 50 minutes, but got hung up at the final road crossing, and tracker was taken.

Northwoods Cedar (Saetre) had a firewagon start. Cedar and handler got some rhythm going after the second road crossing and were settling in. She was standing well to the front at 30 for an extended period of time. When she was located, she moved too much at the flush and was taken up.

Temps and humidity were a big factor on the afternoon braces of day two. Big Big Energy (Pharris) gave a good effort and finished on the Culvert course. Grouse Trails Black Knight (McKellop) worked every angle to produce for his handler, but to no avail.

Rebellious Fearless Fred (Luebke) had a challenging course for a very warm and humid afternoon. Unfortunately, Fred made a woodcock fly in very thick and tangled cutting and was taken up at 15. Moss Mac Daddy (Dozeman) had a similar fate. Daddy made a woodcock fly on a relocation attempt, in splash-filled thick cover, on the Crash course.

Over The Hill Morgan (Lein) ran a very smooth race to the front with some good reach. She carded a very nice woodcock find on the King property, a new wildlife cut on the Diablo Jake course. Clover Valley's Evans (Furnish) gave it a good run and finished strong.

Staying in course rotation, we started day three on the County Road H course. Brook's White Hot Blaze (Waite) diligently finished the hour, but without birds. Bad Habits (Mergens) had a beautiful grouse find in a green bottom after the footbridge. She dove back into that spot again when another grouse was heard leaving the covert. It was difficult to determine what had transpired. She was gathered up, sent on, and produced another stylish find on woodcock along the edge of the river at 20. Thereafter, she encountered a woodcock minefield. She got properly stopped to a flush but moved on her own after acknowledging flight.

Birdogn True Confidence (Pharris) and Grouse Trails Warrior Cat (McKellop) went on a bird finding spree on the Horse Creek course. Both dogs had five or six, or more, woodcock finds with impeccable style and manners. Most were solo finds. Some were shared, and a couple were classic finds and backs. Neither dog backed off from one another, and the pressure kept building through this exciting hour! The separator in this brace was the race and strength shown by Warrior Cat from Dack's crossing to the open meadow. Some great independent moves that took her far to the front earned her the title. This was a brace that will not be forgotten. It was noted by John McKellop his appreciation for the help of his scout, Lindsey Peterson. "She did a phenomenal job of locating Kitty and was a key component to Kitty's win." He was most grateful!

Dale Creek Janie Bell (Waite) and Clover Valley's Mulak (Furnish) let loose on the Wilson Park course. Both dogs had some difficulty gaining momentum in the first half.

After the road crossing, Janie Bell dug in a little better and finished stronger than she started, but no birds. Similar fate for Mulak.

Temperatures were getting warm again by midday for the last brace of the trial on the Gas Line course. North Slopes Allie (Graddy) gave

us a gutty hour and hit all the right spots. She stood once, but that was to back her brace mate at about 40. Over The Hill Try (Lein) had a bit of a rough start, but settled in by 10 and had a strong, smooth race that made you want to root for her to make something happen in the bird department. Her chance at a bird came at 40, when she was found standing on a hill crest before the road crossing. Her handler diligently flushed to no avail. But she was confidently sent for a relocation, and ultimately a second relocation. She had wrapped around the grouse to cut it off and pinned the bird between her and her handler.

Perhaps one of the most impressive pieces of bird work you could ever dream up in a wild bird field trial. She finished confidently to the front with enough reach to earn a runner-up title.

The Derby

The Derby started promptly after the announcements for the championship. When you want to run an efficient, on-time event, Greg Johnson is the man! He had dogs on the line, marshals and judges in the right place, and always letting the next brace know where they needed to be. In comparison with the last several years, the Derby stake was smaller in numbers; however, what it lacked in numbers was made up for with quality. The top three dogs in contention for the Purina Minnesota/Wisconsin Derby Dog of the Year were in contention.

The winner, Grouse Trails Northern Thunder ("Reggie"), handled by Rod Lein, and the third-place winner Northwoods Rip Roy ("Rip"), handled by Greg Johnson, ran on the Horse Creek course Sunday morning. This was a very exciting brace,

both dogs pushing the extent of bell range; Rip, the wider of the two, both handled well to the front and hunting the right cover. Reggie had the find of the stake with a broke find on a woodcock at the halfway point along the Eau Claire River. The find was in excellent woodcock cover, and Reggie displayed perfect manners. Rip made several really nice casts to the front, attacking the cover in a forceful, aggressive style. The second-place dog, Rib River Best Bet (Betty), handled by Roger King, ran Saturday afternoon on the H course. The judges liked Betty's attractive, fancy style of running consistently to the front. She had a stylish woodcock find at 10 with derby manners. 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LAKE STATES GROUSE CHAMPIONSHIP

Resin Wins 81st Annual Running

The 81st Annual Lake States Grouse Dog Championship commenced on Wednesday, October 22, 2025, on the Gladwin Field Trial Area and wildlife/game refuge of the Gladwin State Forest. This trial is a Purina-supported cover dog points trial.

