eather conditions couldn't have been better as the region experienced dry, mostly sunny skies with temperatures ranging from the high 30s each morning and topping out at 60 in the afternoons. Birds were plentiful as there were many established coveys thanks to the multiple clubs that have released quail on Courses 1 and 2 this fall.

The Brittany National Gun Dog Championship ran for nine days just prior to the Region 13 Championship and released 15 coveys of very healthy and aged Bobwhites. Additional birds were supplemented each day and during every brace of the championship to ensure opportunity for all dogs regardless of when they ran.

Jeff Haggis, Blake Rizzo, and Kelsey Hajek had the unenviable task of seeding the courses each morning without the use of an ATV. Kelsey and Ashley Tilley provided lunch and snacks as well.

Ron Williams, our long-time dog wagon driver and parking lot

Sergeant at Arms, never missed a beat. He had dogs on the wagon or at the line at every drop site or breakaway. Without the help of these people, we could not have conducted a trial of this magnitude. The drawing was held at Connie Husinka/Cipponeri's home. Fletch Orrin provided rosettes, and Dave Fletcher provided, wrote out, and delivered running orders and judges' books.

The Region was fortunate to secure two well-respected and knowledgeable judges — Bill Branham and Rich Hollister. This duo has judged numerous championships

and also competed and won a plethora of trials at every level. It's reassuring for the chairman to know that when the trial is turned over to the judges, they will make sure it's run without a hitch and done so in a fair, impartial, and enjoyable fashion. Entries came from Ohio, Indiana, Canada, Tennessee, and, of course, Michigan. We did have cancellations due to logistical problems and some health-related issues, but hope to see those regulars at Ionia next fall. The trial consumed two and a half days to complete the Derby and All-Age Championship. Greg Blair and Nestlé Purina donated food to the winners and also provided sponsorship toward judges gifts.

Chris Cagle is a Michigan native who is now a transplant to another great field trial state, Tennessee. Chris has been involved with the "local landscape" of Michigan trials for over 40 years and cherishes the many memories and friends from his early days in the Great Lakes state. He and his family continue to support our trials in any way they can, and it's gratifying to see the success he and his son, Chris Jr., currently are experiencing on the national level.

Haney's Storm Warning, though only 4 years old, has frequented the winners' circle all over the country and seems to be able to adjust to any terrain or conditions he is presented with. "Speck" has now won this championship two years in a row, and his effort was witnessed by a gallery of over 20 spectators who were rewarded with a superlative effort.

Speck broke away from the clubhouse and rimmed all the fields he was presented with in a fast,

forward, and flashy way of going. He searched for game and didn't just "run like the wind." He still kept in sync with his handler but ran a true all-age race. His exquisite style, on point, is one of his many trademarks that makes his performances such a pleasure to observe. All five of his finds were spaced apart and of the same akin.

Phillips Linebacker is a product of the Nathan Phillips winning lineup of Miller-bred dogs. He is owned by Nathan Phillips and Orrin Ingram. Mike Small quarterbacked the beautiful white Pointer male without a penalty or any interference. They were in the same playbook throughout the entire hour. Though he ran to extremes, he kept in communication with his signal caller throughout. Linebacker broke away from the scenic breakaway along Riverside Drive and encompassed all of Course 2 and then some. His race was similar to the champion and included three finds with exceptional style and intensity on point. The final one after time as he was found by the judge just prior to Logan's Lookout.

Haney's Hammerin Hank won the accompanying Derby stake with a big forward race and two limb finds. Small's White Drifter also had two stylish finds and placed second, while kennelmate Small's Hobo Ridge garnered third.

80th GRAND NATIONAL GROUSE FUTURITY

Tim's Setter Meg Wins 80th Running

he 80th running of the Grand National Grouse Futurity commenced on Sunday, November 3, 2024, at the Eau Claire County Forest near Augusta, Wisconsin. Participants, judges, and gallery members faced a steady drizzle and cloudy skies throughout the day, with temperatures starting at a foggy 44°F. The judges, Bill Frahm of Minong, Wisconsin. and Bert Benshoof of Roseville, Minnesota, both respected veterans of the Cover Dog world, evaluated the 21 dogs, each from a nominated litter.

The grounds presented a mix of river bottoms, logging cuts, conifer stands, and mature timber, testing the dogs across a variety of covers within the same courses. With only 0.2 inches of rain in the prior 39 days, the dry conditions made scenting difficult, further complicating bird work. The Futurity's 11 braces ran on 10 courses, including Wilson Park,

Gasline, Highline, Culvert, Crash, and H-Course, with the bye-dog running the first half of Wilson Park.

The first brace broke away at 7:27 a.m. under light and variable winds from the north at less than 5 mph.

2nd Brace — Mud Lake's Money Mayen

The second brace, run on the latter half of the Wilson Park course,

featured Mud Lake's Money Maven, a black-and-white Setter female owned and handled by Hannah Peterson. Maven, bred by Robert Jones, is out of Jones' Big Sky Lanius and sired by Jackson's Let Er Rip. Hannah's husband, Kyle Peterson, scouted while their 3-month-old twins, August and Norah, waited in the van, unable to walk the brace on their own yet.

Maven established herself early, consistently working likely covers and punching into prime bird habitat. Despite the day's tough scenting conditions, she ran a forward race, showing herself in all the right places. Maven handled without conflict, and Peterson was easily able to get her around the course with ease. At 20, the course met a lowland area that ran perpendicular to the course, and Maven took the edge, taking advantage of prime cover. Though no birds were contacted during the brace, her composed and stylish effort earned her second place.

3rd Brace — Clover Valley's Evans

The first half of the Gasline course featured a strong showing by Clover Valley's Evans, known as "Evy," a flashy tri-color Setter female bred, owned, and handled by Jerry Furnish. Evy is out of Clover Valley's Millie and sired by Northwoods Atlas, "Jet." Jet tragically passed away in his prime earlier this summer after winning both the amateur and open 2024 MN/WI Shooting Dog of the Year titles.

Evy broke away at 8:55 a.m. under a light drizzle and a steady 10 mph north wind. From the outset, she moved with a smooth, elegant gait, covering ground effortlessly and maintaining contact with her handler. Evy worked just at the edge of bell range, staying forward and showing remarkable composure in the face of the day's difficult scenting conditions.

At 20, Evy made a bold move, crossing a small creek, quartering through a section of pole timber, and powering uphill with determination into cover. At 27, Evy entered an aspen cut lined with tag alders, positioning herself perfectly in prime bird habitat. Though no birdwork was recorded during the brace, her seamless navigation of the course and forward, polished race earned

her third place.

8th Brace — Big Big Energy

The eighth brace, run on the Crash Course, featured Big Big Energy, or "Lotto," a powerful black-and-white Setter male owned and handled by Jordan Pharris of Brainerd, Minnesota. Bred by Jerry Furnish, Lotto is no stranger to accolades, joining his sire, Northwoods Atlas, as the 2024 Purina Pro Plan MN/WI Cover Dog of the Year. In Derby stakes, Lotto was often the favorite, impressing judges with his strong race and effortless handling.

The Crash Course earns its name with frequent cover changes, dense young aspen cuts, and numerous turns that can make it difficult for a dog to get around. The brace broke away at 1:22 p.m. in pouring rain, with sustained winds of 12 mph and gusts reaching 20 mph. Despite the adverse conditions, Lotto performed with admirable ease, staying consistently attuned to Pharris. Running forward and confidently working into likely covers, Lotto positioned himself exactly where he needed to be throughout the course.

At 14:30, Lotto's bracemate, Mojo's Winston Joy, handled by Mark Hughes, emerged from a tight aspen cut and stopped at the top of a ridge. Lotto backed cleanly as Hughes moved to relocate Winston. Winston worked back into the cover, and the judges marked a bird flying out in front. Lotto held steady until Pharris moved him forward. Lotto finished the half-hour, pushing to the front in a young aspen cut.

11th Brace — Tim's Setter Meg

The final brace of the day, featuring the bye-dog Tim's Setter Meg, provided an electrifying conclusion to the 80th Grand National Grouse Futurity. Meg, an orange-and-white Setter female bred by Tim Kaufman, is out of Lake Effect Ali and sired by Rebellious Fearless Fred. Handled

by Tim Callahan and scouted by his wife, Deb, Meg delivered a stellar performance as light faded and a steady drizzle persisted.

From the breakaway, Meg moved with purpose, showcasing snappy, deliberate movements and undeniable speed. Her race was forward and intelligent, consistently pushing into likely cover and maintaining the edge of bell range. At 10, Meg crossed a small creek into a patch of prime grouse habitat, quickly but thoroughly working the edges before cutting through the center.

Halfway through the brace, the course turned left onto a snowmobile trail for approximately 100 yards before veering right into thicker cover. This section often challenges dogs, as many overshoot the turn and ultimately fall behind their handlers. Meg, however, pressed ahead with precision, navigating the transition seamlessly.

As the course bent back westward, Meg adjusted effortlessly, quartering in front of Callahan, the judges, and the small remaining gallery. Her movements were sharp and deliberate, with a rhythm that didn't tire as the brace progressed. The connection between Meg and Callahan was evident, with Meg displaying an innate understanding of her handler's intent even in the fading light and steady drizzle.

By the end of the brace, the conditions had grown increasingly difficult, but Meg finished with the same energy and drive she began with. Her performance was marked by poise, intelligence, and style, leaving no doubt among the judges that she was the standout dog of the day and worthy of first place.

Callbacks and Final Placements

With daylight gone, the judges called back seven dogs to determine the four placements in the 80th

running of the Grand National Grouse Futurity. The callbacks were scheduled to run on Monday morning.

In order for a dog to be placed in the Futurity, they must demonstrate their ability to point a bird. With wild bird contacts nearly nonexistent during the trial, the callbacks were run over liberated quail. The dogs called back, in order, were: Tim's Setter Meg, Mud Lake's Money Maven, Clover Valley's Evans, Bib Big Energy, Mojo's Winston Joy, Anna Lake Kail, and High Point's Snowman.

The first four dogs successfully pointed quail, locking in their placements in this prestigious event.

82nd GRAND NATIONAL GROUSE CHAMPIONSHIP

Snyder's Fireside Ed Named Champion; Chasehill Poison Ivy, Runner-up

ate autumn sunshine painted the banks of the North Fork of the Eau Claire River Sunday afternoon in the waning minutes of the 82nd Grand National Grouse Championship. Recently named Grand National Champion, Snyder's Fireside Ed posed assuredly on the podium as decorated handler Tammy Chaffee and proud owner Steve Snyder held back (and quietly failed) their emotions. No stranger to the podium herself, Ch. Chasehill Poison Ivy, handled deftly by John Stolgitis and owned by Bill McFadden, proved her 2021 Grand Futurity win prescient with a strong 2024 runner-up placement. She won the 2023 Grand National Grouse and Woodcock Invitational last year.

A sense of deep pride and satisfaction emanated from those gathered. For the organizers, bringing "The Grand" to Wisconsin was a dream in the making, and no doubt, a bit of melancholy was felt as years of planning, dedication, and hard work came to an end. With the sounds of closing dog boxes and departing trucks, the focus of their shared efforts was already receding to memory.

Throughout the six-day event, 36

braces were started, eight unique courses were utilized, 90 miles of ground were walked by the judges, 25 grouse and 49 woodcock were flushed, two dogs were placed, and one historic Championship was completed. The smiles and friendships established — immeasurable in their worth.

The momentous arrival of "The Grand National Grouse Championship" to Wisconsin for the first time was the culmination of years of effort. Although the Grand was officially awarded to the region in 2023, the groundwork was laid

decades prior. The grounds, located in west central Wisconsin, are south of what's considered to be the "Big Woods" and known by many as deer country rather than traditional grouse cover. Fifty-two thousand acres are made up of multipleuse sections for public recreation, habitat development, wildlife and timber production. Through decades of prudent management and attention, the trial grounds are considered one of the finest cover dog venues in the sport.

The courses within the Eau Claire County Forest were already known

for excellent bird numbers and accessibility/flow, with the bonus of lodging, food and gas (among other necessities) within easy reach. Hosting cover dog trials since 1968, the courses reflect 56 years' worth of foot-worn paths across scrub oak flats, along aspen cut ridges, over hazel, and through thickets of alder lining the North Fork of the Eau Claire River.

Running on Wisconsin soil for the first time in its 81-year history, the event was hosted and organized under unique circumstances, combining the talents of three independent grouse dog clubs from two states within Region 19. The Chippewa Valley Grouse Dog Association. Minnesota Dog Association, and Moose River Grouse Dog Club are no strangers to hosting grouse and woodcock trials and championships. They've long been known for carving out wellthought-out courses that test and challenge even the most ambitious, experienced bird finders and handlers. The three clubs are also skilled in collaboration, combining efforts and talents when it comes to the organization and execution of grouse dog trials.