The Gladwin Field Trial Area consists of 4,792 acres and is managed extensively by the state of Michigan's Department of Natural Resources, and is subject to controlled timber harvest as necessary to maintain the area as a premier grouse habitat dedicated to field trial events with a wild bird venue. Volunteers help to keep this area a premier wild bird venue. This area was purchased by the State of Michigan as a grouse field trial area in 1916 and was named "The Gladwin Field Trial Refuge." On September 20, 1957, the State of Michigan's Conservation Commission, under the authority of Act 82, as amended, established the "Gladwin Field Trial Area." Since that time, field trialing has remained the priority of this area.

Local clubs consisting of the Lake States Field Trial Club, the National Brittany Open Grouse Championship Association, the Beaverton Grouse Dog Club, the Michigan Amateur Field Trial Club, and the Ruffed Grouse Field Trial Club have all been endorsed and have been put into writing in the latest GFTA Management Plan. These clubs

all take a hand in keeping this area available for our field trials, local, regional, and national. This year saw some changes in the courses here in Gladwin. Our one-hour courses were changed up for the most part to make it easier to run our trials. A great deal of work goes on behind the scenes to keep courses clean and well-groomed. Every year, according

to new growth and new cuts, coursework is changed accordingly to give the best benefit for bird work for our field trial community. We work closely with our DNR biologist, Bruce Barlow, to make sure we are always updated on upcoming harvesting so as to keep our courses up to date.

This year, as voted by our LSFTC board of directors, Dave TerHaar and Hunter Payne were asked to judge our championship. Dave TerHaar, a native Michigander, is no stranger to these woods or field trialing. Dave has trialed here for many years and has had the pleasure of owning and handling many of his own dogs to championship ranks. His dog, "Elvis," has a legendary reputation for being savagely attacked by a bear during a trial and then going on to win the Grand National Grouse Dog Championship the following year. Dave has a secure handle on what it takes to be a 'Grouse Dog Champion.'

Hunter Payne is from Spring City, Tennessee, and was recommended as a nominee for the judging job by several field trailers in the south. Hunter was introduced to quail hunting at the age of seven by his father in southeastern Tennessee. As the quail population decreased, he migrated to chasing Appalachian grouse. Tired of metro city life, he moved to his current property in southeastern Tennessee and began training dogs full-time. Lake States has, for many years, appointed a judge from Michigan and one from out of state so as to make sure judging is held with high standards and fairness. Putting these two gentlemen in the saddle was a comfortable choice.

The weather here in Gladwin was most unusual this year. Usually, by the time the Lake States hits the woods, the cover is down, woodcock flights have come and gone, and the grouse have headed to their winter cover. This year, the woodcock flights were late, and we were privy to their attendance. Sometimes, to the detriment of the dogs running. The oaks and maples were still holding

their color, while the aspen slowly came down during the week. Still more cover than we are used to at this time of trialing. The weather was good, with rain coming at the proper times. Luckily, not too much rain all at once, but just enough to keep us wet.

This year, our judges withheld the runner-up champion. They did, however, name the champion. The 2025 and 81st annual Lake States Grouse Dog Champion was named Resin ("Artie"), a handsome white and orange ticked male English setter owned by Kevin Lahoda from Church Hill, Maryland. Resin is handled by Marc Forman of Prattsburgh, New York. Marc got Resin when he was a derby and began to develop him. He spent time in South Carolina and in Michigan during the summer, getting him on wild game. Resin has placements to his credit in the Grand National Puppy Classic, a Lake States FTC trial, the Black Ash Grouse trial, and the Black Moshannon grouse trial. Resin is sired by Ch. Ponderosa Mac and dam Hunter's Flight Risk. This breeding goes back to Ch. Bloom's

Ole Dollar and Ch. Shady Hills Billy. The breeder was Lance Bressler of Curwensville, Pennsylvania. Artie ran on Day 3 of the championship in the 19th brace, coming to the line with Moss Meadow Able, owned and handled by Ken Moss. Starting off fast, both dogs broke away to the front on Course 10-11, diving into that first cut. They laid out there to the front for the first few minutes. Soon, neither bells were heard for some time. Both handlers moved forward and soon spotted both dogs standing close to the trail, with Able backing Resin. Marc went in to flush with Judge TerHaar. A grouse flushed, with judge calling it. Marc shot, and all was in order. Resin had vigorously worked the cover and provided a stylish and memorable point about six to eight minutes in on Course 10. Both dogs were released with no other birds seen or heard on the courses. Artie continued a big and easy handling race, with both dogs finishing strong.

After the conclusion of the Championship, we were honored to host the Roger Johnson Cup Open Derby. We drew 18 young dogs for a day of excitement. Judges Dave Heavlin and Mike Brown graciously accepted the duty in the saddle. First place was awarded to White Indian Outlaw, a handsome pointer male, owned by Thomas Butler and handled by Rachel Butler. "Wyatt" ran a strong, forward race and hit the cover hard. For a young dog, he ran a beautiful and mature race. On Course 9, they lost his bell approximately 150 yards to the front. When they found Wyatt standing on point, he stood through the flush of the (first) woodcock and the shot. When the second woodcock took flight, he moved. The judge counted the four woodcock as they took flight. Derby manners took over, but Rachel quickly called Wyatt back into the hunt. Rachel was very proud that he came back in and continued to work.

Second place went to Dunroven Hippie Girl, owned by Chal Curtis and handled by Richard Hollister. Hippie Girl has seen her share of time on the podium this fall. She is a beautiful

tri-colored setter female with energy to burn. She delivered a strong performance, running solo when her brace mate scratched, though it did not quite match that of her first-place competitor. She carded a nice grouse find just before the last tote road on Course 14.

Third place was awarded to Ingomars Delta Force, owned and handled by Rob Ellis. Delta was fast and a little bit reckless, according to Rob. She dug deep to produce the woodcock on Course 10, giving her the opportunity to join the group on the podium. Congratulations to all!

Trials like this cannot be hosted without the help of others. We thank Mike and Deb Singleton for their ongoing support with our coffee

breaks and lunches. Without them, it would be hard to make it all work. A big thank you to our horse wranglers, Richard and Jennifer Hollister. We have a saying here in Gladwin that they wrangle the best horses here in Michigan. Our judges never complain about their ride and feel safe. "Boots," "Dusty," and "Ed", we give our greatest gratitude to your superior performances. And lastly, to ALL the others who helped. This would include everyone else who attended. If it weren't for the help of all the handlers and their entourages, we couldn't have gotten it done. It takes a community, and we are very happy to be part of this one!

Amateur All-Age Winners

Kate is 6 years old and a six-time all-age champion and one-time runner-up. She is no stranger to Hoffman. Kate won the Region 3 All-Age Championship twice. During the brace, Kate was independent and relentless with speed on the ground. She had a back at 4, finds at 16 and 25, back at 52, and a find at 54. Kate had excellent manners on all four finds, and her two backs, standing with a high head and intensity. Kate finished strong and far to the front, showing what the judges were looking for in an all-age race. The scout, Whitley, showed keen eyes and knowledge of the Hoffman grounds to help Kate place first in this trial.

Mohawk Mill At Dawn (PF), handled by Gary Winall, owned by Gary and Ellen Winall, and scouted by Ellen Winall. Dawn ran on Course 2 and gave a front-running, forward race. After crossing the road, we headed toward the Army camp. When we reached the long stretch of rolling hills, Dawn could be seen far ahead with speed and animation. As we made the left turn at the Army camp at 54, Gary called point up front in a milo patch on the left side. Dawn's bird work showed immaculate style and composure throughout flush and shot. The scout, Ellen, was absolutely excellent. She was very attentive while riding the top of the hills, scouting this young all-age dog.

Southpoint's Speedy G (PM), owned and handled by Whitley Stephenson and scouted by Sammy Giddens. Speedy G was released on Course 6. As we watched, Speedy G was seen going up the hill headed toward the crossing of Courses 4 and 6. Whitley called point at 9. Speedy stood proud for wing and shot. He continued with a strong, forward

race going through the woods at the back of Course 6. After we headed back on the long stretch toward the clubhouse, Speedy appeared on the left side, continued up the hill going through the creek with a strong, forward all-age race, and disappeared. Whitley rode hard as we approached the large, open fields behind the clubhouse. Point was called on the plum thicket hedge row by scout Sammy Giddens. Whitley rode hard to the point and flushed a large covey while Speedy stood intensely as the hour brace ended.

GRAND NATIONAL GROUSE CHAMPIONSHIP

Birdogn True Confidence Named Champion

The 83rd running of the Super Bowl of cover dog championships was conducted November 4-10 near the town of Oxford, New York,

over the historic venue known as Grouse Ridge Kennels, consisting of approximately 2000 acres of natural woodlands, old orchards, farmland,

and wetlands. Owners Pete and Katie Flanagan are generous hosts and have shared the property as a field trial site for many years, hosting not only this Grand but numerous trials (i.e., Lost Pond, Chemung County, Orange County, Empire New York Grouse Championship, and others). Pete Flanagan's father, late Hall of Fame member Dr. Tom Flanagan, and brother Jim Flanagan acquired the property and developed Grouse Ridge Kennels starting in the early 50's. Both Jim and Tom were avid bird hunters and trialers, plus Jim had a passion for horses; the property abounded with both dogs and horses for decades. After Jim Flanagan's passing, Dr. Tom, his wife Esther, and children carried on Grouse Ridge Kennels until Dr. Tom passed, then the reins were turned over to son Pete and Katie, who

presently run the operation. While still alive, Dr. Tom dreamed of holding the Grand here at Grouse Ridge; that dream became a reality this year when the opportunity arose, and Pete Flanagan seized that opportunity. Pete and Katie graciously allowed the use of the house located on the grounds (known as the White House) to comfortably house judges, the reporter, and the stake manager all week.

Readers are referred to a well-maintained website of the Grand National for a complete history, bylaws, news, events, and other important details at grandnationalgrouse.com.