A combined meeting in January of 2024 of the local grouse dog associations (Chippewa Valley Grouse Dog Association, Moose River Grouse Dog Association, and the Minnesota Grouse Dog Association) established the framework for the event's success long before the first dogs were called

to the line. With Brad Peterson (chairman) and Greg Johnson (vice-chairman) leading the charge, goals were established, and committees challenged to host a world-class trial and highlight Wisconsin's richness and hospitality. Katie Cook, Rod Lein, Jim Kleve, Bert Benshoof, and Colin Peterson (among others) contributed in countless ways, shouldering much of the day-to-day efforts leading up to the first breakaway.

With eight courses on the map, plans were made to further improve the grounds to exceed the needs of the Grand participants, with a focus on cover/bird opportunities and walkability. A special acknowledgment to Colin Peterson for wrangling everyone who operated the saws, mowers, and trimmers to get the courses "Grand ready."

The banquet preceding the Grand National Grouse Dog Championship inaugurated the event in high style, honoring two and fourlegged legends (local to WI/MN) and highlighting those dogs and handlers who rose to the top of their game the previous year. Held at Black Creek Lodge, the venue provided an expansive setting for the dinner, drinks, and silent auction. The evening was sponsored by Greg Blair, and Purina and Bert Benshoof hosted the open bar. Thank you both for making the evening special.

Jim Tande was honored with a "Legends of the Cover Dog Award," capping a lifetime of achievements.

An original founder of the Minnesota Grouse Dog Association, Jim's achievements stretch back over 40 years. With his entire family present, Jim shared stories of competitive braces and entertaining trial anecdotes, reminding everyone how this sport connects generations and creates lasting friendships.

Betsy Danielson and Jerry Kolter proudly accepted the Legends of the Cover Dog award for their oftwinning Setter, 4x CH./4x R-U CH. Blue Streak. One of only six dogs to earn this coveted award, "Little's" small stature belied a heart and drive bigger than the entire Northwoods. Blue Streak's influence is still felt in many of the dogs competing today.

Bringing the awards to the present day, 2023 Grand National Champion Ralphy's Chasehill Rip, owned by Brian Ralph, was awarded the Purina Top Cover Dog of the Year after an outstanding 2023-2024 campaign. Anchoring the evening's awards, handler John Stolgitis was presented the 2023-2024 Purina Cover Dog Handler of the Year plaque, recognizing his continued success and placements over the previous year.

The 82nd Grand National Grouse Championship

Rain-sodden creeks sluiced over the courses whittled through the Eau Claire County Forest. Election Day marked its beginning, and in the spirit of tradition, the Grand National Grouse Championship commenced on a cold, dreary, and wet November morning. In less than traditional fashion, six braces on Day 1 produced but 20 woodcock, lingering behind October's Indian summer. No grouse and a blanket of cold rain left for reasonable doubt throughout the gallery.

All that changed on Day 2 when the holiest of holies, the ruffed grouse, was found. Throughout the week, all eight of the courses used produced grouse, and each dog had the opportunity to show its best in a race to become the 82nd Grand National Grouse Champion. What started as a field of 72 dogs—37 English Setters and 35 Pointers—narrowed itself down to just a handful in contention by the week's end. As always, just one champion and one runner-up could be named.

A Champion's Run

The champion revealed himself on Day 5, in the 27th brace, when Snyder's Fireside Ed ran alongside his bracemate, Rebellious Fearless Fred. Ed is a mostly white Setter, lightly ticked with a single black mark above his hips. He's owned by Steve Snyder and was handled by Tammy Chaffee. Fred is a well-boned white Setter with fox-orange-colored masking and ears, owned and handled by Mike Luebke. Both dogs are experienced competitors, and it showed in the way they came to the line, their body language saying, "We've been here before."

The course they ran on has earned its name. "The Crash" is known for presenting challenges and has been the dissolution of many good bird dogs. It's a looped course that was once abandoned due to heavy logging. Since resurrected, it boasts a dense sea of pool-cue-sized popple whips running through its midsection. Over the six days, The Crash saw six braces, with only three dogs managing to complete it with clean birdwork. Ed and Fred were the only ones to do so with pointed



grouse, and Ed was the only one to do it without a single miscalculation. He honored and backed his bracemate Fred's grouse find in what could be described as a beautiful flushing scene, the kind often depicted in paintings yet seldom witnessed by the hunter afield.

The brace broke away promptly at 9:15 a.m., under mostly cloudy skies occasionally pierced windows of blue. The first eight minutes of the course offered them a chance to catch their first wind and establish themselves on the hunt. They pushed through thick hazel underbrush atop a large flat shelf before dropping down into an openbottom creek crossing, canopied by towering white pines. A short climb up brings them to the first promising cover about 10 minutes into the hour-long run. At 13, with both bells at a distance, a grouse flushed at the pressure of the gallery, sailing from right to left, tracing the hard edge.

Several hundred yards further, at 15, Fred's bell went silent, and Ed's soon after followed suit. The handlers, judges, reporters, and scouts moved into the aspen cut to the right of the trail. The bells had disappeared in a likely location just before the course veers left, approaching a "busy corner." Three types of cover meet there: mosscovered box elders, scrub oak with thick hazel understory, and a long edge of young aspen tangled with brittle blackberry vines desperately holding their plum-colored leaves. In a small opening choked with thorns, Fred stood with Ed honoring.

Fred was tall and statuesque, facing southwest, while Ed staggered offset just a short distance away, mirroring Fred's posture. As Luebke approached Fred, a grouse flushed hard from right to left. A quick shot from Luebke brought an abrupt end to the tension, leaving nothing but the smell of burnt powder hanging in the damp air. Ed stood firm, backing Fred confidently to the flush as Chaffee worked her way to his stand. With smiles and excitement from the textbook find and manners by both dogs, the handlers led their dogs 25 yards back to course, and search resumed.

From then on, the brace unfolded as a textbook example of "racing to cover." At 22, both bells stretched forward. Ed's bell continued to grow faint, remaining as a gentle tinkling around 2 o'clock in relation to the course trajectory. The handlers, Chaffee and Luebke, began to separate while the gallery marched behind at a slowed pace another 50 yards before Fred was spotted, again standing tall across open woods. He was south of the trail, pointed directly at a large broken-off oak top, still clinging to crunchy rustcolored leaves. Luebke flushed into and beyond the deadfall with little real estate to work with, backed up against the river. After a few moments, Fred was tapped on. He immediately hunted into the deadfall like a spaniel, hoovering ground scent in search of a bird no longer there. By 29, Fred had rejoined Ed to the front, and they leapfrogged their way through the middle stretch of the course around a large swamp with open water.

Snyder's Fireside Ed, with growing confidence, continued to lead his handler and gallery forward. As the course continued southwest, it transitioned to a perfect combination of swamp bottoms, pocket ponds, scattered

hardwoods, and a smattering of roosting evergreens. With his bell sounding at the 3 o'clock position, he provided a showing of his ground game as he was seen working the far edge of a pond 80 yards to the right of the course. With a narrow pond between him and the gallery, he gave everyone a show as he moved powerfully to the front with a determined gate. As much as his finds validated his win, this opportunity to see him manage difficult cover and find the front established his efficient and thorough search and illustrated the beauty and flow of a true champion cover dog.

At 43, the course transitioned into lower elevation, and the mud-worn trail wound its way through conifers, bringing on the looks, smells, and "feels" every grouse hunter knows. At 49, both bells were sucked into likely bird cover, where the course transitions to a hand-cut walking through seemingly ideal woodcock cover. The pace slowed, and both dogs worked methodically among the young popple whips. Fred moved forward while Ed drifted horizontally toward a stand of mature woods deep in the middle of the cut.

At 54, the dogs, handlers, and gallery scattered. Snyder's Fireside Ed's bell fell silent to the far right as handler Chaffee moved along the ridge that divided mature cover to the left and a long swamp channel on the right. With a quick acknowledgment from Dubriske, Chaffee dove hard right down into the swamp in search of the silent bell. Maneuvering the twisted tag alders, an oasis of hardwood and grass (dividing another tag alder swamp to the far side) was found after a 50vard trek. Once higher ground was established, handler Chaffee moved back to her right along the minor



ridge dividing two swamps, where Ed was seen standing tall at the base of the land spit. Within a few steps, a lone grouse erupted at the swamp edge between the handler and her charge. A shot was fired at 57, and Ed stood steady and proud. With only a few minutes to spare, Chaffee gently petted Ed before holding his collar and directing him back to the course. During the challenging return walk through the anklesnagging tag alders, a smile was visible on the handler's face, and Ed exhibited a sense of satisfaction that was evident to those who know and understand grouse dogs.

Snyder's Fireside Ed stretched out on a limb find grouse with easy handling and a picture-perfect back of his bracemate's bird, making it the most outstanding brace of the trial. He demonstrated intelligence, grit, effortless flow, and heart. All qualities that define a true champion.

Runner-up Champion Brace

A runner-up champion was also named. Chasehill Poison Ivy, a white female Pointer with a liver head and marking on her chest behind the right shoulder. Ivy was handled by John Stolgitis and owned by Bill McFadden. Ivy ran the first brace on Day 2, paired with another white female Pointer, Birdogn True Confidence, callname "Sadie." The two dogs complemented each other well, taking turns pushing one another ahead on the Wilson Park Course.

Just seven minutes into their run,

there was a silencing of their bells. The pair of small-framed Pointers were found pointed and backing in a low pocket of alders, surrounded by young aspen. A quick flushing move by Stolgitis produced a woodcock, followed by his shot. Both dogs were led back to the course to continue on. At 12, Ivy was found just off the course, pointing back towards her handler. While Stolgitis moved in, the sound of a grouse taking wing was clearly heard by all. A second bird, this time a woodcock, flushed just seconds later off Ivy's nose, followed by a shot by Stolgitis. Ivy remained steady and tall. She was promptly moved forward to rejoin the race. Ivy's bird-finding efforts didn't stop there. At 19, she pointed left of the course, and another woodcock was produced clean. At 20, Sadie's bell went quiet, followed by a search effort. She was found 150 yards off the trail in a promising area, but no bird was found, and an attempt to relocate was empty. As the dogs were separated, Ivy led forward, crossing the road and digging into more promising cover.

At 33, Pharris crossed the road with pace, trying to regain fresh ground. The two handlers soon converged as Stolgitis slowed his pace in the absence of Ivy's bell. The next few minutes could have been mistaken for an old-fashioned Wisconsin deer drive as both a doe and a small buck were pushed from their beds and ran past the gallery at close range.

A few minutes after crossing the road to the west, Ivy's bell disappeared. The cover was ideal grouse habitat: young evergreens and small pole timber interspersed with choking dogwood thickets. With 43 minutes on the clock, Stolgitis, with the help of his scout Mike Flewelling, moved east off the course, searching for Ivy. After a 10-minute search, the judge and

handler Stolgitis adjusted the search and backtracked north, paralleling the course. Shortly thereafter, scout Flewelling announced "Dog on point" near where the course originally crossed the road. Within a few steps, a grouse flushed to the handler's left. With a shot fired, the find was recorded, and lvy stood proudly 40 yards to the handler's front. Of note, the gallery was on the road a few yards from lvy, watching it unfold with a front row seat to the placing performance.

While Stolgitis searched for Ivy, Sadie worked methodically through thick cover and a run of hard-to-find conifers right of the course. At 51, in front of a split gallery, her bell went silent. The distinct thunderous wingbeats of a grouse filled the air while Pharris and the judge quickly ducked into the cover to find Sadie standing tall and motionless. Pharris was asked to shoot and did so, marking the first two dogs of the trial to card grouse finds, setting the bar for the championship.

Plantation manager John Michael MacCormick and his crew did splendid work in the woods to ready these grounds for the trial and their upcoming hunting season. The field trial club and the competitors voiced appreciation for the work done. Ben Melvin and Vince Little helped at the barn and in the field. Retired plantation manager Randy Floyd is the president of the Continental Field Trial Club. He made the opening announcements at breakaway as he has done for 30 years. John Michael MacCormack offered a prayer of thanks and hopes for everyone's safety; at this time, the trial began.

Til Hankley handled the dog wagon duties, and he is always a pleasure to see. The lovely Gloria Hagan prepared lunches, had the lodge

in good order for the official party, and generally dictated standards of behavior for all attending.

Amateur All-Age judges were Jason Williams and Justin Hunt, both from Blakely, Georgia, and both kept sharp and fair eyes on the proceedings. Twenty-six dogs were drawn, and 26 came to the line. For those of us who love true wild bird field trials, it was an honor to be on these grounds once again and to be among like-minded bird dog people.

Dr. Fred Corder, accompanied by

his wife Rita, has been coming to this trial for several years. His dogs are well-trained, and his love for these grounds is apparent. Game Heir, a bright, mostly white Pointer male captured first with Fred on the whistle. Heir plied his trade out front, overcame an unproductive at the water barrel near the main road crossing, and went on to handle two clean finds. The first of these occurred across from the big house at 54 on a covey. The second find was in the closing moments of the

brace; this contact was on a single bird, and it was in order.