The Grand is held annually, starting the first Tuesday of November, the location determined on a rotating basis between the New England States, the Middle Atlantic, and the Great Lakes States. This year, Middle Atlantic was scheduled to host the trial, but due to poor grouse populations on the Marienville, Pennsylvania grounds, the directors chose to pass. The New England region was selected to host the trial, but due to developmental delays of a new venue in upstate New York and other complications on the New Hampshire venue at White Mountain, a dilemma was avoided when Pete Flanagan agreed to hold the trial at Grouse Ridge. Pete and his entire family worked hard for months to open, map, and flag six one-hour courses. Pete's sons, Bill, Mike, Tom, and wife Kaylee, close friend Bill Callahan, and others all pitched in to accomplish the well-done task. Pete, sons, and Bill Callahan were present daily to help with road patrol, moving vehicles, and generally help keep things moving. The history of past venues for the Grand shows that during the first 50 years, nearly half (24) were held at the Gladwin grounds in Michigan, 12 at Pharsalia grounds in New York, two in Andover, Massachusetts, and 14 at Marienville, Pennsylvania. The record verifies that the most successful handlers are Dave Hughes at the top with a total of 23 placements of either champion or

The Grand week kicked off on Monday evening at Fred's Inn in

nearby Norwich with the Purina-sponsored awards dinner and awards for "Legends of the Cover Dog World" sponsored by The Grand National Grouse Championship. A fine array of food was enjoyed by a large crowd, with the annual awards presented by Secretary Brian Ralph, President Tom Fruchey, Trial Chairman Joe Cammisa, and Points Secretary Bruce Mueller. The Michael Seminatore Top English Setter Award went to Snyder's Fireside Ed, owned by Steve Snyder and handled by Tammy Chaffee. The Top Cover Dog Derby is Clover Valley's Evans, owned and handled by Jerry Furnish. The Top All-Age Cover Dog is Chasehill Poison Ivy, owned by Bill and Karen McFadden and handled by John Stolgitis, who is also the Purina Top Cover Dog Handler of the Year. Awarded Legends of the Cover Dog World for their many years of dedication to the sport are Kellie Short and Peter Flanagan. Congratulations to all winners.

The general membership meeting was held at Fred's Inn on Tuesday evening, with new directors Kellie Short, Rod Lein, and Jerry Furnish elected, financial reports for the annual Futurity, Invitational, and Puppy Classic were approved, and some discussion regarding eligibility qualifications took place, with further follow-up by the Board of Directors scheduled for Wednesday evening.

Morning coffee breaks were handled by Joe Cammisa. Thanks are extended to Bill McFadden for generously purchasing fresh donuts every day and to Bruce Mueller for a supply of delicious apples and pears. Daily hot lunches at the Lost Pond clubhouse were most popular all week, with leftovers helping for several evening meals at the white house for the judges and reporter. Tuesday featured hot chicken and noodles thanks to the New England delegation, and Wednesday was homemade beef stew and applesauce thanks to Tom Fruchey and Craig Peters. stuffing balls, sausage with mac and cheese, and fresh ham sandwiches with tomato bisque. Robert Ecker brought delicious pizza one day and great pasta e fagioli, much to the enjoyment of all partakers. Everyone who had a hand in supplying food is to be commended.

Weather conditions for the week were typical of New York in November. Every day had very cold mornings, some with frost and icing conditions. For several days, a stiff wind made it feel even colder. Precipitation included rain showers and snow flurries that created standing water and mud in the low-lying spots. However, no delays due to weather were experienced.

Judges for the Grand are chosen by the regional board of directors, who develop a list of candidates given to the secretary to compile a complete list of top candidates for the directors to rank in order of preference, with the highest-ranked persons invited in numerical order. This year, Ben Mergens of Inver Grove Heights, Minnesota, and Bruce Minard of Beulah, Michigan, were top vote getters and accepted

the assignment. Ben has vast experience in the cover dog trial world, is an avid bird hunter, plus owns and trains his own dogs and has previously judged one-hour championships. Bruce needs no introduction as his highly successful Hi-Five Kennel and string of winning dogs have prevailed for many years. Bruce has campaigned not only on the cover dog circuit but the major horseback all-age and shooting dog circuits as well. He was accompanied by his spouse and partner, Jennie, who helped wherever needed, especially at the white house. Thank you, Jennie. The judges expected an exceptional performance in order to be named Grand National Champion and reported there were several dogs meeting the expectation one way or another, but few that excelled the whole hour with bird work. Both commented that dug-up finds were a rarity, with most points being at or not far off the beaten path, except for the new champion, who performed admirably. In the end, the judges felt the new champion's performance was high above the closest other dogs and chose not to name a runner-up.

Bird sightings started encouragingly with 10 moved the first day, followed by 5, 8, 5, 4, 4, and 3 on the final day for a total of 39—34 grouse and 5 woodcock. For the week, Course 1 totaled 14 birds, Course 2 had eight, Course 3 had six, Course 4 had five, Course 5 had two, and Course 6 had four.

The Champion

Birdogn True Confidence ("Sadie") is an orange-marked pointer female owned by Ben Fleischacker of Hankinson, North Dakota, and handled by professional trainer Jordan Pharris of Ruff Country Kennels in Brainerd, Minnesota. Five-year-old Sadie proved to be just what the judges had hoped for. Sadie carries forward a long legacy of pointer excellence. Her sire is the legendary Hall of Fame Champion, True Confidence; her dam, Ellie, has proven in the field on wild birds. Sadie was bred for the field and loves to hunt wild birds, regardless of the arena she is in. Sadie has earned multiple placements on various venues due to the dedication of Jordan Pharris. She is known for her ability to handle effortlessly, keen

intelligence, and strong bird-finding ability, which she displayed like a true champion. When Sadie is not on the field trial circuit, she enjoys time afield hunting the grouse woods and prairies with owners Ben and Melissa Fleishacker and their three children. Sadie made her appearance here in the 38th next-to-last brace, starting at 9:21 on Course 2 across the road from the big house near the equipment barn with steady cold light rain falling and muddy footing. Sadie went fast forward and immediately dug into likely cover with purpose. Her bell fell silent near the 10-minute mark, with scout Jerry Furnish dispatched, finding Sadie locked up tight on a woodcock, which she handled with intense pointing style and proper deportment at flush and shot. Sent ahead, Sadie was out to prove she was serious, locking up again at 27 at a likely spot, but this time nothing raised or relocated. With bracemate picked up at 34, Sadie had the course to herself and continued to hunt likely cover moving in and out of bell range, always forward. Her bell abruptly fell silent at 40 well off to the right front, this time standing tall with a grouse pinpointed exactly; Sadie, solid, as the bird went airborne and shot fired. By this point, it was obvious something special was unfolding as Sadie continued to pour it on in her relentless desire to find more birds, once again her bell falling silent at 53, Sadie found high and tight with another grouse located exactly with manners perfect as the bird exploded from directly in front. Sadie finished the hour going away and as strong as her start, leaving little doubt that a champion had just been made.

The Running

We will review each brace briefly based on observations and information provided by the judges. All dogs entered were deserving and well-qualified, many of them champions of the cover dog world.

Brace 1: Super Storm Cliff (Dubriske) and Gracie Star (Ecker). Cliff hunted at medium range and proved to be a bird finder with a pair

of grouse finds and two unproductive stands. Gracie also hunted at medium range, scored one mannerly find on a grouse, a pair of backs, and a lone unproductive.

Brace 2: Higby Arcade Fire (Stolgitis) and Moss Meadow Able (Moss). Start made on Course 2 below the cornfield across the road from Grouse Ridge Kennel at 9:20. Higby dug into the cover, reaching well at times. He notched a mannerly find on a small brood of grouse at 24 and added a back at 40. Able ran at medium range, backed at 24, but suffered a pair of unproductive at 32 and 40.

Brace 3: Saddled Up Sadie (Hughes) and Mohawk Mill Miss You (Stolgitis). Sadie hunted at medium range and bird less. Miss was picked up at 32 for a breach of manners.

Brace 4: Island Attraction (Ecker) and Stan the Man (Fruchey). Attraction was picked up early, and Stan hunted at medium range with an unproductive at 52.

Brace 5: Hypoointe Monarch Express (Fazio) and Meredith Grade Penny (S. Chaffee). Express hunted at wide range with no bird contacts. Penny ran at medium range, her only contact a stop to flush on a woodcock at 50.

Brace 6: Glassilaun Parabellum (Ecker) and Fireside Sally Forth (T. Chaffee). Parabellum got out of pocket, and the tracker requested at 31. Sally hunted at short to medium range and recorded a mannerly find on a grouse at 39 near the pond.

Brace 7: Buck of Piney Woods (Ecker) and Clover Valley's Millie (Furnish). Buck hunted hard the

whole hour, but no birds. Millie shortened and picked up at 25.

Brace 8: Asper Hill Bandit (Cullen) and Springpond Rockin Sidney (T. Chaffee). Bandit went wide and was out of pocket frequently. He pointed at 58 with no bird produced. Sid hunted hard at close to medium range, notched a mannerly grouse find at 15, and had an unproductive at 59.

Brace 9: Mulberry Fields Molly (Hughes), Seldom Rest Jack (Ralph). Molly hunted with plenty of eye-appeal at close to medium range, scored a stylish grouse find at 34, and finished the hour with an unproductive at 59. Jack was scratched.

Brace 10: Backwoods Wild Fire Blaze (Hughes) and I'm Easy Money (Pharris). Blaze ran a classy medium-range forward ground race with one unproductive at 15. Easy hunted well forward but failed to connect with game.

Brace 11: Meridith Grade Corky (T. Chaffee) and Wicked Pursuit (MacLean). Corky ran a steady forward race but went birdless. Pursuit hunted wide but came around to finish less bird work.

Brace 12: Paucek's Little Tommy Tucker (Short) and Double Deuce Jack (Hughes). Tommy tried hard, pointed twice at 15 and 58, both unproductive. Jack hunted at medium range, had an unproductive at 45, and a back at 58.

Brace 13: Blind Faith (Pharris) and Ghost Train Minnie (Peters). Both were forward at medium range but went birdless.

Brace 14: Grouse Hill Rambo (Ecker) and A Distant Spec (Hughes). Spec was moved up from the bye position when Ralphy's Chasehill Rip scratched. Rambo hunted forward the whole hour with an unproductive at 58. Spec had a find on quail at 5 near the cornfield edge, then forward but shortened up, favoring a sore foot.

Brace 15: Grouse Hill Princess (S. Forman) and Grouse Trails Little Bud

(McKellop). Princess hunted at short to medium range and scored a well-mannered find at 20 on a grouse brood, after which she failed to reach out and was up at 35. Bud hunted likely cover at medium range, pointed solidly at 55, the stand unproductive.