Touch's Blue Knight (Woody Watson) has many field trial placements and is a multiple-time champion; he won second-place honors. Blue Knight required Woody to ride deep to maintain contact with him. He was seen just enough as Woody found him at time near the dirt road near the long pond at pickup time. He had good composure for this clean, stylish find.

The first brace contained the thirdplace effort for Storm's End and Jim Pendergest. The Pointer female stood near the first crossing at 15 with a nice covey being flown. Her next contact was at 20 on the edge of a cotton field with all in order. She finished near the hayfield across from the big house.

These were all worthy placements over historic grounds and were a

Pointer male Blue Grass Jack garnered the third-

place honors for owner/handler Jim Pendergest.

he U. S. Complete held its National Amateur Walking Shooting Dog Championship November 16-17, 2024, at the Dr. John Flaherty Field Trial Area in East Windsor, Connecticut.

These grounds are infamously known as "Pelton's Pasture" to some old-time New England field trialers, including your scribe.

Our trial was successfully held after a spring cancellation due to several days of torrential rain and flooding on our grounds. It was deemed unsafe for the dogs, horses, and participants. The decision was made wisely. We moved the championship trial to this fall.

Luckily, this time, Mother Nature cooperated with us for the entire weekend. It got a little warm late morning on the second day. Nevertheless, it was great weather for the entire trial.

At the leadership helm, Field Trial Chairman Bill Bonnetti executed a well-run and organized trial that allowed us to see premiere walking dogs on wide open grounds in the late fall. These grounds allow for a running dog to reach out at times.

Along Bill's side is his partner, Jayne Fogarty, who saw to the many details of the kitchen and clubhouse arrangements. Jayne is the most gracious host, offering all participants and attendees breakfast, lunch, and dinner. Jayne is and was always omnipresent in the clubhouse, making everyone feel comfortable. Jayne is always offering food and beverages. Jayne, in her own humble way, demonstrates quality support and leadership skills. Bill and Jayne make a great team.

We had liberated quail for the weekend. However, several dogs had connections with pheasants that the State stocks during the fall hunting season on these grounds.

Judges for the event were John Olson of West Hartford, Connecticut, and Jamie Nee of Buzzards Bay, Massachusetts.

John is a constant and iconic judicial presence in many New England trials. These include walking and horseback, as well as many

wild bird trials. John is extremely knowledgeable and knows what it takes to place dogs in the aforementioned types of trials. John also graciously provided horses for our trial.

Your scribe, the other judge, has been involved in walking field trials for close to 30 years. These were mainly in New England until the last 10 years or so, reaching out to the Eastern part of our country and down South for walking and horseback trials.

Our Winners and Others

Braeval Rory, an Irish Setter male, appeared in the third brace with handler and owner Gregor McCluskey. "Rory," as this nice Setter male is called, set the tone and standard early on for the rest of the trial. Rory scored five well-timed finds and a back. Each find had exceptional polished manners. Rory's ground race was very strong, making huge casts to the front. Several times, we found him standing where you would want to see him on point after a warranted absence. Rory also ran the perimeters of some large fields where one would want to see a running dog do exactly that. Rory finished very strong well into the old Dearborn area. Rory's strong finish would be an eventual determining factor in naming him the ultimate champion. Rory has an exciting future ahead for himself and Gregor.

Our runner-up champion, Lightning Flash Remington, ran in the fifth brace. This was the last brace of the first day's running. Remington scored four finds for young handler and owner Brian Dix from Vermont. The third find was a nice limb find on Fox Hill, but well

within an acceptable distance from the course. It took the handler, the judges, and the gallery some time to get there after point was called. Once the bird was produced and all was in order, Remington went on to have one more find near the power lines before the Dearborn area. The last two finds were not our typical bird locations. That said, the last two finds were where other dogs did not have finds during the two days of running. Remington also had a strong finish. I have had the opportunity to see Remington run before. He's always a threat and consistently gets into the winners' circle.

Cape Point Hidden Jewel, an exciting 6-year-old English Pointer female, ran in the sixth brace. This brace ended up being the first brace of the second day. "Jade," as she's affectionately called, received a formal Honorable Mention. Jade ran

a proud and well-executed hour for co-owner and handler Bill Bonnetti. Bill owns Jade with his brother Brad. As previously mentioned, Bill is our esteemed field trial chairman for this championship event. Jade had a very nice race that included and resulted in four pretty finds. It was an exciting hour to watch. On any other day, she would have changed things. Jade ran a championship-caliber race.

In full disclosure, as one of the judges, our eventual decision between these three dogs required much discussion and debate between John and myself.

We had to get surgical with our judicial responsibilities and break down each of the three aforementioned dogs' performances. segment by segment, to reach our eventual and challenging decision. This sometimes can be a challenge for any judge but also adds to the quality and caliber

of the dogs that ran. These three dogs made the stake itself worthy of the championship title it offers.

Other dogs of note were Richfield Roxy and Great River Bella, who both made the hour, drove hard, and looked fancy doing it. However, they didn't fare as well as the three dogs above for a few reasons.

Annual Fall Trial

he Beaver Valley Pointer & Setter Club held its annual fall trial on November 22-23. Originally, this trial was scheduled for Labor Day weekend, but a combination of events led us to move it to this later date. 2024 marked the 75th anniversary of the Beaver Valley Club, and we had planned a big celebration with a roast hog and all the trimmings. However, the weather in late August and early September was extremely hot and humid. To make matters worse, the man we had hired to roast the pig had his \$8,000 pig roaster on wheels stolen. At that point, we decided that discretion was the better part of valor and moved the trial to a more dog-friendly climate. So, we shifted

the event to November — and then it snowed and rained. The weather was cooler, which the dogs enjoyed, though I'm not sure about the people. Nonetheless, we all made it through somehow.

As I mentioned, this year marked the 75th anniversary of the club. Back in 1949, a group of local businessmen and bird dog enthusiasts purchased the farm that eventually became the grounds for the trials we hold today. The club now occupies roughly 180 acres, with large fields where dogs can really show their abilities, as well as tighter spots that require careful handling. The cover consists of native grasses, feed strips, wooded areas, and enough autumn olive,

blackberry bushes, and Rose of Sharon to keep things interesting.

In the late 1970s, we began constructing our current clubhouse, which was completed in 1982. Money was always a challenge for the club, with taxes and insurance being persistent issues that consumed a lot of time and effort. The amazing thing about this organization, however, is that no matter how difficult things got, there were always people who stepped up to help get the club through tough times. I could start a long list of deserving individuals who have been instrumental in the club's longevity from 1949 to the present day, but that list would be exceedingly long, and I'd inevitably forget someone. Instead of a list, the best tribute I can offer to the founders and contributors is that the Beaver Valley Pointer & Setter Club is still here, 75 years later, and still going strong.

Now, about the trial — it was cold and wet. The dogs were impressive, the birds flew well, the horses were well-behaved, and the furnace kept the judges, handlers, and helpers warm, even though, due to the entry numbers, the judges only had a few brief moments to warm up before getting back to work.

The judges for the Open stakes were Tim Perschke of Marienville, Pennsylvania, and Steve McKalko of Troy, Michigan. They braved the elements and judged the dogs competently and fairly. The Puppy stake featured a lot of young dogs enjoying themselves while learning to run and hunt at the same time. It was a pleasure to watch them all, and I was glad I wasn't the one judging! Scotty Forman pulled off a hat trick, taking all three places.

The Open Puppy was won by "Winston," a stylish Setter who displayed class in her running, points, and perfect manners on all her finds. Second place went to "Roxy," an extremely stylish and classy Setter female who ran to the edges and looked great on the run. She showed good manners on her finds but exhibited some youthful exuberance. Third place went to "Mickey," a Pointer male who ran big and looked great on his first find but then succumbed to the temptation of wet quail. This dog has loads of potential, just like the two dogs ahead of him.

"Bit," handled by Mark Hughes and owned by Joe Cammisa, garnered third in the Open Shooting Dog. She had two finds, a back and an unproductive. Second place went to "Missy," a stylish, hard-running Pointer female with two finds and a back. First place went to Double Deuce Zeke, no stranger to the winners' circle. He claimed the top spot with three finds and a great race.

I'd like to thank the bird planters for their work during this event, especially Bob Smith, who planted birds all day on Friday and Saturday; even though it was cold, wet, and miserable, I did let him come inside for a bit to warm up during lunch, it was the least I could do. Kathleen Smith had planned the food for our Saturday night banquet but unfortunately got sick on Friday afternoon and couldn't be there on Saturday. Luckily, Beaver Valley is blessed with two excellent cooks -Joe Cammisa stepped up, following Kathleen's plan, and produced some really great food for both lunch and the banquet.

The judges for the Amateur stakes were Chris Catanzarite and Scott Forman. I was unable to follow the amateur braces, so I apologize for not providing a brief rundown of the winners.

I want to thank everyone who helped make this trial a success — the owners, handlers, bird planters, and Purina. It takes a team to make a trial successful.

That said, I hope to see you all in 25 years for our 100th anniversary.

Erin's Wild Atlantic Way Named Champion; Dunn's True Reign, Runner-up

he history of the Quail Championship Invitational is rich with exceptional dogs and people. With the inaugural running held in December of 1940 in Albany, Georgia, albeit a 22-year break and a change in venue, to the 61st running held in November of 2024 in Kevil, Kentucky, the performances never cease to amaze and excite those who love a good bird dog.

The Quail Championship Invitational returned to the West Kentucky Wildlife Management Area at Paducah, Kentucky, on November 29, 2024. The West Kentucky Field Trial Club again hosted the running. Mary Sue Schalk, in addition to being the chairwoman of the Invitational, is also the West Kentucky Field Trial Club president. Mike Crouse is the vice president. The father/daughter team keeps the wheels running to ensure the trial runs smoothly. The club roster identifies the remaining members as Alan Benson, Don Wiggins, Michael Kennedy, James Kleve, Vincent Major, Gary Lester, Sarah Clary, Cora Clary, and Joe

Hopkins.

The trial is a Purina Handler of the Year and a Top Dog Award points trial. It is also a National Championship qualifier. The drawing was held Friday, November 29, at 6 p.m. at the clubhouse, and the 11 Pointer males and one Setter male were paired for the two qualifying days of running.

Purina has been a consistent sponsor of this prestigious event for many years. Greg Blair coordinates Purina's donation of Pro Plan—eight bags to the new champion and four bags to the runner-up. Purina's generosity is one of the reasons for the longevity of this significant and respected event. Thank you seems too little to say when Purina does so much for field trials.

Vincent Major added a unique touch for the third consecutive year, providing leather works for the champion and runner-up, collars and leashes for both dogs, and spur straps for the scouts. He also drives the dog wagon on Saturday and Sunday during the prestigious

event. A young man with a positive attitude, he is a gem to the event and the West Kentucky Field Trial Club.

Tim Khrer manages the West Kentucky Wildlife Management Area. His workforce currently consists of only himself and one tech, and as with other industries, employees are hard to come by. Their efforts to have the courses groomed and ready for the trial were exceptional. They were commended for their hard work.

As president, Mary Sue is responsible for the trial's success, but she gives credit to all who share in the duties. She makes every effort to ensure the success of the trial. She readily accepts the responsibility that comes with her position. She stated that her objective was to honor and respect everyone who comes to the trial whether as a participant or someone who just rides in the gallery. The Invitational is for people who love horseback field trials, and the Invitational is one of the greatest events in the history of field trials.

Mary Sue Schalk served as the head marshal, keeping us on the correct path. Her service was invaluable. Alan Benson, Eddie Berendzen, and Nathan Berendzen helped with marshaling duties. They shadowed judges to make sure he was reunited with the judging panel if he was behind for any reason.

Nathan Berendzen served as the rear marshal. He went with a handler to find a wayward dog to make sure the handler was able to find his way back to headquarters. He also helped ensure that the gallery stayed on pace with the lead.

Vincent Major served as the dog wagon driver for the third consecutive year. Vincent was very popular not only because he was punctual to have the dogs at the right place, but because he also had hot coffee and snacks. Punctual and efficient, an excellent dog wagon driver!

Dr. Stan Wint returned from Gardner, Kansas, to complete his term as an arbiter of this event. He has been involved with bird dogs and field trials for over 30 years. He began his career in walking dog stakes and won his first championship in 1992. He has adjudicated in NBHA trials as well as horseback shooting dog and all-age American Field trials. He also served on the judges panel for the National Championship, as well as other prestigious events. His experience and desire to recognize the qualities of an Invitational champion made him highly qualified to fill a judicial saddle.

This year, Mike Crouse of Dixon, Kentucky, was added to the judges' panel. A no-brainer when creating a judges' team, he was a welcome addition. Crouse has over 50 years of bird dog and field trial experience. Competing as an amateur across the country, winning championships, championships, judging hosting events, and marshaling the Quail Championship Invitational year in and year out are only a few of the pieces of his resumé. He continues to give to the sport, adding a National Bird Hunters Association field trial event on his farm this fall, and looks forward to hosting the event annually. His commitment, knowledge, and passion for the sport make him overly qualified to judge this championship.