Brace 16: Grouse Hill Rock (Ecker) and Anna Lake Sami (M. Forman). Rock had a steady medium-range race without bird contact. Sami had a slow start but widened to finish ahead, minus bird contact.

Brace 17: Braeval Rory (McClusky) and Chasehill Snoop Dog (Stolgitis). Rory ran a strong forward race, backed at 58, no birds seen. Snoop was strong on ground race at medium range, pointed with style at 58, but unproductive.

Brace 18: Grouse Ridge Mags (S. Forman) and Baxter's Indian Arrowhead (Fruchey). Mags hunted hard and finished the hour birdless. Arrow started strong but shortened after the half.

Brace 19: West Wind Big Jake (Hughes) and Over The Hill Try (Lein). Both dogs hunted far and wide; Jake picked up at 30, and Try finished the hour with no birds, although four grouse were flushed wild along the course route.

Brace 20: Chasehill Poison Ivy (Stolgitis) and Rockland Ridge Rocky (Ecker). Ivy hunted forward and handled kindly; she pointed at 45, resulting in an unproductive. Rocky shortened at 20 and was leashed.

Brace 21: Doodle Ridge Elroy (Hughes) and Baxter's Wild Bill (Peters). Roy was strong and forward but failed to find game. Bill started fast but shortened and picked up at

30.

Brace 22: Miller's Hopped Up Version (Hughes) and Super Storm Nell (Dubriske). A grouse flushed wild near the start. Version ("Cricket") hunted wide and was found pointing after a long absence with a barnyard chicken pen in front. Nell stayed forward, pointing solidly at 45 and 58, neither productive.

Brace 23: Moss Meadow Seeker (Moss) and Grouse Trails Black Knight (McKellop). Seeker pointed in likely cover at 20 but was picked up for self-relocating. Knight finished the hour ahead with only a porcupine encounter on his scorecard.

Brace 24: Mohawk Mill Good Advice (Stolgitis) and Clover Valley's Mulak (Furnish). Advice covered the course thoroughly, but couldn't connect with birds. Mulak pointed solidly in thick cover but moved on before a flush attempt, then notched an unproductive at 55.

Brace 25: Ironstone's Dark Horse (Ecker) and Over The Hill Morgan (Lein). Horse hunted hard without game contact and up at 45. Morgan stayed with the job at hand but erred on a bird at 58. One grouse flushed wild along the trail.

Brace 26: Grouse Trails Warrior Cat (McKellop) and Mia Star (Ecker). Cat ranged wide and was not seen often, up at 30. Star started fast, then shortened and up at 25.

Brace 27: Grouse Hill Mac (S. Forman) and Long Island Ice (Ecker). Mac started strong, pointed at 15, but moved during flush and picked up. Ice wasn't having a good day and picked up at 16.

Brace 28: Snyder's Sadie (T. Chaffee) and Warrior Zeke (Hughes). These two started at medium range, Sadie scoring a mannerly woodcock find at 34, followed by a mishap on a grouse at 40, and picked up. Zeke pointed in thick cover at 35 but decided to relocate during a flush attempt.

Brace 29: Sammy The Rock Star (Ecker) and Big Big Energy (Pharris). Both hunted the fore in earnest; Big

picked up at 35 and Star at 45 after going birdless.

Brace 30: Miller's Special Upgrade (Hughes) and Mohawk Mill Fired Up (Stolgitis). These two were off to a flying start and were looking promising as time went on. Upgrade ("Penny") had a stylish stand at 18 that was unproductive, and Fired Up also had an unproductive at 11. Both finished the hour strong and forward; both judges impressed, but they needed a bird.

Brace 31: Snyder's Big Nose Kate (T. Chaffee) and Back Creek Lucy (S. Forman). Kate started strong but was up at 35 for moving on point. Lucy wasn't in the game today and up at 20.

Brace 32: Niantic River Ava (Dubriske) and Timberdoodle Farms Sal (M. Forman). Both started strong but failed to warm to the task, with both picked up early.

Brace 33: Lake Effect Ali (Pharris) and Double Deuce Zeke (Hughes). Ali was up at 30 after a pair of unproductive stands. Zeke hunted the fore with a stop to flush at 54 on woodcock.

Brace 34: Ironstone's Shenanigans (Ecker) and Beaver Meadow Bit (Hughes). Both impressed with their speed and style, each scoring an unproductive and a mannerly back.

Brace 35: Snyder's Fireside Ed (T. Chaffee) and Millers Dusty Version (Hughes). Both started fast and wide, with Ed pointing at 40 with no results. Dusty reached well forward, and both were up at 50 after no further bird contacts.

Brace 36: Resin (M. Forman) and

Blue Ribbon River (Ecker). Resin hunted forwardly at medium range, had an unproductive at 24, and was up at 35 for a breach of manners. River impressed with her strong and fancy way of going, but her aggressiveness carried her out of the pocket, tracker requested at 35.

Brace 37: Clover Valley's Evans (Furnish) and Rowling's Star (Rowling). Evan ran a strong far-reaching ground race, but no luck finding birds. Star was scratched.

Brace 38: Fox Brook Top Secret (Dubriske) and Birdogn True Confidence (Pharris). Secret hunted forwardly with less bird contact

and picked up at 34. The winner's performance is described above.

Brace 39: Hitail Roxy Afield (Fazio) and Willow Creek Northwater Grouser (Pharris). Roxy covered a

lot of ground with plenty of speed and eye appeal with a pair of unproductive stands. Grouser, the only German Shorthair in the stake, started fast but picked up at 25 after shortening.

The group gathered at the Lost Pond Clubhouse to await the judges' decision.

Tenacee Franklin Named Champion; Mohawk Mill Shake Up, Runner-up

Thursday, November 6, saw the start of ABHA's National Championship hosted by the Tennessee Valley Bird Dog Club on the grounds of the Miller Welch Wildlife Area, Berea, Kentucky.

I want to express my appreciation to our sponsors, Purina Dog Food and AFTCA, for their support and donations to the field trial community. I greatly appreciate Donna Boatright's help; she helped me chair two championships back to back, and I'm sure she did way more work than I did. Brian Stockrahm came down from Indiana to drive the dog wagon. A special thanks goes out to our judges who sat in the saddle for four days of judicial duties. Thank you, Tim Hammons and Rich Meadows. Several others contributed where needed as well. Thank you all.

The first day of the trial started out with what appeared to be the best day of the trial weatherwise, as the weather channel forecasted rain for the rest of the trial. Nice weather wasn't enough for the competitors, challenging scenting conditions left dogs birdless, and a majority of the handlers reaching for their tracking collars' receiver. Handlers began

wondering if any birds were even out there to be found. The first day dogs were just not going to the birds and were running off.

The following three days of the trial were just the opposite, scenting conditions changed to favor the dogs, and the rain mostly stayed away. This, coupled with the buildup of birds from the first day, caused many dogs to have one too many birds, resulting in several early pickups.

The winner, Tenacee Franklin, a pointer male, emerged from the first brace of the last day. Franklin had five well-dug-up bird finds that were out on the edges. Franklin exhibited excellent dog manners as handler Greg Isenberg went above and beyond during flushing attempts, often crawling around on his hands and knees in thick cover, literally right in front of his dog on point to produce a bird.

Runner-up in this year's

championship was Mohawk Mill Shake Up, also a pointer male. Shake Up came out on the second day of running. He pushed the edges and ranged to the limit of what the judges were looking for, topping it off with a very mannerly find for owner and handler Cliff Monroe.

Due to the low number of entries, the National Derby Classic was cancelled for this year.

("Ruby"/ISF), handled by Terry Boatright. Ruby started out running a huge race until about three-quarters of the way through her brace. At that time, she tried to point quail on two separate occasions in a fence roll. After the second quail contact, Ruby decided to stay in the wood line to find more birds and shorten her distance drastically, but it was

enough to finish in the top spot.

Second place in the Puppy was "Buster," handled by Travis Patterson. Buster had a big going, mostly forward race to lock up the second-place position.

The third-place puppy was also handled by Travis Patterson. "Susy," a tri-colored setter female, ran a shorter but more consistent race than the first and second place puppies. Susy has shown to be a consistent winner this season, placing several times in different states thus far to start her field trial career.

TEXAS OPEN SHOOTING DOG CHAMPIONSHIP

Haneys Juggernaut Named Champion; Chelsea's Mae West, Runner-up

The Texas Open Shooting Dog Championships returned to Camp Robinson near Conway, Arkansas, November 12–15, bringing with it 38 competitors, two seasoned judges, and weather so pleasant that even the gallery dogs seemed to smile.

Warm, clear skies and not a drop of rain set the tone for four days of running, conditions so ideal that several handlers were left wondering whether they should thank the trial committee or the weatherman.

Judges Jim Lawless of Sparta, Illinois, and Chris Weatherly of Grand Junction, Tennessee, cast thoughtful eyes over each brace. With coveys popping up at a rate of ten to twelve per day, both men earned every bit of their meals, clipboards, and saddle time. Though the birds were plentiful, the judges remained unflappable; some said they were as steady as a broke dog on its best day, others noted that, unlike most dogs, neither judge showed any inclination to relocate.

Claiming top honors in the Shooting Dog Championship was Haneys Juggernaut, whose 13th brace performance left little room for debate. He showed forward, purposeful hunting from start to finish, handling the grounds with confidence and style. His two covey finds were polished and professional, just the sort of work that makes judges tip their hats and handlers breathe again. By the time he

reached the final stretch, spectators were whispering that Juggernaut was doing everything but signing his own championship certificate.

The runner-up ribbon went to Chelsea's Mae West, a determined female who ran in the seventh brace under the capable hands of Shawn Kinkelaar. Chelsea recorded three finds under judgment and a fourth "birds-were-here-but-wouldn't-appear-for-the-audience" encounter. Still, her race was forward, her manners impeccable, and her consistency undeniable. Kinkelaar, who also handled the champion, ended the trial with two dogs at the top; proof that sometimes lightning does strike the same handler twice.