Michael Kennedy from Opelika, Alabama, rounded out the judicial panel. His introduction to bird dogs was when he began to hunt with his

own walking dogs. He has trained his own dogs for over 20 years. His field trial involvement was interrupted to dedicate his time to his wife and three young children. He has since been very active in field trials and has participated in all areas of administration and responsibility. His judging assignments have taken him outside Alabama. Some of the major championships he has judged are the Kentucky Shooting Dog Championship, the Kentucky Quail Classic, the NBHA National Amateur Championship, the ABHA Free-For-All, and many weekend trials. His experience well qualifies him for this assignment.

Once again, the Friday night event was a success, with participants, owners, guests, and volunteers convened at the clubhouse on Friday, November 29, for a sumptuous meal, "Southern Style," catered by Byron and Farrah Caldwell. Dinner included greens, ham, cornbread, and bread pudding. The silent auction has become a tradition to offset costs for the three events and would not be possible without contributions from businesses and individuals. The proceeds of the auction provide financial assistance for the operation of this prestigious event. Many thanks to all who contribute annually and participate in the event!

The evening concluded with the drawing for the Quail Championship Invitational conducted by Mary Sue Schalk. Conducted with order and precision, Cody Duncan, an attorney from the Nashville area, assisted Mary Sue. Cody and his father, Chip, helped prepare for and conduct the drawing, handling the minute details of typing the running order and completing judges' books. This is the second year in a row the father/son team has contributed to our event. Their assistance helps to keep the event running timely, and smoothly.

The Running

The Quail Championship Invitational began Saturday, November 30, 2024, at 7:30 a.m. sharp. We sat at the clubhouse listening to Chairman Mary Sue Schalk reminding us of the expectations and blessing us all with a prayer before we turned loose. It was the perfect day for a field trial. It was chilly, but no leaf moved; the wind stayed away for an enjoyable ride as we watched the 12 most-winning dogs in the nation. We rode to the starting line with the dog wagon, dogs yapping, horses snorting in excitement, and chatter throughout the gallery as old friends caught up. Luke Eisenhart and his scout, Judd Carlton, went to the starting line with Nighthawk's Rebel. They were braced with Haney's Hurricane Seeker, run by David Russell and scouted by Korry Rhinehart. The handlers tell one another good luck, and the judges say, "Ready when you are," and off they go, and everyone clicks their timers to begin. Both dogs hit the edges running, hunting, hoping to find a bird to point. As we go left, we lose sight of the dogs, and they take the natural course. We see them again as we round the corner after funneling through the alley of the woods and see Nighthawk's Rebel hunting the edge of the cornfield. At 10, David Russell calls point at the corner of the cornfield; Haney's Hurricane Seeker stands tall with his tail pointed to the sky. Russell goes into flush, and birds fly out. Haney's Hurricane Seeker stays frozen until his handler arrives to take him on the front. As we came off the find Hurricane Seeker immediately took the edge of the bottoms to get to the front. At 14, Nighthawk's Rebel was found on point with Hurricane Seeker backing. Nighthawk excited, but Hurricane was not so confident, and his tail was not so high. Eisenhart went in

and attempted to flush. Once he decided they may not be right there, he relocated to Nighthawk. Unfortunately, the birds were not home. The scout sent Nighthawk on his way. Nighthawk decided to show off running big and was not seen again the rest of the hour. Hurricane Seeker was also strong to the front and was not seen for the remainder of time.

The second pairing for Saturday was Allen Vincent with Dunn's True Reign and Eisenhart with Erin's Perfect Storm. As is the custom with horseback field trials, the gallery was granted a brief break. Tall tales were told, and good memories shared as the dogs came to the line. Both dogs shot out the front, being seen again once we were to the Highline pasture. Both dogs run the edges, searching for a bird to point out to their handlers. At 39, True Reign's scout called point for both dogs from deep in the corner of the Highline pasture. The two dogs stood frozen, waiting for their handlers to find the birds they had been waiting so patiently to see fly in the air. The birds bubble out of the brush, and both handlers shoot. The scouts take the dogs on, and they power to the front. Grabbing edges and hunting out of sight at the end of the hour. Their enthusiasm was noted as time was called, and both handlers grabbed their trackers to locate the canine athletes.

As the past handlers gather their dogs we wait for the next handlers and set of dogs. Chris Cagle brought out Haney's Storm Warning to run braced against Dr. Fred Corder with Game Surge. Both dogs blow out the front early and are next spotted standing on the far corner before the course makes a hard left turn. Both dogs stay frozen as their handlers dive in to flush out birds. Sure enough, the birds fly out, both handlers shoot, and we are back to

it. Haney's Storm Warning is not seen often as an all-age should not be. We meet again when Chris yells, "Point," and we race to see it. We approach Storm Warning, standing with his head held high, his base wide, and his tail nearly touching the clouds near a five-foot brush pile. Game Surge was a little ways off backing Haney's Storm Warning. It was a beautiful find with the sun shining and Storm Warning's confidence radiating. Cagle went into flush, and quail exploded from the brush pile. It was a picture-perfect find.

After our stomachs were full and fresh horses were tacked, we started the fourth brace with Gary Lester with Miller's King Poast against Judd Carlton with Miller's Heat Advisory. Both dogs hit the ground running and never looked back. They ran a big all-age race and were seen when needed. We rarely saw them, and their ground race as all-age dogs was phenomenal. Showing to the front as is expected in such competition.

The next brace was Como Thunder, handled by David Russell, and Erin's Code of Honor, run by Luke Eisenhart. Code of Honor had a sound all-age race. Both dogs were running the edges off breakaway in the winter wheat field. We came around the corner of the Power Plant Pasture, and Russell called point. Deep in the corner, Como Thunder was standing tall. Russel was able to flush out some birds at just about time (at 57). Russell called point. Como Thunder was yet again deep in the woods. Successfully, quail were flushed out.

The final brace was Southern Thunder, run by Tom Shenker, and Erin's Wild Atlantic Way, handled by Luke Eisenhart. You could feel the buzz of excitement when Eisenhart and Shenker called point. Both dogs were standing side by side, shaking in eagerness. Both handlers shot when birds flew out. The dogs were

taken on, and the eagerness grew. At 29, Southern Thunder had a find, and Erin's Wild Atlantic Way backed birds were found. Again, at 48, Luke called point, and Southern Thunder backed this timer. In the same spot, we had a beautiful find at the five-foot brush pile; Eisenhart produced more birds for a successful find. Our day came to an end with the sun going down as well as the temperature; the excitement of what tomorrow would bring buzzed through the gallery as we headed back to the barns.

Our second day started at the same time but much cooler, with frost coating the grass. Heat poured off the gallery as the horses danced in excitement, and chatter filled the gallery. After Erin's Wild Atlantic Way's performance yesterday, we were excited to see what lay in store today. Miller's King Poast was his bracemate. The brace began with slight crunches from the frozen ground. Gary Lester's Scout called point; Miller's King Poast was off the corn field in a brush pile. Lester flushed, and his dog stood as they floated into the sky. He had a good race and really showed off. Erin's Wild Atlantic Way was showing off in the bean field, giving Eisenhart the opportunity to sit back and point him out. Right out of the bean field, Eisenhart called point, and birds were found. Right after the railroad tracks to the right, Eisenhart called point. We rode to it to see Erin's Wild Atlantic Way buried up in the woods and brush, which made it a little tricky for Eisenhart. Fortunately, he was able to ruffle up some quail for another successful find.

Up next was Miller's Heat Advisory, run by Judd Carlton, braced against Erin's Code of Honor, handled by Luke Eisenhart. Right off the high line pasture, where we saw birds the first day, Miller's Heat Advisory found the same covey. At 53, Eisenhart is confident he is not in it with Erin's

Code of Honor and decides to pick up early. At 58, Carlton called point, and birds were found again. At 59, one minute to go, Carlton calls point. The whole gallery comes to see how it would turn out. Carlton goes into flush but is unable to find anything. He relocates, confident in Miller's Heat Advisory. He freezes and stands on point. Carlton once again goes to flush, yet with no success. The brace is over.

Our third brace is run by Southern Thunder, handled by Tom Shenker, and paired with Como Thunder, handled by David Russell. Both dogs made a big swing, hitting every edge back to the course at the sunflower field. He had a big, impressive race for the second running day. At 15, Southern Thunder was buried up in the woods; Shenker didn't hesitate; he jumped right in and began flushing, and out came a whole covey of quail. Tom called point again later just off the road near the three ponds pasture, birds were found.

After we got our stomachs full and fresh horses tacked up, we headed out for the last half of running before the callback. We started the afternoon with Luke Eisenhart running Nighthawk's Rebel. At 10, Eisenhart called point, Nighthawk was in a hedgerow. Eisenhart was able to flush out a covey. At 30, both handlers called point off the road to the right before the big ditch. Both handlers eagerly jumped in, and a covey of quail filled the air around us. At 45, Cagle called point at that same brush pile we had seen a find this morning in that brush pile, and Cagle was able to produce birds from the brushy area.

Up next, we had Game Surge, run by Dr. Fred Corder. He ran too big, and Corder decided to take his tracker to find Game Surge. His bracemate was Dunn's True Reign, handled by Allen Vincent. At 9,

Vincent called point. We came up on Dunn's True Reign off a tree line. Vincent tried to find the birds but had to rely on Dunn's True Reign to relocate them. Dunn's True Reign was prosperous as quail were found. At 39, Dunn's True Reign chose a different tree line, and the birds were home. At time, Dunn's True Reign was still running big as Vincent grabbed the tracker at time to find him.

To conclude, on the last day until callback, Luke Eisenhart ran Erin's Perfect Storm, and David Russell ran Haney's Hurricane Seeker. Haney's Hurricane Seeker ran too big, and Russell chose to grab the tracker early. At 30, Luke called point deep in the brush. Perfect Storm stood frozen as the birds boiled out from the brush. At 48, another great find for Erin's Perfect Storm. He stood statued as the birds flew high above the weeds. The sun set, and the temperature dropped, but the anticipation never ceased.

The callback was that night, and you could feel the excitement through the clubhouse as we waited. The judges decided to call back four dogs and announced they wanted to see them at the end of the brace. The first brace of the morning callback would be Erin's Atlantic Way braced against Haney's Storm Warning. In the second brace were Dunn's True Reign and Southern Thunder. Everyone shook hands and said their goodnights, and we all tried to sleep, not knowing how tomorrow would play out.

The last and final braces began bright but colder than the other days. The frost was much thicker, and the temperature was much lower as a snowstorm made its way toward us. Both dogs shot out the front, covering a lot of ground. After seeing Erin's Wild Atlantic way scarcely, we saw him again standing tall and proud on point just after the railroad

tracks. Luckily, the birds were home. Meanwhile, Haney's Storm Warning was running big and with limited visibility. At 1 hour and 54 minutes, Chris Cagle's scout called point. Just off a brush pile there, Storm Warning stood tall and on point. He stood as birds came from the ground up. Soon after, Eisenhart called point where we had seen birds multiple times. Sure enough, they were still home and painted the sky for us. That concluded our two hours with both dogs being seen at the end of the brace. Erin's Wild Atlantic Way would be named the 2024 Quail Invitational Champion.

We had a couple of minutes to warm up, and then it was off we went again—this time with Dunn's True Reign and Southern Thunder. Vincent called point with Dunn's True Reign just off the road, where we had seen birds before and were successful. At 30, the whole gallery, judges, and handlers go to the left of three lakes field to see whose dog is standing on point; Vincent raises his hat and calls point; a shot was fired just after the birds took off. Tom Shenker could not keep going as Southern Thunder ran too big for day three, so he grabbed the tracker. Dunn's True Reign was named the runner-up champion.

It was a great trial with a lot of attendees. As always, many memories were made, stories were told, connections were made, and traditions carried on. Until next year!

he 2024 Kentucky Quail Classic All-Age and Derby stakes were held beginning December 3, 2024. The trial began immediately following the Quail Championship Invitational. This year, the National Championship Qualifier had a smaller-than-average draw of 16 dogs, but the Derby stake maintained a solid draw of the same number, 16.

James Kleve of Paris, Kentucky, and Justin Crook of Jasper, Missouri, filled the judicial saddles for both advertised stakes. Although small, the All-Age stake ran in cold, challenging conditions, as did the Derby Stake. The judges, both respected professionals on the walking circuit, gave due diligence to all competitors. Their time in the saddle was more than appreciated by all participants.

The Winners and Others

Taking top honors at the Kentucky Quail Classic was Lester's Storm Surge, handled by Gary Lester. Storm Surge was in the third brace on Tuesday morning, with favorable weather conditions. His birdwork showed exceptional style and manners. His ground application was reaching but still purposeful every step of the way. His strength was evident by his final move, strongly going away with the same pace he had started his hour with.

Second was Crouse's Comeback Kid, handled by Mary Sue Schalk. Comeback Kid had a consistent hour showing his desire to work for his handler. His strong build carried him well around the fifth course. He seized the right moments to show well and was consistent on the ground. Dug into a briar thicket, he shared a divided find with his

bracemate, Lester's Shockwave.

Third was Lester's War Bird, handled by Gary Lester. This young dog showed his strength on the ground from the start. Requiring a little more guidance from his handler helped separate him from the top two winners. Consistently taking in every edge available he made covering the grounds appear to be easy. At time, he was found far to the front standing with immaculate style on a covey.

Two other dogs of mention were Haney's Hurricane Seeker and Lester's Shockwave. Seeker had two finds at 15 and 22 with good style and an attractive way of moving. His reach slightly shortened the back half of his hour. The old warrior Shockwave laid down a solid performance with two pieces of birdwork. His ground race was reaching, he required a little extra help at moments, thus slipping him off the podium.

Thanks to Lee Flanders, Matthew Flanders, Barbel, Sharon Townley, and all who contributed to the wonderful fish fry, soft crabs, hush puppies, and oyster stew lunch.

Amateur Puppy

Handler Steve Graham entered the puppy brace with English Setter female "Roxy" (Karen Graham, owner) and paired against Kirk Regensburg's Pointer male "Kelly" for a quick first work of the course to start the day. The young dogs demonstrated future potential with

a strong launch at the start and taking direction from their handlers as they ran consistently ahead. Roxy would capture the first-place prize for the Amateur Puppy competition for the day.

Open Derby

The first of two braces for the Open Derby began with a definite emphasis on leading the start of the forward course with a desire to find birds. Steve Moore's English Setter female "Jade" was the first to find a small covey of birds in the back right corner of the course. The covey launched when the handler approached the dog on point. Lee Flanders' Pointer female "Kate" proceeded to show a find and strong point later in the course.

The second brace displayed a first run of the reverse course with David Huffine's English Setter male "Slick" demonstrating a strong launch at the beginning of the course with a quick find at now the start of the run. Slick held strong with a confident point and steady to flush and shot. This find was followed by a second point later in the course, leading to a first-place prize for the Open Derby contestant. The derby dogs were fun to watch, with anticipation of more to come from these dogs as they transition to amateur shooting dogs in the future.

Amateur Shooting Dog

The first of the Amateur Shooting Dog braces began with another one of David Huffine's Sweet Grass competitors, English Setter male "Skipper," against Verlene Stephenson's Pointer male "Heart."

The second Amateur Shooting Dog brace would later prove to be the one to have witnessed with Jameson Crandall's English Setter male "Hawk" against

Sharon Townley's English Setter's female "Ness." Hawk demonstrated

big forward movement with two solid finds along the course. Hawk finished well with a big forward move toward the pond to end the brace with confidence.

The third brace included familiar owner/handler Ashby Morgan with his English Setter female "Charmer." His competitor was Pointer male "Bo," handled by Tyler Wolf (Dennis Kivikko, owner). Certainly, the need for horseback scouts was apparent on the course, with wide-running dogs and a lot of land to cover. Fortunately, there were many scouts available to track the dogs and allow the handlers to reel them back in and proceed to follow the course.

Up next was another Huffine's English Setter male, "Skeeter," and Crandall's second competitor, Pointer male, "Jake." The search for birds continued to be challenging for the dogs as the field of competitors and spectators continued to bear the cold temperatures and wind chill. Skeeter proved to demonstrate a strong performance on the course with a productive find and confident lead to the end.

Three more braces proceeded to complete ahead of the break for lunch.

Stephenson's second competitor, Pointer male "Ace," faced the course against Hastey's Pointer female "Dolly." This brace was followed by Morgan's Pointer male Big Stuff and Huffine's Setter female "Scout." Bird finds continued to be evident with quick work proving to complete the course with time to spare in some instances. The seventh brace included both Regensburg and Townley's second competitors for the day — Pointer female Bess versus English Setter male Blake, respectively. Another small covey find was part of this run with Blake's point to highlight a flush of several birds.

The lunch break allowed for great food, conversation, and warmth among the competitors and observers of the event.

The eighth brace was Huffine's final competitor for the day — English Setter male "Slim" against Flanders' English Setter male "Jack." Slim performed well for his handler/owner, completing the course as a strong second-place finisher for the day's Amateur Shooting Dog competition. Slim pushed forward with strength and drive from start to finish.

Brace nine included two mature competitors in Steve Graham's English Setter female "Lucy" against Pointer male "Louie" handled by Wolf (Dennis Kivikko, owner).

The final brace was a solo run with Flanders' final competitor, Pointer female "Molly."

Cutawhiskie Farm always provides an environment that fosters competition with a healthy presentation of the ongoing natural preservation of birds for the love of this sport. Despite the cold temperatures, we all endured and enjoyed a fun day full of competitive ambiance and camaraderie.

At the first brace breakaway in the morning, temperatures ranged from the low 40s to the low 60s, with misty conditions, light rain, fog, and heavy rainfall. Gordon Field Trial Area, Hoffman, North Carolina. Despite the bad weather, the excitement of seeing talented dogs hunting on far hilltops, excellent food, and the friendliness of participants always make the Swamp Fox Classic the place to be in late December. The Swamp Fox

Assisting him were Jerry Raynor, Steve Browder in the saddle for every brace (handling marshaling duties), Cliff Brown, Mr. Legree and Raymond Brown (preparing meals), and Greg Robinson (driving the dog wagon, providing coffee, drinks, and snacks during breaks with humorous dialogue). Thank you all for a job well done.

Swamp Fox Shooting Dog Winners

Hale's Our winner, Smooth Touch, came to the line on Course 4, breaking away at 1:35, with a bright sunny sky and 63 degrees. Illinois professional Shawn Kinkelaar handled the white and liver female for his owner, Dr. Jeffrey Hale, from Russellville, Arkansas. Smooth Touch hit pay dirt two minutes into her hour with a find of a covey as Course 4 makes a right turn. She was high and tight with a well-located covey of quail. Shawn sent his charge on, she was pleasing to watch as she roamed

the Hoffman cover, always forward with a purpose (finding Bobwhite). Smooth Touch was found pointing seven minutes later. This, her second find, was a well-pinned covey. Shawn dismounted, quickly putting a covey to flight. Smooth Touch remained high and tight throughout. This stylish Pointer female continued her hour as she began always forward, constantly seeking her guarry, handled skillfully by Shawn. On this day, both handler and dog were in harmony. Smooth Touch's effort was rewarded with multiple finds (credited with five finds) and a strong ground race worthy of being named the top Swamp Fox dog.

Mohawk Mill King Pen, a white and liver Pointer male, took second in the Swamp Fox. King, recently purchased by Ed McTay, ran in the 23rd brace, handled capably by New Jersey professional Matt Basilone. King's owner Ed, his wife Megan, and daughter Emma were in attendance, riding to watch their dog in action. King broke away at 3:24 with a onetrack mind, finding ol' Bob. At 3:44, Matt called point with King standing high and tight, indicating his quest was nearby. His handler quickly put a covey to the air as King maintained style and composure. His handler sent King on seeking quail as the

dog hunted unwaveringly through productive cover on Course 5. King's effort was rewarded at 3:50 with a second find of a covey. After the second find, King was not through, pinning a third covey at 3:59. Matt once again sent his dog on as we crossed the road, and 15 minutes into King's cast, he was found again standing high and tight, near the water hole. Matt quickly, after dismounting, put a covey of quail to flight. After his fourth find, Matt sent King on, finishing the hour as strong as he began. Ed, his wife Megan, and daughter Emma were pleased with his performance.

The third-place dog came to the line in the 11th brace on Saturday afternoon (December 28), handled adeptly by Illinois professional Shawn Kinkelaar. Chelsea's Mae West, a white and orange female Pointer, is owned by Ron P. Hudson II and Brad Sadler of Port Royal, South Carolina. Chelsea's Mae West broke away on Course 4 with a single mission of locating Bobwhite (the temperature at breakaway 61 degrees). At 35 minutes into her quest for game, Shawn called point. He dismounted quickly, putting a covey to flight, his charge maintaining her composure. Shawn quickly sent her on in search of quail. Mae continued to maintain the front, hunting for productive cover with the urging of Shawn. Her efforts paid off as Mae made a cast; 44 minutes into her hour, to the front, a call of point could be heard. Again, Mae had a covey of Bobwhite pinned; handler quickly put them to flight. Releasing his dog, Shawn urged his dog to continue her effort to hunt the reachable cover where quail might be located. Mae finished as she began, attacking available cover, a forward ground effort rewarded with multiple finds.

Closest to the Winners

Handler Mike Tracy of Glenville, Pennsylvania, handled two dogs that impressed our judges. In the 16th brace, Miller's Extreme Heat, a Pointer female owned by Joe McHugh. Breaking away on Course 2, headed for the Army camp, 64 degrees, windy with rain, and stormy conditions in the forecast, Doll set out to find the quarry of the day (Bobwhite quail). Moments after breakaway, we were riding in heavy rain—windy conditions often blowing the heavy rain sideways. These conditions did not discourage Doll. Twelve minutes into her hour, she was found pointed just past the Army camp. A well-located covey, with Mike putting a large covey to flight. In these extreme conditions, Doll went on to pinpoint two additional coveys during her hour, finishing strong to the front at time. At lunch, the forecast of afternoon storms led our judges and club officials to cancel the afternoon running.

In the 31st brace, Mike Tracy guided English Setter female Pine Straw Hot Chocolate to a total of six finds. Hot Chocolate is owned by Mike Reeves. This brace began at 8:07 on Hoffman Course 1. At 23 minutes into her brace, Mike shouted point, Hot Chocolate standing with good style near the first sand road crossing. Mike got off his horse and soon put to flight

a covey of quail. Into the mile-long field, Mike guided his charge; soon, at 37, he again hailed point, getting down to flush and putting a sizable covey to air. Again, at 50 minutes into her hour, Hot Chocolate was pointing, indicating her quarry was near. Mike quickly dismounted, flushing another covey. Sending his charge on, she continued darting through the Hoffman cover in search of her target, striking a pose near time, Mike quickly putting a covey to flight.

Day 2, Brace 7. Breakaway at 8:04, temperature 47 degrees, cloudy, overcast. Steel Valley Raven (Mike Tracy) and Smoke'N'Mirrors (Matt Basilone) were released on Course 1. At 10, Raven suffered an unproductive. Raven, 26 minutes into her hour, was spied pointed in mile long field. Mike dismounted and flushed a covey, all in order. At 9:00, near the end of the brace, Smoke was found pointed just south of Nursery Road. Matt quickly dismounted, putting a covey to flight, all in order. I tried my best to negotiate a raise for Matt's helper, daughter Melissa. This was the first time seeing her since she was a baby. Melissa riding in the gallery, already a teen!

Brace 17 — Breakaway at 8:02, temperature 45 degrees, and sunny sky. Bittersweet War Cry (Mike Tracy) and Thunderbolt's Wild Agin (Shawn Kinkelaar) were paired on Course 1. At 14, both dogs were found pointed, Mike and Shawn both shooting as the covey was put to air. Sending their dogs on, both were pointed out, traveling on the far hill in the mile-long field. At 48, Mike was heard calling point with Shawn's dog coming in for a back. Mike flushed easily, putting a large covey to flight. War Cry ended the hour with a strong forward cast.

Brace 20 — Breakaway at 11:19, temperature 55 degrees, and sunny sky. This brace paired Miller's Lock

and Loaded (George Tracy) and Red Lane Alert (Basilone). At 19 minutes into the hour, Lock and Loaded was found pointing in a plum thicket. He was high and tight, displaying grand style; George dismounted quickly, putting a covey to flight. Twelve minutes after George released his dog, point was called for Lock and Loaded. This time, George flushed but did not put the covey to air. Asking his dog to relocate, Lock and Loaded did not take long before he pinned his target, a large covey of quail was put to flight. George released Lock and Loaded, charging to the front still in quest for quail for the balance of his hour.

Brace 33 — Breakaway at 10:04, temperature 50 degrees, and sunny sky. Mohawk Mill Jacked Up (Basilone) and Suemac's Wicked Sister (George Tracy). Matt elected to pick up Jack at 25. At 27, George indicated that Sis was pointed. Cantering to the pointed dog, George soon dismounted, flushing a large covey of quail, all in order. Releasing Sis, she rounded the turn in front of the camp at 47. Sis was pointed out by Peyton, standing tall and tight on the edge of a plum thicket. George dismounted and flushed another covey of quail. Sis let loose, she powered to the front and 14 minutes later was again found standing outside a blue stem cover, George flushing, put to air a covey, all in order. Nearing pick up, there was some confusion about time expiring.

48th Running of the Ames Amateur Field Trial Club

his year marked the 48th running of the Ames Amateur Field Trial Club. The club's origin dates back to 1977. In recent years, the name of the club was amended to recognize one of the founding members of the club, Joe Walker, who passed away in June of 2022. In his memory, the club became recognized as the Ames Amateur Joe G. Walker Memorial Field Trial Club. From its early days, the thought was to provide amateur field trialers the opportunity to run their dogs on the same grounds as the National Champion. Today, the Ames Amateur Joe G. Walker Memorial continues to be one of the premier amateur all-age events in the country.