Beyond the judges' calls, the bracemates, and the coveys that kept everyone awake in the saddle, the trial offered something more: a reminder of why people keep coming back to these grounds year after year. There's something special about a crisp morning start, a horse shifting beneath you, and the sudden eruption of wings that turns routine into excitement. It's a place where competition meets camaraderie, where rivalries fade at the tailgate, and where a good dog can turn an ordinary day into something worth talking about.

As riders headed home under another streak of perfect weather, the reflection was simple: in a world that changes fast, a good bird dog running to the front has a comforting way of staying the same. And if every November could look like this one, no one in the field trial community would complain, at least not out loud.

But the excitement didn't end there. In a thrilling second act to the week's field trial events, the Texas Open Championship Derby kicked off with high expectations and high stakes. The competition was fierce, but only one dog could walk away with the top prize.

Red Dirt Road Mondo, an English pointer male handled by Allen Vincent, turned in a remarkable performance in the 10th brace that left no doubt about his potential. Mondo's stylish forward race was complemented by an impressive four covey finds in just 30 minutes. The judges were particularly impressed with his sharp, consistent application to the ground and his ability to locate birds in both open and challenging terrain. By the end of his run, Mondo had firmly cemented his spot at the top, showcasing what makes Derby dogs so exciting to watch—the raw talent, energy, and promise of a future star.

Coming in second was CK Oklahoma Legacy, handled by Matt Cochran. Legacy's performance was noted for his excellent ground effort and tireless application across the field. While the dog did not land as many finds as the winner, his work on the ground showed a maturity and style beyond his years, earning him the well-deserved second-place spot.

Rounding out the placements was Hunt's Traveling Man, handled by Shawn Kinkelaar. Like his stablemate, Chelsea Mae West, Traveling Man earned his third-place ribbon thanks to his solid ground effort, though he, too, would have liked a few more covey finds to match the blazing performances of the top dogs. Still, his strong race and drive put him in contention for a top finish, reflecting the solid foundation of a promising derby contender.

As the Derby wrapped up, it was clear that the future of field trial competition is in good hands with dogs like Mondo, Legacy, and Traveling Man. Their spirited performances added an extra layer of excitement to the event, showing the bright potential of dogs still in their prime developmental years.

The Texas Open Shooting Dog Championship, with its mix of seasoned champions and up-and-coming derby dogs, was a reminder that the heart of field trial competition lies not only in the victories but also in the journey. Whether it's the thrill of watching a seasoned dog make a perfect find or the promise of a young dog still finding its footing, these events continue to be a celebration of the bond between handler and dog, and the unspoken understanding that no matter the outcome, it's always about the chase.

The amateur stakes on the Z Bar Ranch, southwest of Medicine Lodge, Kansas, held forth the weekend of November 14-15, 2025, under relatively pleasant conditions. The multiple-course venue, utilizing approximately 5,000 acres of the 43,000-acre ranch, required a slight rerouting of the four courses generally used for these stakes. Fortunately, the ranch staff had burned three of the hours the last two years, but the traditional land north of Cottage Creek Road was too lush with 6-foot-tall bluestem and India grasses to utilize it. We managed. Birds were present based on coveys pointed or flushed by the gallery and scouts, but scenting conditions were challenging during this wild bird-only trial. Dogs were mostly placed on race and how they hunted the hills and draw, and creek frontages.

Judges Mark Livingston and son Hunter Livingston rode attentively and enjoyed themselves riding the scenic ranch where bison, deer, and antelope play. Mark grew up in Iowa, attending trials with his late father Ron, and competes successfully with pointers carrying the Waubeek prefix. Hunter, now 31, followed the pattern

as well, attending trials with Dad and Grandpa and even spending a teenage summer in North Dakota with Shawn Kinkelaar. Interestingly, Hunter realized he had ridden my now 27-year-old walking horse, Eddie, which had once belonged to Shawn when he was with Shawn that summer. Small world it is with these dogs and horses!

Club President Doug Meyer had mowed the "judges' path" in October, as well as a few other strategic areas, to properly show a dog and make things as easy as possible for the scouts and handlers. Most dogs finished, and water availability in the wetlands and along Dry Creek, Cottage Creek, and the Salt Fork of

The Shooting Dog hour was won by Reed's Super Spirit for Texan Jason Super. Beautiful on the ground and went to all the right places for first place. Justified At Last was braced with Super Spirit and also ran a hustling out front hunting race to take second. It was an enjoyable brace to ride and watch. Worsham's Spitfire, with some nice moves, annexed third place.

The Derby stake was hotly contested, with Jay Lewis named first with Bocomo Oklahoma Cowboy and 8-year-old grandson Jase Lewis named second with Bocomo Iceman. Jase informed us that he usually beats grandpa, but let him win this time! Skydancers Only Orion, setter male, ran an exciting race to take third for Jenny Lindsey.

The Gyp Hills club wishes to thank Eva Yearout, Z Bar Ranch manager, for all her hospitality, and a special thanks to Thane Yunker for driving the dog wagon, for all his assistance, and for leading a tour of the ranch for a few folks who hadn't been there before. We hope to see all of you out this way in the future. It's a unique opportunity and one of the last places I'm aware of to run on wild Bobwhites in the challenging environment of a prairie landscape.