This year, the trial began on December 30 and concluded on January 3, 2025. Forty-four all-age dogs and 24 derbies were entered for this renewal. Weather conditions throughout the trial were most favorable. Even though heavy rains from the previous week made for a bit of a sloppy track early on, temperatures ranged from the mid-30s in the morning to near 50 degrees on most days, with mostly overcast skies making it ideal bird-finding conditions.

And bird finding is just what we did. Make no mistake, there are quail

at the Ames Plantation. Throughout the trial, 71 covey contacts were made. Fifty-two were seen by the dogs, and 19 others were seen, with only 10 repeat locations. In the allage stake, there were 32 contacts on the morning courses and 22 on the afternoon courses in the three-anda-half-day event.

In the Derby, 17 contacts were made. All derby braces were run on the morning courses. Routine and scheduled feeding practices, along with some additional mowing and making birds accessible to the dogs, have been a real difference maker. Coveys were large, and all flew extremely well. Hats off to Matt Backus and the entire Ames Plantation crew for their hard work and commitment. Joe, well done.

Top honors in the all-age stake went to Game Heir for Dr. Fred Corder of Corinth, Mississippi. Heir recorded two stylish and mannerly finds, with one of them a quick and precise relocation on a running covey. His race was strong and always to the front. Taking second place was David Williams's consistent winner. Rebel Gold. Gold. also had two outstanding finds to go with a well-patterned ground race. Third-place laurels went to Lam's Prime Choice for Jon Lam. As with the other winners, Choice was shown on quail twice in his hour. His style and manners on game, coupled with a consistent forward and searching race, earned him a spot in the winners' circle.

Judging this year's all-age event were Joe and Tessa Hughes of Moulton, Alabama. This husbandand-wife team successfully campaigned their own dogs on the amateur circuit throughout the

Headline recorded two stylish finds coupled with a big front-running race in his 30 minutes. Second place went to David Russell's handsome youngster, Como Moonrider, Moonrider had one outstanding find, a back of his bracemate, and an unproductive stand at pickup to go with a strong front-running race. Third place was awarded to Phillips River Line for handler Mike Small. River Line is owned by Orrin Ingram and Nathan Phillips of Indiana. River Line was placed on an impressive wellhandled ground race showing all-age potential. Your scribe and Burl Hicks of Smithville, Mississippi, evaluated the derby contenders.

As with any trial, it takes a team to put it on. This club has an outstanding supporting cast. Ken Blackman drove the dog wagon, provided snacks during breaks, and

collected entries—a yeoman's task well done. Sherry Walker jumped in and handled the daily lunches, providing delicious meals for everyone throughout the week. rawings for the Georgia Derby and All-Age Championships got underway at 7 p.m. on December 30, 2024, at the home of Nell Mobley. Sitting at the drawing table were Gary Futch, Craig Elliott, and Chuck Miller. Entries were down again as they were in 2024. A total of 31 derbies were drawn, with 25 in the

companion All-Age Championship.

The grounds were hard hit on September 27 with Hurricane Helene. A tremendous number of trees were down on the three courses at the historic Di-Lane Wildlife Management Area. Ryan Meckel, Wildlife Technician at Di-Lane, along with his staff, had put in many hours removing the downed

trees on the courses' paths.

Competition began on schedule in freezing temperatures and continued through the five days of running.

It is with a sad heart that I report a serious rider accident on day two. Becky Futch, wife of President Gary Futch, was riding on a newly acquired mare and took a fall on her back. She was rushed by ambulance Wellstar Hospital (formally Medical College of Georgia) in Augusta, Georgia. Becky suffered internal bleeding along with her pelvis being broken in two places. The bleeding was stopped, but surgery was required to place pins in the pelvis. She was at Wellstar Augusta for 12 days, then transferred to Encompass Health in Savannah for therapy. Gary states that she is making good progress but will have an extensive recovery. Please remember her in your prayers. Incidentally, Gary was not able to be at the trials.

Georgia Derby Championship

Riding in the saddles to name a Derby champion and runner-up were Harold Johnson, Shorter, Alabama, and Tim Moore, Blakely, Georgia. Both sportsmen rode and watched each dog attentively. When winners were announced from all indications, their decisions were well accepted.

Erin's War Eagle, handled by Luke Eisenhart for owners Bill Bruchey and Claudia McNamee, was named champion. Eagle ran in the 14th hour on Course 2. He was credited with good, clean finds at 11, 13, 20, and 48. No birds were lifted at point at 18. He covered the course in an excellent manner for a young derby. The race concluded with a good, forward finish.

Ike Todd took runner-up honors with Knight's Hill Lynn owned by Scott Griffin. Lynn was loosed on Course 1, the first brace following lunch on Friday afternoon. Lynn started a little slow, but this did not continue. The first find was noted at 20, followed by clean finds at 36 and 41. The course was well covered with good swings. She finished to the front.

The Others

Brace 1: Nickajack Pale Rider (McLean) and Erin's Legacy (Carlton). Pale Rider had two good finds, honored bracemate on a point with a good relocation. Legacy took to the course with a good race. He was credited with three clean finds with one requiring a relocation. His race was good for a young derby.

Brace 2: Erin's Redemption (Mathy's) and Snaptime Bill (Todd). Redemption was credited with three spaced, clean finds and a back of bracemate. Bill took to the course running in fashion with two finds.

Brace 3: Batman (Todd) and Erin's Bold Ruler (Eisenhart). Both were picked up early in the hour.

Brace 4: Sunset Sam Houston (Todd) and Erin's Three Amigos (Carlton). Houston had finds at 20 and 38. Amigos backed Houston at 20 and had a find at 37. Both contestants were picked up at 40 and 38. Performances were not pleasing handlers.

Brace 5: Shadow Oak New Addition (Eisenhart) and Seranoa's Ramblin' Man (McLean). Addition had no show of birds at 9 with a request of tracker at 29. Man had hunting on his mind with finds at 29, 31, 50, and 58 all with good style. The race was forward, and Man was out front when time was called.

Brace 6: Beeler's Masterpiece (Todd) and Rester's Cash'n In (Eisenhart). Masterpiece had a favorable find at 8 but was harnessed at 26 when he moved on birds. Cash'n In honored bracemate with back at 8 and 26 and followed suit as bracemate and picked up at 26.

Brace 7: Mayfield Storm Front (Siebels) and 2 Edges Bow (Todd). Front had finds at 14 and 25 followed with a back of bracemate at 10. At 10 followed with a finds at 14 and 21. Bad luck at 30 and picked up. Bow was credited with clean finds at 10 and 21. No birds were seen, with a point at 14. A point at 30 required pick up.

Brace 8: Notorious Sweet Ginger (Mathys) and DS Bocephus (Todd). Ginger did a very good job as a young derby. She had clean finds at 11 and 24. No birds were lifted at 36. Ginger had a nice forward race to the front for the hour. Bocephus had one find but needed a better race.

Brace 9: Lady Elhew Godiva (Sheperd) and Erin's Copper Colt (Carlton). Godiva was harnessed at 15. Colt had birds in flight at 5 and 15; a Retrieval device was requested at 26, not pleasing handler.

Brace 10: Knight's Hill Lynn

(Todd) and Notorious Propane Jane (Mathys). Lynn was reported earlier as runner-up. Jane finished the hour and had one find at 41.

Brace 11: Mayfield Storm Messenger (Siebels) and DI John's Buck (Todd). Messenger honored Buck at 4. He continued on the course with a find at 13. Buck shared a find with Messenger at 13. No birds were seen at 4 and 50.

Brace 12: Black Rocks Iceman (McLean) and Rester's Knight Move (Carlton). Iceman had an unproductive at 16. Iceman and Move were not pleasing handlers and harnessed at 35.

Brace 13: Dominator's High Maintenance (Hutwagner) was not pleasing handler at 24 with a request of retriever. Haney's Double Down (Todd) had two finds and ran a strong forward race.

Brace 14: Haney's True North (Cagle) and Erin's War Eagle (Eisenhart). North pointed at 13, all in order, followed by a fruitless attempt at 18. Covering the course, birds were seen at 26 and 33. Bad luck at 34 resulted in a request for a retrievable device. Eagle is reported earlier as champion.

Brace 15: T's Cash-Slinger (Bollman) and Haneys Top Shelf (McLean). Slinger finished the hour but had no birdwork. Shelf had a find at 31 but was not pleasing the handler and picked up at 40.

Georgia All-Age Championship

Immediately following the announcement of the winners of the Derby Championship, the All-Age stake got underway. Tricia Rentz of Montrose, Georgia, and Larry Cox of Randleman, North Carolina, began their times in the saddles to name the top two dogs from an entry of 25.

Tricia and Larry have ridden for many years, watching their dogs compete in amateur and open trials. They knew what they were looking for and named a champion and runner-up. Their decisions were well received.

Touch's Midnight Rider was named champion for owner John D. Milton and handled by Mark McLean. Rider ran in the sixth brace with hunting on his mind. Well-spaced finds were the order of the day at 5, 16, 26, 46, and 57. The find at 26 was on a wild covey, with Rider standing tall when the gun was fired. He honored bracemate with his point at 8. When time was called, Rider was to the front with an excellent forward race.

Runner-up was a 3-year-old Setter male handled by Mark McLean. Owner Carl Owens was riding in the gallery to watch the performance of Woodville's Long Hard Ride. Running in Brace 5, he could always be seen out front. Good clean finds were noted at 12 and 15, with backs at 38 and 50. The hour concluded with Hard Ride out front.

61st UNITED STATES QUAIL SHOOTING DOG FUTURITY

Cool Hand Luke Tops 38 Entries

he 61st United States Quail Shooting Dog Futurity drew 38 entries in 2025 from a nominated list of 31 litters. There were seven litters with multiple derbies competing. Two derbies from one litter were part of the hour callback dogs.

The grounds at Hoffman are maintained by the N C Wildlife at the Sandhills Gamelands through state funds. As the grounds at Hoffman continued to develop and become famous for their flow of courses, bird habitat, and proximity to restaurants, lodging, and shopping, many types of field trials came to Hoffman. Today, the grounds are some of the best in the United States. There are six one-hour courses, each approximately

six miles in length. These courses are maintained by the state. Each of these courses is comprised of piney woods, open field with field plots, with water available via brooks and manmade water holes. The state has a burn program with rotating areas burned every few years. Since 1981, the North Carolina Field Trial Association has worked with the state to adapt an early fall quail release. The bird program is chaired by John Ivester, with Robert "Lefty" Henry performing the actual feeding. Some assistance is provided by Bob Young. These coveys are fed regularly with a tractor disbursing seed. The planting and mowing of these beautiful grounds is done by N C Wildlife.

Thanks to Purina for providing funds to help with noon meals. On the second day of the running, a handlers' dinner was provided last year's winner, Chris Catanzarite, in honor of Backcountry Champagnesupernova. oil The painting by Leah Brigham was presented to Chris following dinner. Your reporter has been present at many dinners where paintings have been presented; however, when this year's painting was uncovered, a hushed whisper silenced the room for a moment as if everyone had taken a deep breath. To say it was well received is an understatement, for the brilliance and life-like details in the painting were unbelievable. At this year's futurity dinner, special

recognition was given to chairman Gary Miller for his longevity as chairman.

Representing Purina was Kelsi Toth. The Futurity is grateful for the continued support from our sponsor, Purina, who provides feed to the winners and helps us obtain AFTCA store items, as well as a financial donation. John Adsit headed up the raffle this year for dog food and a large canvas duffle bag. Hand in hand with a cooperative sponsor, breeders are the key to a futurity's success. Breeders of the litters have not been as diligent as in the past in nominating litters, which can lead to derbies not entering the futurity or penalties being applied to the entry fee. PLEASE: If you breed a litter, contact Margaret by summer and get the paperwork completed to honor your litter and recognize you as a good breeder.

Greg Robinson pilots the dog wagon. Greg picks up the dogs before 8 a.m. and again before the afternoon braces. He later returns the dogs to their trailers. He makes sure the dog boxes are clean, have hay, and are locked and pinned. He also has water on board for handlers to refill water bottles. Riders may board the wagon after selecting covered cushions; however, this

year's Futurity had some brisk temperatures; therefore hindering riders. Greg carries hot coffee, water, and a large selection of goodies for break time each a.m. and p.m. If you're lucky, he may even share his special stash of his home-roasted peanuts.

The Winners

The top placement went to Cool Hand Luke, a Pointer male bred by Brian Tiffany, with handler Mike Tracy. The owners are Bob and Linda Bergen from Vineland, New Jersey. Luke laid down a snappy, far-reaching race; the kind judges like to see. The judges' comments were that his race was a bold, strong, always forward attack of the course. Cool Hand Luke blazed through the 30-minute first series and then somehow bumped up his ground application with impressive quickness, showing a speedy and powerful big race superior to his peers in this second series. The animated race was pleasing to all who were watching. He scored perfect style and manners on his three finds at 34, 50, and 56. With three minutes to go, he continued a strong forward march for a potentially strong finish, with everyone sitting tall in the saddle to watch. It was at this time that deer were spotted at the top of the next

hill; however, no dogs had reached the summit before time was called, and handlers rode to gather their charges. The judges agreed that Cool Hand Luke's strong, forward and big race made him deserving of the top accomplishment. Other dogs had made valiant attempts; however, they had not located quail.

Second place went to English Setter male Tanglebriars Will. He was bred by Ben Dillard and handled by Mike Hester. Ben is a breeder who faithfully gets his litters nominated before they are sold. The owner of Tanglebriars Will is Tom Smith from North Carolina, Both Tom and Ben were present for both series to keep an eye on Tanglebriars Will. Ben and Tom were both present for the hour series. In his first series, he made his way gracefully around the course, scoring two finds in his 30 minutes. His race was consistent from start to finish. Tanglebriars called back for the second series came with a little advantage: he had scored two precise quail finds in the first series. His race was buoyantly gaited in a purposeful rolling ground heat. At times, he cast to the side but was quickly met by scout or had point called. During his hour brace, there was a large gallery expanding from the 18 that started at 1:30 to a group of 30-plus as we passed below the clubhouse. And that does not include the two handlers, scouts, judges and the multiple car gallery spectators. Tanglebriars Will had solid birdwork in locating game and was steady to wing and shot at 20 and 40, and the frosting was his find at 58, where the covey was well to the left with the strong wind bringing scent to Tanglebriars Will. Scouting for Tanglebriars Will was Robert (Lefty) Henry.

Third place went to Deena Jet Boyer, a Pointer female bred by Nick Marietta, owned by Darren and Steve Boyer from Grantham, Pennsylvania, with Mike Tracy. Deena Jet Boyer had a find just after the break away whistle was heard. The quick

point with a rigid poise surprised everyone, although everything was in good order as birds were flown and shot taken. She required a lot of scouting by scout George Tracy as she covered the course in a very big way with no further bird work scored. Deena Jet Boyer and other derbies found quail difficult to locate despite the fact that bird availability at Hoffman this year is good. Deena Jet Boyer's mostly white body, with a narrow female frame, caught your eye as she reached forward with beautiful casts to areas promising quail. Deer were seen at 35, with Deena Jet Boyer luckily on the other side of the clearing. She paced herself from beginning to end with a consistent rate at a moderate range. During her hour, she had no further bird indication. Her find in the first series would earn her a ribbon in the combined tabulation of assets.

Fourth place went to another Pointer female, Hunt's Centerfold, who was bred by and is owned by Jason Hunt, to be part of the Shawn Kinkelaar team. Jason is from Blakely, Georgia. Hunt's Centerfold moved snappily on the ground with forward and lateral casts. Hunt's Centerfold had a strong and never-halting search for a quail opportunity, which she succeeded in finding at 42. No complaints with style or reaction to wing and shot. Her medium-todistant-ranging rhythmic animation took her forward for an hour. On point, she stood with a pleasing style.

The First Series Running

The opening brace of the 61st

United States Quail **Futurity** called Honky Tonk Thunderstruck (Hirollins B K Bushwacker-Hirollins Jammin Jade), a Pointer male bred and owned by Dr. Stan Wint with Scott Miller and his wife Jamie as the scout to be bracemate for Heatseeking Hurricane, (Miller's Heat Seeker-War Creek Daizie), a Pointer male bred by L. J. Lundsford. The handler was George Tracy, with Mike Tracy scouting for this derby belonging to Muriel and Bill Primm. The group was ready and on the line with breakaway whistles heard at 8:05 following announcements by chairman Gary Miller and prayer by committee member/ wagon driver Greg Robinson. The dogs burst to the front with scouts dispersed early, leaving the gallery to take in the howling of handlers and the rattling of the wagon carrying the dogs for the next five braces. At 13, things were looking grim, and by 20, each handler took their location devices when no dogs were seen. We really didn't see enough of this pair to comment; however, it appeared they were in a foot race.

Brace two was away by 8:29 with English Setter male Texas Snow (Merritt's Bear-Shamrock Shadow) bred by Fred Potts and owned by John Fort. This Setter is part of the Calvin Curnutte team residing at the Merritt Kennels as Drowning Creek Bird Dogs in Derby, North Carolina. Wayward Stewed Tomatoes (Wayward Flyin Tomato-Doodle Ridge Fern), an English Setter male bred and handled by Mark Hughes, was the bracemate. Wayward Stewed Tomatoes owned by Bruce Mueller and is enrolled in the Hughes team from Pennsylvania who spend some January and February time here in the local south. Texas Snow required scout Hunter Pruvet to kick his horse into action quickly, although Snow showed a strong, independent mind today. Wayward Stewed Tomatoes was scouted by Chris Catanzarite as he moved along the course in a moderate medium race. At 21,

his classy gait was close at hand as he crossed the field ahead of the wagon. This was a brace with two very white athletic setters who, unfortunately, went birdless in this first series.

Brace three welcomed Pointer male BK Real McCoy (Bittersweet War Cry-Bittersweet Recovery) with Brooke Lanning on her first trip to these spectacular trial grounds. Brooke is co-owner of McCoy with Sergio Velez, as well as handler. Bracemate Pointer male Bittersweet War Dance is a littermate to BK Real McCoy. War Dance is owned by Pete Del Collo, although due to a horse accident, Pete had veteran trainer Pat Casey handling. Pat does not enter every year, but when he does, he brings a derby that makes a callback or better. Both dogs hunted to the front at a strong medium range with a bouncy gait. On hand to scout were Steve Browder and Chris Catanzarite. Once again, these two promising entries went birdless.

Sterling Ridge Carly (Caladen's Red-Caladen's Dream Tennessee Maker), a Pointer female, was the top dog in brace four with her owner Frank Scarpinato in the gallery to watch as Mike Tracy guided her on course five. Carly was bred by Ross Callaway. At about 20, she was watered and appeared to limp. Handler and scout dismounted to closely evaluate her before returning her to the wagon for further evaluation. Backcountry Fearless (Springflow's Backcountry P-Apple Annie's Sweet Delight), a Pointer female bred, owned and handled by Chris Catanzarite, was the bracemate. The pair had a good breakaway when turned loose in the long field adjacent to Derby Road, allowing the gallery to watch them skirt the edge and round the corner at bear claw beyond Jacob's corner. Fearless had a forward mediumrange race requiring very little scouting by Mark Hughes. No birds were flown.

Brace five found English Setter male Tanglebriars Will (covered earlier) and bracemate Miss Bullette (Rentz's Hijacker x Dominator's Heir Kate), a Pointer female bred by Joe Rentz, although now owned by the team of Primm and Saniga as part of the Mike and George Tracy team. Each of these dogs had satisfactory races with bird contact.

By 11:05, brace six was on the ground, bringing the morning competition to an end. Mohawk Mill Lady Justice (Imagine-Mohawk Mill Dolly), a Pointer female bred by Gary and Ellen Winall, had recently been purchased by Ed and Megan McCay to be trained and handled by Matt Basilone. Pointer female Hunt's Centerfold is covered with the winners above. Justice was snappy on the ground and moved inconsistently, some lateral; however, always gleefully moving. She did not locate birds. Sheperd's pie was served for lunch with salad and cookies. By 1:30, the wagon had picked up 12 more dogs, and the judges were at the breakaway, ready to get back to work.

Brace seven started on course one, as the Futurity always runs these courses in reverse. Brace seven had Mojo's Winston Joy (Wayward Flyin Tomato-Doodle Ridge Fern), an English Setter male bred and handled by Mark Hughes although owned by Bruce Moelders. Joy's race was short and immature. Mike Tracy had bracemate Cool Hand Luke (covered earlier under the winners).

The eighth brace called Marty Moore's Pointer male, Moore's Base Hit (B K Bonafide Stallion x

B K Hirollins Wild), bred by Sergio Velez to the line with Scott Miller. Mike Hester had Tomb Stone (Quickmarksman's Excalibur-Little River Psycho), a Pointer male bred, owned and handled by Mike himself. This pair presented two good races, Base Hit often lateral and then forward. At 28. Base Hit pointed just before pick-up was called. Despite a long flushing effort and a relocation attempt, no quail were flown. Tomb Stone began his 30 minutes with a nice point at 7 as quail lifted, all steady to wing and shot. Brace nine paired two Pointers, Haneys Juggernaut (Pleasant Run Samuel x Pleasant Run Sally), a Pointer male bred and owned by Jason Hunt, although under the command of Kinkelaar. Bracemate was Bowser's Backcountry Mickey (Springflow's Backcountry P-Apple Annie's Sweet Delight), a Pointer male bred and handled by Chris although Catanzarite, recently purchased and now owned by Tyler Bowser, who could not make the futurity trip. Juggernaut had a very good ground race, hitting the right spots for quail, although he found no one home during his 30-minute search. Bowser's Backcountry Mickey was closer with a cautious use of his nose. He had an immature find at 10, as well as a second quail contact at 25; however, he broke into a big chase at shot, causing difficulty in getting him back into a forward hunting mode for a few minutes.

George Tracy was on the line at 3:30 with Speck of Gold (Miller's Heat Seeker-War Creek Daizie), a Pointer female bred by John Chambers. She is owned by Primm and Linder. She jumped off the breakaway, never looking back, and was seen much later via a locating device. The English Setter male, Ravenwood Game On (Shagtime Max-Shagtime Zee), was bred by Chris Cagle and owned by Joe Cincotta with Matt Basilone handling. He carries a nice waving tail, although, on these grounds, his race was a little short. He scored an

unproductive at 4.

Brace 11 called up Silver W Wildflower (Elhew Sinbad-Silver W Free Spirit), a Pointer female bred by Brooke Lanning, although owned and handled by Debbie Ozner. Bracemate was Buffalo Junction (Erin's Redrum-Calico's Calico Country Strong), a Pointer female bred by Calico Kennels and now owned and handled by Al Dahl. Their races were similar, both reaching so that the gallery could only get glimpses of their animated races. Silver W Wildflower had a big covey find at 8 with acceptable derby manners. Buffalo Junction Calico had a consistent forward hunt, showing plenty of style and determination. His first series was birdless.

The final brace of day one was brace 12 with Backwoods Dine & (Springflow's Backcountry Dash P-Apple Annie's Sweet Delight), a Pointer male bred by Chris Catanzarite and now owned by Justin Mason. Mark Hughes is now the trainer and handler. Bracemate was Bluebar Maggie (Miller's Heat Seeker-War Creek Daize), a Pointer female; another from John Chambers breeding. The owners are Hood and Primm, with the dog under the whistle of Mike Tracy. Backwoods Dine & Dash zipped through the back fields, approaching the back of the barn. He had a covey located at 23, although he happily gave an extended chase. He repeated the use of his nose to locate at least two more covey, although your reporter did not see how they were handled as by then, he was well off course. Bluebar Maggie had a happy tour of the course, always to the front, although she did not locate any quail.

Day two arrived with a chill in the air and light frost on the grass. Brace 13 called River Keeper (Shagtime Smoke-Merritt's Princess), an English Setter male bred at the Terry Merritt Kennel, owned by John Fort and handled by Calvin Curnutte. Bracemate was Hirollin's Relentless

(Hirollins Gone and Done It-Hunter Run's Libby), a Pointer male bred and owned by Tim Miller is in the string of the Scott Miller's fine derbies. River Keeper glided across and over the high grasses with ease and class. He kept a good forward pattern at a medium range. Hirollin's Relentless had a solid medium race, required little scouting, and scored a nonproductive before his 30 minutes were up.

Heat Seeker's Pearl (Miller's Heat Seeker-War Creek Daize), a Pointer female, headed up brace 14 with a Hood and Primm derby bred by John Chambers and handled by George Tracy. Another Pointer female, JL Sparkle Express (Miller's Heat Seeker x Rock Hill Marie Laveau), bred by the Walkers, is owned and handled by Earl Drew. These two females were look alikes, one with orange and blue collars, the other with two blue collars. They were merrily off the line and forward. Handlers and scouts had to look closely to distinguish their charge. At 20, the course crosses the sand road beyond a thick plum brush area. Heat Seeker's Pearl and JL Sparkle Express were seen to the far right near the thicket, with scouts pulling out of the group to head in that direction. Pearl returned and moved on with handler and scout while JL Sparkle Express hunted further into the area known to harbor quail; however, she was missed by the scout. Both handlers took their locating devices before the 30 minutes were up. (A report from an assisting friend states JL Sparkle Express was found standing in that area with a covey of 12 quail, remained solid for flush, and shot before being roaded back to the wagon.)

Brace 15 had Longmeadow Wendy (Bozeann's Rex-Bozeann's Tailwind), an English Setter female, another setter from Ben Dillard's litter, this one owned by Ben as well, with Mike Hester handling. Bracemate was Deena Jet Boyer (covered with winners above). Wendy ran happily,

always to the front at a medium range, although had no bird contact.

The 16th brace called upon Marques Trail Boss (Lester's Boss Man-Marques Lucky Lady), a Pointer male bred and owned by John Ivester. Trainer Robert (Lefty) Henry had control over Boss. Bracemate was Pointer male Honky Tonk Hiroller (Hirollins Gone and Doneit-Pine Hollow Kate) bred by Warren Parrott. He is owned by Dr. Stan Wint and handled by Scott Miller. Boss runs with an active tail in a powerful gait. He was strong on the ground, although scout Matt Basilone had to stay on his toes. Honky Tonk Hiroller ran a medium-ranging race, although wide and lateral. Nearing pick up at the foot of the hill before the barn point was called for Honky Tonk Hiroller. As the judge approached, handler was on the ground, called bird, and shot. The judge had not seen the bird.

Bootpoint's Enforcer (Quickmarksman's Excalibur-Little River Psycho), a Pointer male bred and handled by Mike Hester, was in brace 17. The owner is Harold Walker. Bracemate was Thunder Road (Rentz's Hijacker-Dominator's Heir Kate, a Pointer female bred by Joe Rentz. The owners are Muriel and Bill Primm, with George Tracy as the handler. Enforcer started with an eye-appealing spark; however, her active race lessened as time elapsed. She did have one find. Thunder Road had a big race forward, although her independence required considerable use of scout Mike Tracy.

The 18th brace had Pointer male Backcountry Jacob (Springflow's Backcountry P-Apple Annie's Sweet Delight), another of Chris Catanzarite's nominated litters. Millers Customized Upgrade (Miller's Upgraded Version-Hackberry Hustler), a Pointer male, was the bracemate. The breeder was L. J. Lundsford for this derby owned by Allen Linder and granddaughter Madison McDonald. Handling was George Tracy. With Mike Tracy

scouting. Jacob ran a big forward race with no bird work. Millers Customized Upgrade had a very big race with much side-to-side mobility. No quail this brace.

Following lunch, one first series brace remained, with four callback dogs loaded into the dog wagon to begin the hourly callbacks after the final brace.

The last brace, 19, mulled around outside the clubhouse before mounting horses, climbing into the gallery wagon or private vehicle to catch the final brace and the start of the callback house. With the anticipation of callbacks to follow soon, the gallery was large: nearly 30 riders. The English Setter male, I'm Crossroads (Hot Blooded-Shamrock's Miss Grace), bred by Tom Green, is owned and handled by Sam Giddens. The Pointer male, Zero Tolerance (Haney's All In-Haney's Two Dozen Roses), bred by Chris Cagle and owned by Marty Moore, is part of the Scott Miller team. The large gallery sat tall and rode fast to keep an eye on these two. Crossroads required a little scouting as he traversed the course without bird contact. Zero Tolerance hunted forward, although just inside the tree line. Both of these two maintained a medium to long race, albeit no birdwork for either dog.

Chester had much success as an amateur handler in years past and campaigned an allage champion for a while on the major circuit. The Farm is a beautiful venue of scattered pines, wiregrass, and some blackjack oaks. Three courses are utilized, and they are bird-laden. Every entry had an opportunity for multiple finds. Leroy Griffis is the manager, Joe Hicks assists with the dog training, and Dakota "Doc" Hall and Rylan "Stick" King round out the crew. They all had The Farm perfectly

prepared for the trial.

Paul Daniel, Region 16 President, served as chairman for this renewal. He was assisted by the other three Trustees from Florida—Don Price, Dr. Kent Cantrell, and Mike Moses. Paul was also the head cook. Maryann and Jim Womack pitched in to help with the food, as did John Hicks. Everyone was well fed with pork loin and chicken on the grill Friday night and steaks on Saturday night.

Judging this year's renewal was ably handled by three wellqualified gentlemen. Chad Adams, Goldsboro, North Carolina, and Randy Bradshaw, Claremont, North Carolina, were advertised. Randy was unable to make it, so Charlie Ward, Monticello, Florida, agreed to fill in for Randy. Charlie sustained a pulled muscle on the first day of running and was unable to continue. Leroy Griffis was marshaling and had ridden every brace and agreed to take over for Charlie. The decisions of the judges were well received by all in attendance.

The Winners

CALIFORNIA BIRD DOG CHAMPIONSHIP

Hale's Honey Badger Named Champion; Battle Born Bette, Runner-up

California Dog Championship cast off the morning of Monday, January 13. The morning was cold (22 degrees at cast off) and dry, not a cloud in sight—just a haze from the fires burning in Los Angeles. The fires cut into our turn-out and support. But nothing compared to the thousands of lives turned upside down by this disaster. Cancellations from those impacted or under warnings meant plenty of changes, we were on about Plan D to make everything come together, and it worked.

Monday's running was cut short by high winds. We were able to get four braces run before we suspended running. Once the wind locks in, in that vast basin, it isn't going to stop for hours. Handling dogs is almost impossible, so stopping is the only way to keep the playing field level and give all the dogs a fair shot at the trophies.

Several dogs had performances in the stake, giving the judges plenty to talk about. But when it was over, Hale's Honey Badger, handled by Bruce Hale, was the champion, and Tom Griffin's Battle Born Bette was the runner-up champion. Badger had a pair of finds with all in order and a solid forward Badger's application was right on the money selecting prime objectives and working a shifting breeze quite well. Bette carded two clean finds with all in order. It was getting warm by this brace, but a very good performance for the full hour.

Trial Association hosted the 76th renewal of the Hobart Ames Open All-Age Classic, followed immediately by the Joe Walker Open Derby Classic, January 14-18 on the Ames Plantation National Championship courses. The start was delayed by one day because of about 8 inches of snow that fell on the preceding Friday and remained evident in densely shaded areas throughout the five days of running.

The All-Age drew 39 entries, and the Derby drew 20. Late Hit, owned by Chris Campbell and handled by Tom Shenker, won first place in the All-Age, followed by second place to Lester's Storm Chaser, owned by John Ivester and handled by Robert (Lefty) Henry, and third to Game Heir, owned and handled by Dr. Fred Corder. Ike Todd swept the Derby contest, handling all the winners, which were first-place Sunset Sam Houston, owned by Matt Brown; second-place Haney's Double Down, owned by Chris Cagle; and thirdplace DS Raising Kane, owned by Alex Rickert.

The Ames Plantation field trial courses and plantation facilities available through generosity of the Trustees of the Ames Foundation. Management of the plantation is overseen by Matt Backus, Center Director, who was capably assisted by Ryan Braddock, Chris Weatherly, and several other hardworking employees. Backus is the secretary-treasurer of the sponsoring club, and both Braddock and Weatherly are directors. Other officers and directors include Joey McAlexander, President; Dr. Fred Corder, Vice President; Otis Ozier; and Jonathan Burch.

Dr. Stan Wint from Gardner, Kansas, and Jarrett Bell from Troy, Missouri, judged both the All-Age and Derby stakes. The sunny January days of running were excellent, with frosty mornings and afternoon temperatures reaching from the upper 30s to low 50s in the afternoon.

greatly enjoyed and appreciated was the Wayne Tate Memorial Dinner, held in Bryan Hall on Tuesday night and sponsored by the family of Dr. Frank McKnight, the Bank of Fayette County, and the host club. The First Baptist Church of Somerville provided sausage and biscuits for breakfast each morning at the end of the first-hour course.

In addition to the Wayne Tate Memorial dinner, the judges, reporter, and wives were graciously entertained throughout the week. Chris Weatherly and his wife, Dr. Amy Plummer Weatherly, DVM, entertained the group in their home on Monday and Thursday nights. Then, Joey and Elise McAlexander hosted a dinner on Saturday night in their home, located near Holly Springs, Mississippi. Joey is the president of the hosting club, and the judges/reporter group was joined by two directors of the club, who were accompanied by their wives. They were Chris and Amy Weatherly and Jonathan and Jennifer Burch.

Ken Blackman efficiently operated the dog wagon throughout the week. Ryan Braddock and Chris Weatherly marshaled every brace, with Matt Backus always nearby. Several men who work full-time on the plantation helped handle and transport horses all five days.

Alex Jackson and several of his Tall Timbers associates rode several braces through the week, anticipating the beginning of their ecology and land stewardship efforts and modifications, which will begin soon, with the goal of improving the habitat for quail on Ames Plantation.

All-Age Classic

Late Hit won first place for Tom Shenker, competing in the 16th brace, which was run on Thursday's first-afternoon course. He had two finds, with the first occurring near Ames Road shortly before crossing Buster Graves' driveway. Afterward, the winner continued to run a strong race and found birds again at 42, having looked strong and stylish both running and on his game. He demonstrated no movement during the flush and shot, appeared to show himself well when such opportunities were available, and required minimal scouting.

Lester's Storm Chaser had birds at 20 neat the southwest corner of the Morgan Field and again at 57 in the eighth brace for Robert (Lefty) Henry. He also participated in an unproductive when both dogs stood a short distance north of Kyle's barn at 29, but no birds were flushed. Storm Chaser was pretty running, with strength, long strides, and plenty of style.

Game Heir stood twice in the 19th brace. He first backed an unproductive of his bracemate at 19 and then found birds at 57 on the Mary Scott Loop north of the National Championship Drive. He consistently ran to the front for Dr. Corder, demonstrated good style throughout the hour, and remained perfectly calm and stylish when the large covey was flushed at 57.

The other dogs in the All-Age contest are reported herewith in the order in which they were drawn to run. Como Thunder, owned by the Russell, Blackwell, and Arthur group, was handled by David Russell and paired with Barshoe Forget Me Not, owned by Robert Gum and handled by Allen Vincent, in the first brace. Como Thunder had one find at 42, but Russell could not find his dog within the allotted time at the end of the hour. Barshoe Forget Me Not

had no birds and was picked up prior to the end of the hour.

Whippoorwill Vette, owned by Dale Bush and handled by Larry Huffman, ran in the second brace with Wynona's All Business, owned by Dr. Robert Rankin and handled by Allen Vincent. Neither dog had any birds, and both handlers picked them up at 31 near Kyle's barn.

Coldwater Odyssey, owned by Andrew and Debra Agnew and handled by Weldon Bennett, and World Class High Def, owned by John Kumpeter and handled by Patrick Siebels, were loosed at Kyles barn for the third brace. High Def was picked up at 39, and Odyssey finished the hour but found no birds.

Game Surge went next, owned and handled by Dr. Fred Corder, together with Miss Arkansas, owned and handled by Mike Lemons. Neither dog located any birds. Game Surge had an unproductive at 15, and Miss Arkansas had unproductive stands at 34 and 40.

In the sixth brace, Mayfield's Storm Charger, owned by Jake Davis and Scott Mason, was handled by Allen Vincent and ran with Mr. Arkansas, owned and handled by Mike Lemons. Storm Charger had a stop to flush at 19. Mr. Arkansas found birds at 29 and again at 43 to end the first day of competition.

With the temperature at 28 degrees, Weldon Bennett had Coldwater War Cry, owned by Paul Melton, and Patrick Siebels had World Class Migraine, owned by John Kumpeter. War Cry had an

unproductive at 20, and Migraine had an unproductive at 36. Both were picked up before the end of the hour.

Bryant's Silver Lining, a Pointer male owned and handled by Kenton Bryant, was the first-place winner in a strong forward-ground race. Second place was awarded to Dry Kreek Fiesty B, a Pointer female owned and handled by Chris Koutras. Pointer male, High Drive Impact, owned by Allen Linder and handled by Buddy Morrison, placed third. All three dogs showed great potential with out-front, pleasing races.

The first brace of the Virgil Beasley Classic was dropped down at Martin Lane. Birds were found at the Power Lines 30 minutes in by Gentry's Little Jane, owned and handled by Taylor Henley. Her bracemate, Lovely Lady May, was a little eager to get to the birds and was picked up by owner/handler Joe Hughes. Jane had an unproductive with five minutes to go and finished the hour.

Tennessee Farmer's Co-op, a longtime supporter of our trial, furnished a delicious barbeque lunch. After Derby winners were

Ubetcha found birds again at :31 at the Big Oak and finished the hour. Gadot was picked up before time.

Next were Bryant's Give It A Rip, an English Setter male with Kenton Bryant, and Hengen's Spunk, a Pointer male, with Taylor Henley. Rip was gone, and the tracker requested. Spunk was picked up with no birdwork.

With clouds moving in and a forecast of all-night rain, scenting conditions definitely changed for the last brace of the day. With Warioto's Crazy Daisy, Scott and Lisa Little's Pointer female being scratched, Ben Weddington and Hytime Dixie had the course to themselves. Mia Storm finished out front with nose to the ground, still hunting.

After three exciting pairings with lots of birdwork and fairly rainsoaked grounds, most all involved

"didn't have enough horse" to make a fourth hour, so lunch was the next order of business. Tracy Layne, wife of club president Dereck, had the food ready and waiting. Thank you, Tracy!

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




